ALBANESE ELECTED AUSTRALIA'S PM

SYDNEY: Australians awoke Sunday to a new Prime Minister in Anthony Albanese, the centre-left Labour Party leader whose ascension to the nation's top job from being raised in social housing by a single mother on a disability pension was said to reflect the changed fabric of the country today. The 59-year-old career politician, who has described himself as the only candidate with a "non-Anglo Celtic name" to run for prime minister in the 121 years the office has existed, referred to his humble upbringing in the inner-Sydney suburb of Camperdown while thanking electors for making him the country's 31st leader.

LIGHTNING KILLS 4 IN A DAY IN STATE

Varsha lodges complaint against hubby Anubhav

Cuttack, May 22: A day after actor-politician Anubhav Mohanty released a video on the social media accusing his wife Varsha Priyadarshini of denying him the conjugal rights he deserved for years, Varsha Sunday lodged a complaint with the Purighat police here accusing the Kendrapara MP of tarnishing her image.

Mohanty had May 19 and 21 released videos on the social media holding Varsha responsible for the marital dispute.

In his latest video, the Parliamentarian said he was the first one to file a petition for divorce. "My only reason for filing the divorce as cited in the petition was non-consummation of marriage. Even after eight years of marriage, my life partner didn't give me the rights that I deserve being a husband," said Mohanty.



He went on to add: "After we got married in 2014, she had said that since childhood she feared physical relationship. She requested me to give her some time to accept me as her husband mentally as well as physically."

In the video shared on social media May 19, Mohanty broke down and poured his heart out over his 'failed' marriage with the actress. Without taking any name, the actor-turned-politician said choosing a life partner was the only mistake he had committed that ruined his life.

IIT-JEE all set to open for students from 25 countries

New Delhi, May 22: IIT-JEE (IIT-Joint Entrance Exam) is set to go global with the Indian government planning to hold the exam in 25 countries, right from the US to Vietnam, simultaneously. In Kuala Lumpur and Lagos, these examinations were held last year. Earlier, with the cooperation of the Indian government, the IIT-JEE exams were held in 12 countries.

The countries where the examinations will be conducted are: the US, Australia, South Africa, Singapore, China, Nepal, Indonesia, Malaysia, Bahrain, Kuwait, Qatar, the UAE, among others.

Around 3,900 Under Graduate and 1,300 Postgraduate seats will be made available for NRIs, Indians and foreign nationals studying abroad. These seats will be reserved in top class engineering institutes of the country.

According to the Union Education Ministry, under Direct Admission of Student Abroad (DASA) scheme, these students will be provided admission in top class institutes of the country.

Foreign students will be able to get admission in National Institute of Technology, National Institute of Information Technology, School of Planning and Architect and other technical institutions funded by the Central government.

Puri, May 22: The controversy surrounding the Srimandir Heritage Corridor Project has refused to abate with the district administration carrying out Ground Penetrating Radar Survey (GPRS) around the temple in a clandestine manner Saturday night.

Meanwhile, the Archaeological Survey of India's circle office at Puri has clarified that it had no prior information about the survey.

Sources from the office said that neither the Odisha Bridge



and Construction Corporation nor the temple or district administration informed it on conducting the survey. No official from ASI was present at the site where the survey was being conducted. However, as per norms, an ASI official is required to be present at the site during survey.

The state government in an affidavit in the Orissa High Court, May 9 had informed the Advocate General that ASI officials will be present in all the works that will be

Wasn't aware of project: Puri seer

The heritage corridor project row is currently sub-judice in the Orissa High Court which has scheduled the next date of hearing in the case June 20. During the last hearing in the case, the Archaeological Survey of India in its joint inspection report had submitted that the Odisha government had not carried out the GPRS around the 12th century temple before executing deep excavation works for the project construction.

Maha, Kerala, Raj reduce VAT on fuel

New Delhi, May 22: Maharashtra, Rajasthan and Kerala have decreased VAT on petrol and diesel after Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman's call to provide further relief to consumers following a cut in excise duty by the Centre, though some other states appeared reluctant citing their inability to take more strain on revenue.

The Shiv Sena-led Maharashtra government slashed the VAT on petrol by ₹2.08 per litre and diesel by ₹1.44 per litre. A statement issued by the government said the state exchequer will have to bear an annual loss of ₹2,500 crore as a result of this decision.

However, the DMK-led government in Tamil Nadu said that it is neither fair nor reasonable to expect states to reduce their taxes.

The Left Democratic Front gov-

ernment in Kerala had Saturday promptly announced a cut in the state tax on the prices of petrol and diesel by ₹2.41 and ₹1.36 per litre respectively, following the reduction in fuel prices by the Centre. Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot also said the state government will reduce VAT by ₹2.48 per litre on petrol and ₹1.16 per litre on diesel.

In Madhya Pradesh, Congress leader Kamal Nath demanded that the BJP government reduce VAT on petroleum products to further bring down the rates.

Bahujan Samaj Party chief Mayawati said it was the duty of not only Uttar Pradesh but also of other states to immediately announce a cut in VAT on fuel.

In BJP-ruled Karnataka, Chief Minister Basavaraj Bommai said his government will consider a further cut in fuel tax.

Pallabi opposed the act, leading to a tussle between the two. Lipan attacked the woman and tried to snatch away her gold jewellery inside a room.

At this time, Pallabi's four-year-old son could sense the danger on his mother and rushed out of the house repeatedly mumbling and gesturing towards their neighbours to come to their rescue. At first, the neighbours could not understand the minor boy's gestures and told him not to move out of the house at night.

However, the villagers subsequently became suspicious about the unusual behaviour of the toddler and stormed into the house and rescued Pallabi from Lipan. They overpowered Lipan.

Later, the accused was handed over to the police. Pallabi, who had suffered injuries in the attack, was admitted to a local hospital for treatment.

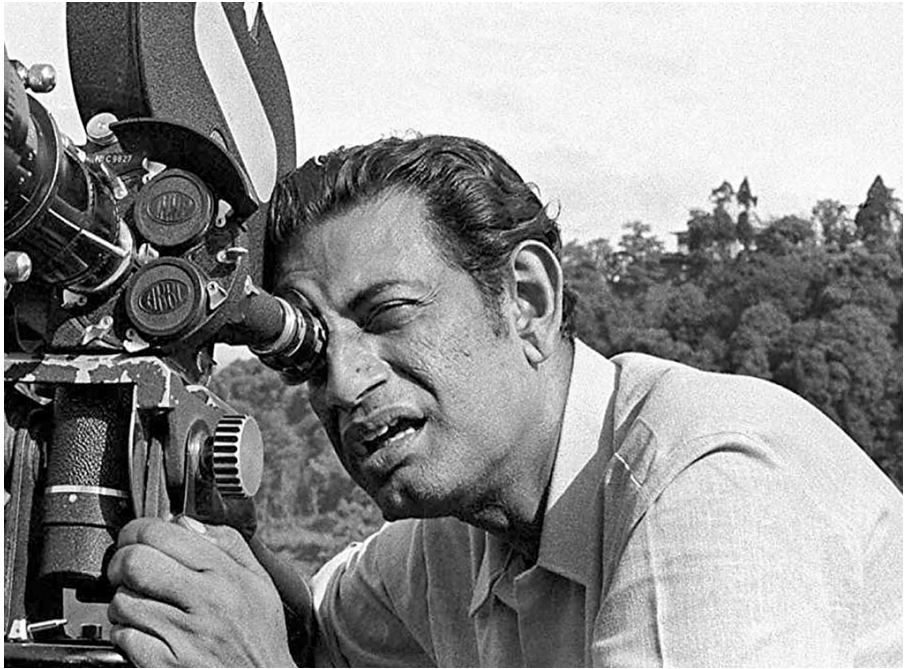

"Kolkata endlessly fed Ray's imagination, in return Ray gave the city its sense of self," says Sen.

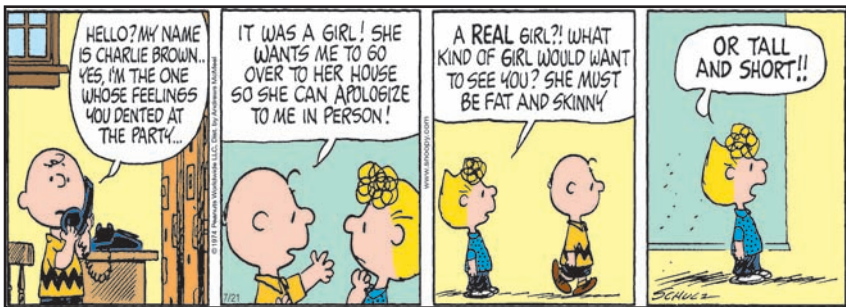
"His films never try to idealise Kolkata but constantly transform how it is perceived," says Harvey. "Look at *The Adversary*'s disaffected anti-hero who is



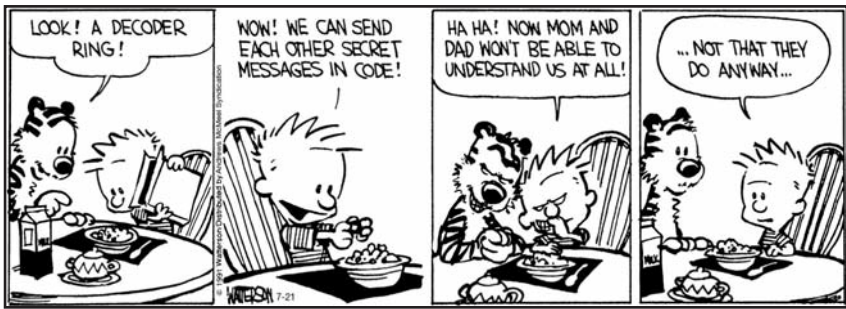
seen apart from his city, unable to find solace in its casual pleasures," he added.

Both filmmakers said they are committed to exploring the rich legacy offered by Ray.

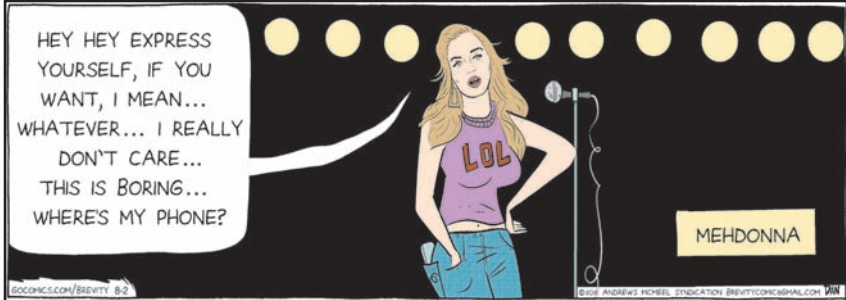

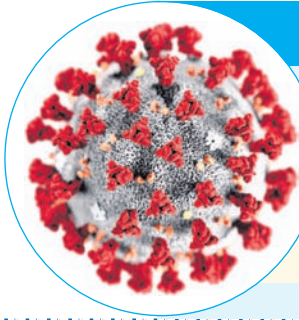

Cage fish farming in Hirakud a success: CS

Bhubaneswar, May 22: Cage fish farming in the Hirakud reservoir is a successful model and it will soon raise freshwater fish production in state, said Chief Secretary Suresh Chandra Mahapatra Sunday.

“The state government has taken steps for creation of infrastructure like fish landing jetty, common facility centre and inland fisheries research laboratory to boost cage fish farming in Hirakud. These initiatives will augment freshwater fish production in Odisha,” Mahapatra said while visiting the site.

The Chief Secretary interacted with fishermen, entrepreneurs and officials of the Fisheries department while inspecting cage fish farming in the reservoir.

Expressing satisfaction with the progress of the field-level work, Mahapatra directed the departmental officials to expedite work for the common facility center; fishery research laboratory and the fish landing jetty.

He also assured the entrepreneurs that the state government would provide the necessary infrastructure and support for the development of cage fish farming in Odisha.

PANGOLIN RESCUED; ONE ARRESTED

Bhubaneswar, May 22: The Special Task Force (STF) of the state Crime Branch has rescued a pangolin, and arrested a man on charges of wildlife trafficking in Kalahandi, an official said Sunday.

Acting on a tipoff, a team of STF with the help of Kalahandi Forest officials raided a place at Karni Khunti village under Narla police limits in Kalahandi Saturday evening and recovered a pangolin weighing 13.3kg from the possession of Jitendra Kumar, said an official.

“As Jitendra, a resident of Tagarla under Kesinga police limits in Kalahandi, could not produce any document in favour of possession of the pangolin—a Schedule 1, Part 1 species under the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, he was taken into custody,” added the official.

The scaled mammal has been handed over to the Kalahandi divisional forest officer, while officials of M Rampur Forest under Kalahandi Forest Division have taken Jitendra into custody for necessary legal action, said the official.

Since 2020, the STF has seized 28 leopard skins, as many elephant tusks, seven deer skins, 14 live pangolins, over 30kg pangolin scales, two leopard teeth and 29 leopard claws.

The agency has also arrested 69 wildlife traffickers.

CITY MAN LOSES HIS CAR TO FRAUDSTER, FILES COMPLAINT

Bhubaneswar, May 22: A man in the capital city here reportedly lost his car to a fraudster after renting out the vehicle to the latter recently.

Victim Satyajit Mohanty filed a complaint in this regard with the Airfield police. The police have registered case and launched a manhunt to nab the accused, sources said.

Mohanty, a resident of Old Town area in the city here, is now residing in an apartment in Sundarapada area under Airfield police limits. He had recently published an advertisement on internet to rent out his car to any interested party.

Subsequently, accused Manas Ranjan Biswal contacted Mohanty and expressed his interest to take the vehicle on rent

by paying ₹25,000 per month.

Mohanty met Biswal at Bhimtangi May 8 and handed over the car to the latter after getting a post dated cheque of ₹50,000.

They agreed to execute the deal officially in a local court the next day. However, Biswal did not turn up in the court. He also did not respond to the phone calls by Mohanty.

Later, Biswal called back to Mohanty and assured him to reach the court May 11 to execute the

deal. However, he did not keep his words, said the complaint.

Mohanty, meanwhile, came to know that Biswal had given him a fake address while taking out the car on rent. He also found that Biswal, a resident of Simulia in Balasore, had earlier been arrested by Nayapalli police for cheating several car owners, sources said.

Finding no other way, Mohanty sought police help to get back his vehicle from the fraudster.

Traffic restriction on Khandagiri flyover

Bhubaneswar, May 22: The twin city Commissionerate Police has decided to impose traffic restrictions on Khandagiri flyover here till June 5 this year owing to maintenance work, an official said Sunday.

The restriction will remain in force for maintenance work of main carriage way on RHS (BBSR-Khurda) of Khandagiri flyover, said the official.

As per a notice issued by the Commissionerate Police, all vehicles intending to go towards Khurda side from Bhubaneswar shall not avail the RHS flyover of Khandagiri and will be diverted through the service road on RHS, it was learnt.

Health experts have reportedly said that monkeypox patients could pass on the disease for up to four weeks after symptoms appear.

Amesh Adalja, an emerging infectious diseases expert at John Hopkins University, made the warning in an interview that monkeypox patients could be infectious for up to four weeks, reports the DailyMail.

People who catch the virus initially suffer a fever before rashes and skin lesions appear on the face and body. The virus can then be passed on through touching the



affected areas or via droplets expelled in coughs and sneezes. “It can take a few weeks for the

skin lesions to disappear: People are contagious until their active skin lesions have dissipated,” he said.

Michael Head, a global health expert at Southampton University in England, agreed with his assertion, the report said.

“Based on previous monkeypox outbreaks and guidance from [UK health authorities] and WHO, the infectious period (i.e. when the virus can be transmitted to another person) can be comparable to the time period where the rash and blisters are present,” Head said.

“This may be for two weeks, and may be longer,” he added.

The month-long infectious period raises the likelihood that the virus could be passed on by in-

fectured patients to others.

More than 80 cases of monkeypox have been confirmed in at least 12 countries, the WHO has said.

The WHO mentioned another 50 suspected cases are being investigated, without naming any countries, and warned that more cases are likely to be reported. Infections have been confirmed in nine European countries, as well as the US, Canada and Australia.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved a smallpox drug to treat monkeypox patients, while the WHO revealed it will hold daily meetings as the situation unfolds.

Bhubaneswar, May 22: Mayor Sulochana Das Sunday put emphasis on the need for income generation for women for their empowerment in the society.

Das highlighted various measures undertaken by the state government and the Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation (BMC) to empower women in the capital city.

The BMC has decided to treat members of self-help groups (SHGs) and area level federations (ALFs) of Mission Shakti as implementation partners in different projects to provide earning opportunities to the women, Das said.

“Women empowerment is a priority area for the state government and the BMC. The civic authorities in the capital city have ensured women’s participation in sanitation, protection of environment, beautification, construction, revenue collection and recreation activities,” Das said.

Moreover, the BMC has involved 623 SHGs under Mukhya Mantri Karma Tatpara Aviyan (MUKTA) scheme of the state government. According to sources, more than 500 SHGs have been involved as the

implementation partners for the rainwater harvesting projects under the MUKTA scheme. The SHGs have also been involved as partners in projects including roadside open-air gyms and development of parking spaces in the city, sources said.

“Women’s participation in sanitation work is commendable. More than 600 women of at least 117 SHGs and five ALFs have been deployed as Swachha Sathis and Swachha Karmis to manage micro composting centers (MCCs) and material recovery facilities (MRFs) in the capital city,” said a BMC official.

Similarly, the members of the SHGs also manage several Colony Parks in the city. Out of 77 Colony Parks, at least 40 are managed by the women SHGs, said the official. Moreover, the members of at least

67 SHGs have been assigned the task of collection of holding tax and other dues from the residents while those of another 67 have been working as Jala Sathis, sources said.

BMC sources claimed that more than 3,500 women SHGs are directly and indirectly involved with the civic authorities in the implementation of various projects and the number is expected to double by the end of this year.

There are 5,032 registered women SHGs in the capital city. Out of this, at least 3,757 groups have already received ₹10,000 each for their involvement in different projects. Moreover, various business loans have been disbursed to 3,658 groups. This has promoted entrepreneurship and self-reliance among the group members, sources said.

Temperature plunges in state with overnight rain

Bhubaneswar, May 22: Odisha experienced pleasant weather Sunday with overnight rain leading to a considerable drop in the mercury level, the Met office said.

The maximum temperature fell by around 2-4°C at most places and was significantly below normal in many areas. Only six weather stations, as compared to 18 the previous day, recorded a temperature of over 40°C with an overcast sky in several districts, the Bhubaneswar Meteorological Centre said.

Light to moderate rain occurred at most places in coastal Odisha and a few areas in the interior parts of the state.

Ghasipura in Keonjhar received 62.1mm of rain from Saturday evening till 8.30am May 22, the highest in the state, according to a bulletin. There was moderate

Boudh recorded 43°C, the highest in the state, followed by 42°C in Malkangiri and 41.8°C in Titlagarh, the department said.

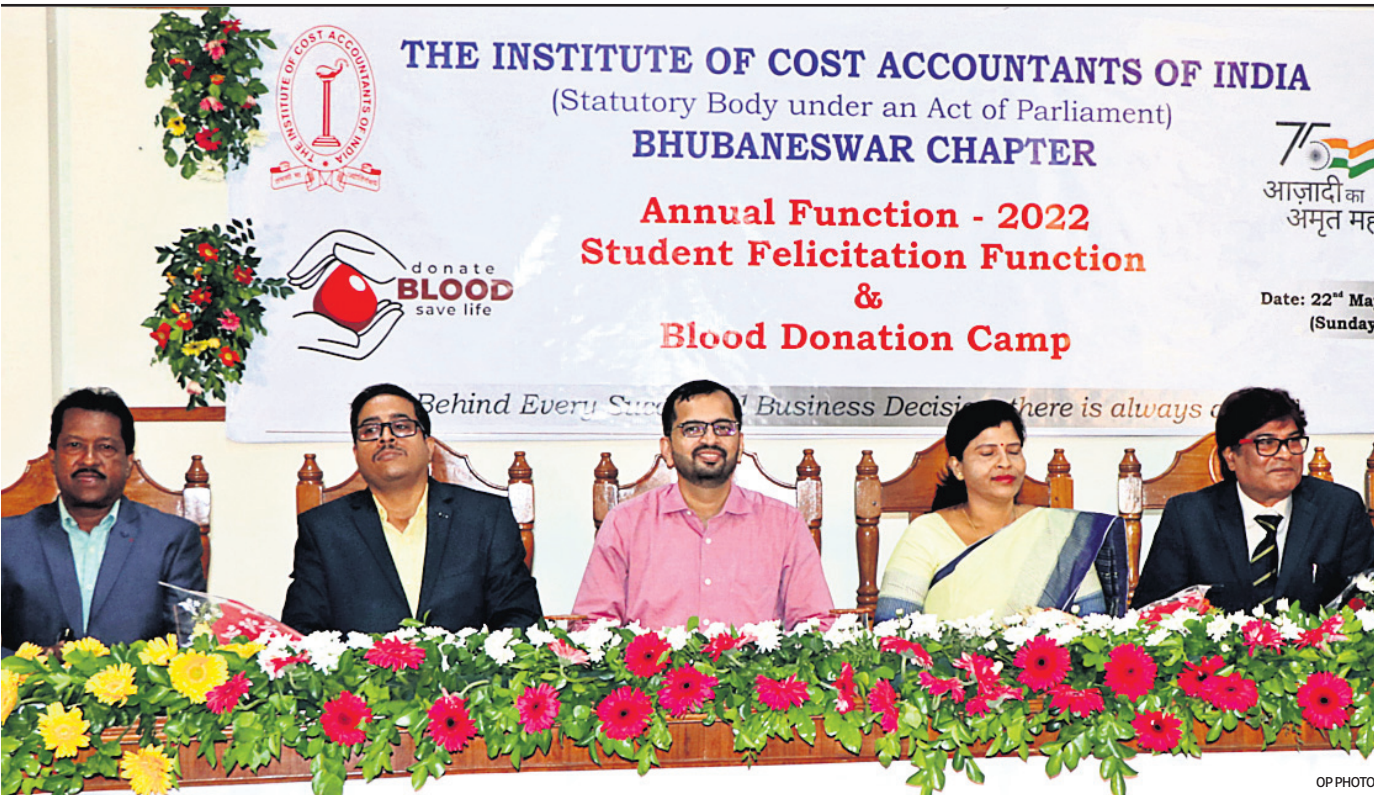

City youth held over extortion charges

Bhubaneswar, May 22: The Commissionerate police Sunday arrested a 23-year-old youth for allegedly demanding extortion worth ₹1 lakh by giving death threats to a restaurant owner at Nuagaon Square in City.

Nayak was Sunday produced before the court that later sent him to judicial custody. He is also involved three more cases of similar nature registered at Khandagiri and Bharatpur police stations. Police have been taking steps to book the accused under section 110 of the CrPC.

State records 15 new Covid cases

Bhubaneswar, May 22: Odisha Sunday recorded 15 new Covid cases, seven more than the previous day, with the tally rising to 12,88,372, the state Health department said in a bulletin.

Out of the total 15 new infections, ten were reported from quarantine centres while five persons contracted the virus locally.

The death toll remained at 9,126, as no new fatality due to the infection was reported in the last 24 hours, the bulletin said.

Khurda registered the highest number of new cases at nine, followed by Balasore with two new infections. Sambalpur and Sundargarh reported one new case each.

Fifty-three other coronavirus patients have died due to comorbidities so far in state, it added.

Odisha now has 110 active cases, while 12,79,083 patients have recovered, including 21 Saturday.

Grunt, hoo, pant, scream: Chimps use complex vocal communication

It is not a language but it is amongst the most complex forms of communication described in a non-human animal

Scientists exploring the evolutionary origin of language have detected a vocal communication system among wild chimpanzees more complex and structured than previously known, with a dozen call types combined into hundreds of different sequences.

The researchers made more than 4,800 recordings of vocalisations produced by members of three groups of chimpanzees inhabiting Ivory Coast's Tai National Park, one of the last major remnants of old-growth tropical forest in West Africa and home to a rich array of plants and animals.

Chimpanzees, which along with

their cousins the bonobos are the closest living genetic relatives to people, are intelligent and highly social apes that make and utilize tools and can be taught some basic human signing from sign language.

Scientists have long known that chimpanzees use various vocalizations in the wild, but the new study offered a comprehensive examination of this intra-species communication.

"It is not a language but it is amongst the most complex forms of communication described in a non-human animal," said behavioral ecologist Cédric Girard-Buttoz of French research agency CNRS's Institute for Cognitive Science and lead author of the study published this week in the journal Communications Biology.

The call types included a grunt, a panted grunt, a hoo sound, a pant hoot, a bark sound, a panted bark, a pant, a scream, a panted scream, a whimper, a panted roar and the non-vocal lip smack and raspberry

sounds. The researchers determined that these call types were used in 390 different sequences.

The order in which the chimpanzees produced the calls ap-

peared to follow rules and structure, though the study did not include conclusions about any potential meanings.

"The key finding is the ability of

a primate other than humans to produce several structured vocal sequences and to recombine small sequences with two calls into longer sequences by adding calls to it. It is important because it shows the premise of structured communication which could have been the foundation of the evolution towards syntax in our language," Girard-Buttoz said.

Syntax refers to the arrangement of words and phrases to construct understandable sentences.

"One of the most common sequences is the well-described 'pant hoot' sequence either as 'hoo' plus 'pant hoot' or 'hoo' plus 'pant hoot' plus 'pant scream' or 'pant bark'. But other sequences are also frequent like 'hoo' plus 'pant grunt' or 'grunt' plus 'pant grunt'. In general 'pant grunt' and 'pant hoot' are the most common calls used in these sequences," Girard-Buttoz said.

The researchers want to learn whether the various sequences communicate a wider range of

meanings in the complex social environment of the chimpanzees. They have suspicions about the potential meanings of certain vocalisations.

"We need to explore in detail the contexts of emission of these vocalizations to see if it shifts between single calls and sequences," Girard-Buttoz said. "Then we need to conduct playback experiments to see if the suspected meaning matches with the behavioral reaction of chimpanzees when they hear the call."

The researchers are not certain whether chimpanzee vocal communication may be similar to the beginnings of language in the human evolutionary lineage. Humans and chimpanzees share a common ancestor but split into separate lineages perhaps 7 million years ago.

"Protolanguage was probably in between what chimpanzees do and what humans do," Girard-Buttoz said.

HM arrested for harassing girls

Bhawanipatna: The headmaster of an upper primary school was arrested by police Sunday for sexually harassing some girl inmates at its 100-bed tribal hostel in Gopinathpur under Thuamul Rampur block of Kalahandi. The hostel is being run by the ST and SC Development department. An FIR lodged by at least six girls stated that the accused identified as Sashidhar Nayak used to indecently touch them and threatened them to rusticate from the school in case they disclose the matter before parents.

Govt sits tight over solar-run PWS projects

Jajpur, May 22: The ambitious solar-powered piped water supply (PWS) projects in nine coastal districts affected by floods and cyclones have not yet started. The proposal to this effect has remained non-starter.

According to reports, in May, 2019, the engineer-in chief of the Rural Water Supply and Sanitation (RWSS) department made a proposal to the Panchayati Raj department to run PWS projects with both electricity and solar power at places where electricity is inaccessible.

It was stated that 4,315 PWS projects will be implemented in Balasore, Bhadrak, Cuttack, Ganjam, Jajpur, Kendrapara, Jagatsinghpur, Khurda and Puri districts at an estimated cost of ₹345.20 crore which will be funded by the World Bank.

Nearly, ₹0.08 crore will be spent for each project. Three years have passed since the RWSS moved this proposal, but the state government has not taken any step on it.

Each year, people of these coastal districts are affected with floods and cyclones. Power supply gets disrupted for days together worsening the plight of the people in the flood-hit pockets when they struggle to get safe drinking water in these areas.

Keeping this problem in view, the RWSS had taken a far-sighted proposal to harness solar energy in these flood-prone areas to ensure safe drinking water. However, the proposal has remained confined to the administrative red tape.

On the other hand, as many as

200 solar-run piped drinking water projects have been set up in three phases in Jajpur. However, most of the projects are not working due to use of sub-standard equipment and machinery. The construction agency allegedly got away with money by compromising with quality of work. Most of the projects fail to cater to the drinking water needs of the locals.

Last year, Odisha Renewable Energy Development Agency (OREDA) had conducted a survey on effective public utility of solar projects in Jajpur.

In the survey, it was found that some projects had functioned for a maximum of 281 days since the day of commissioning. Some projects even went defunct within 15 days of operation.

In Dharmasala block, a solar powered drinking water project at Endalaba Bichhakhandi Mundasahi had run for 219 days before going kaput. Similarly, Patapur Harijanasahi project had run for 218 days and Patapur Badabarisahi project for 13 days only.

In Sukinda block, Gobarakhati Mirgichar project ran for 177 days; Chingudipal Chhatanagar Mundasahi project for 169 days and Kharadi project for 211 days.

In Barchana block, Paria Sabarsahi project was effective for 281 days, Bhusandhapur Adabashisahi project for 131 days and Charinangal Jharkul project for 13 days. It was alleged that solar-powered pump sets used for these projects were of poor quality.

Executive engineer of the Jajpur RWSS division, Sushant Kumar Ghadei was contacted over phone but he did not pick up the call.

Mafia destroy sand dunes along coast

Kujang, May 22: Some local mafia gangs, instead of quarrying sand from a nearby private land for which they pay royalty, have been smuggling the minor mineral from natural dunes near seashore in Abhayachandpur mouza under Erasama tehsil of Jagatsinghpur district.

Although hundreds of heavy vehicles are engaged in the illegal activity every day, the Revenue department does not bother to verify if sand is actually being quarried from private land or from the dunes. They have no information as to how much of sand is being quarried every day. This helps the smugglers fill their pockets heavily. The state exchequer also loses crores of rupees, villagers from Dhinkia alleged.

"Naturally formed sand dunes acted as a bulwark against the surging tidal wave in Bay of Bengal during 1999 super cyclone. Lives and properties in Dhinkia, Mahala and Trilochanpur villages were saved owing to the dunes," Bibekananda Swain from Dhinkia stated.

When contacted, Erasama tehsildar Prajnyananda Das said, "Action will be taken against the guilty if it is found that sand is being lifted from any place other than the lease area."

Series accident: Family alleges murder bid over land dispute

Bolangir, May 22: A road accident which claimed the life of a youth and rendered two others critical before the RTO office here Saturday, took a curious turn Sunday as the CCTV footage featuring the scene has revealed that the accident was nothing but a pre-planned murder over past enmity and property dispute.

The matter came to the fore after the CCTV footage of the accident went viral on social media platforms. The deceased was identified as Srikant Bagh, 30 and the injured as Sanu Nayak, a hotel owner.

The second injured person is the accused Chittaranjan Mohanty who was driving the mini-truck. He is undergoing treatment at a private hospital near the Bhima Bhoi Medical College and Hospital (BBMCH) under police custody.

The deceased Srikant and injured Sanu's family members have alleged that the accused tried to

mow them down under the wheels of the truck over past enmity.

The incident has sent shockwaves in the town as police detained Chittaranjan Mohanty including two others and interrogated them in this connection. Sources said that family members of Sanu and Chittaranjan were on loggerheads over acquiring of IDCO and government lands.

Acting on the allegations of the family members of the deceased and the injured Sanu, Bolangir police seized the CCTV footage and launched further investigation into the matter.

The series accidents occurred at RTO Office Square on NH-26 at 11:26am Saturday. A mini truck from Titlagarh end came rushing at great speed and rammed a bike and then hit a tree on roadside and then a cow and finally a truck in front.

Srikant Bag who was riding as pillion on the bike succumbed to head injuries while two others, Sanu and Chittaranjan were critical after a 407 truck hit their bike near the Bolangir RTO office, Saturday.

However, a few locals who witnessed the accident from close quarters smelt something unusual from the truck driver's activity. Meanwhile, Sanu's father and the kin of the deceased suspected a foul play and lodged complaints with the police.

Graft: Forester, guard suspended

Patnagarh, May 22: The Bolangir divisional forest officer (DFO) has suspended forester of Larambha section Bagawat Das and forest guard Gopal Gaddia on charges of corrupt practices.

Reports said that the forester Das had seized the tractor of Karuna Mishra, a resident of Bahal village, February 22 citing that his tractor was engaged in timber smuggling. He had also registered a case against Mishra's elder brother.



Karuna Mishra had offered ₹20,000 to the forester and ₹5,000 to the guard to release his tractor and to relax the charges against his brother in the charge sheet. A video of the bribery had gone viral a few days ago.

On the basis of the video clip-pings, the Bolangir DFO placed the two staffers under suspension.

Hardcore Maoist bids adieu to arms in Kandhamal dist

Phulbani, May 22: A member of the outlawed CPI (Maoist) carrying a huge bounty on his head surrendered before Kandhamal police, an officer said Sunday. The surrendered Maoist identified as Ashok Pune belongs to Chhattisgarh's Dala village.

He surrendered before Kandhamal SP Vinit Agarwal who welcomed his decision by felicitating him with a bouquet of flowers. He had joined the banned outfit six to seven years ago and had shifted to Odisha. Since then, he was operating in KKBN (Kandhamal-Kalahandi-Boudh-Nayagarh) division of Odisha State Committee as the area committee member.

Pune said that he took the noble step as he was deeply influenced by the government's development works in his native place. He also vowed to join the mainstream of the society. "I and my friend decided to surrender. But, my friend is yet to surrender. I request other fellow comrades to surrender and live a normal life," Pune said.

He is being interrogated to as-



certain his involvement in other offences. He will be rehabilitated as per the surrender and rehabilitation policy of the state government and will be provided financial assistance of ₹5 lakh besides homestead plot with building assistance, marriage allowance, study allowance of ₹3,000 per month and vocational training, reports said.

Steps will be taken for his gainful employment, the SP said, adding that at least 10 Maoist cadres have surrendered in Kandhamal district. They have been provided rehabilitation assistance.

The police added that the surrender of the cadres would land a serious blow to the Maoists' plan and designs in north Kandhamal and adjoining axis.

Clamour for revival of old fish spawn centre

Bhanjanagar, May 22: The fish farmers here have long been demanding revival of an old fish fingerling production centre near the College Road under this NAC of Ganjam district which has been lying unused for over three decades.

Sources said the facility has turned into a dumping yard and is thronged by anti-social elements during night.

Though the farmers have been demanding revival of the old fish production centre, the fisheries department has taken no step in the regard.

While the staff quarters at this facility are in decrepit condition, the fingerling production centre has almost lost its existence amid piles of garbage, plastic materials and solid waste dumped by the civic body.

The fisheries department had thought of revival of the centre in July 2021 with the thrust of the state government on boosting farmers' income through



fish production.

The then director of fisheries department Smrutiranjana Pradhan had visited Bhanjanagar and directed the officials to take steps for restoration of the old fish spawn production centre. However, no step in this direction was taken though 10 months have passed since the visit of the fisheries director, locals alleged.

They also said that if the facility is left unused, the land may be encroached by mafia.

Notably, the fish spawn production centre was shifted near Biju Patnaik Children's Park in 1984. Earlier, it was set up on 22 acre land near College Road. However, over the years this facility became a victim

of faulty management while its ponds could not be restored, leading to its gradual closure. Now, the centre near Biju Patnaik Children's Park is being renovated at an expense of ₹4 crore.

Local farmers are of the view that the old facility can be used for fish production to cater to the growing need for fish farmers. The government should focus on the renovation of the old fish production centre. It will create scope of direct and indirect employment to the locals, they added.

Block fisheries officer Sudhansu Sahu said, "A proposal was sent to the government for revival of the old fish production centre, but funds have not been made available."

315 Nabarangpur villages still in dark

RURAL ELECTRIFICATION GOES FOR A TOSS

Nabarangpur, May 22: As many as 315 villages in this district are yet to be connected with power supply due to sheer negligence of the Energy department and power distribution companies.

This is the sad state of affairs in this tribal dominated district even after 73 years of independence and this has come at a time when the Centre and state governments are spending a lot to make power supply available to every household.

As a result, residents in these 315 villages are spending their lives in darkness, deprived of even basic amenities. Lack of power supply in these remote and underdeveloped areas of the district paints a sorry picture of government and departmental apathy.

Reports said that the Chief

The district has witnessed the implementation of three power supply schemes like Rajiv Gandhi Vidyutikaran Yojana of the previous UPA government, state sponsored Biju Grama Jyoti Yojana and Saubhagya Yojana after BJP-led NDA government came to power. The phase one of the Saubhagya

Yojana has concluded and the phase 2 started. However, these villages are yet to receive power supply to their households.

Residents attributed the failure in proper implementation of the scheme to the serial handover of the power department to the private firms. All revenue villages are

being electrified while the hamlets are getting deprived, they lamented.

When contacted, a senior power official said that the 315 hamlets which are yet to be electrified due to various reasons will soon be included under Biju Grama Jyoti Yojana and Saubhagya Yojana phase-2.

Moreover, the state government has engaged Odisha Renewable Energy Development Authority (OREDA) to supply power through solar channels to those villages where commuting is not a problem.

The state government has informed in writing to the zilla parishad May 4 and District Rural Development Agency (DRDA), he said. However, it remains to be seen when these villages are being connected with power supply.

Berhampur, May 22: A 35-year-old auto-rickshaw driver here in Ganjam district has won accolades for returning a gold necklace worth around ₹1.6 lakh to a female passenger who had accidentally left it in his vehicle a few days ago.

The woman was also relieved after getting her ornament back.

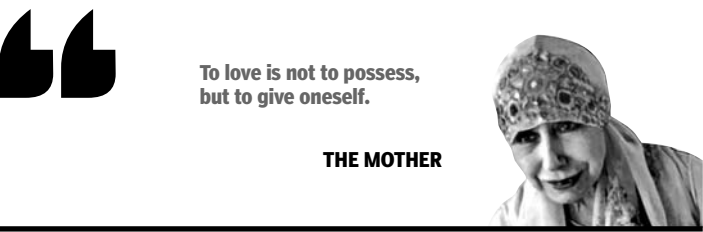
"I had spent sleepless nights in the last few days. Now, I am very happy and thankful to the auto-rickshaw driver," she said.

Zelenskyy & Chaplin

It is an old debate whether art should be used as a tool for political causes or it should reflect life as it is without any intention to overtly preach any doctrine or political message. But, the debate has gained a new currency at the ongoing Cannes Film Festival which has been turned into a new theatre of war between Russia and Ukraine. The 75th Cannes Film Festival opened last week against a backdrop of international crisis. The first question jury president Vincent Lindon had to answer to the world was whether the event should at all take place when thousands are dying in Ukraine and the brute Russian war machine, under the dictatorial President Vladimir Putin, is crushing life out of innocent people. Acknowledging the rumbling noises of war drums, the French actor said that given the “turbulent times” in the world at large, the festival’s role was more vital than ever: “Do you think the world will change if we stop Cannes (festival)?” he asked, making an impassioned plea. “No. If it would, then I am sure we would stop Cannes. But I think the opposite. At this festival we can be a mirror,” he said, arguing that culture is the most crucial piece of proof or evidence of what the world is like when we are living in it.

In a sense, this year’s Cannes is a rebirth of sorts after its last-minute cancellation in 2020 and a compromised, COVID-shadowed edition last summer. But, during the rebirth it has gone back to its old combative spirit taking up the cause of freedom of speech, art and expression. In a show of support for the conflict in Ukraine, the organisers have banned official Russian delegations while opening its doors to individual artists, many of whom are at odds with the Putin regime. The dissident Russian director Kirill Serebrennikov, who was recently released from house arrest, has a film – Tchaikovsky’s Wife – screening in the main competition. But, the surprise of surprises was the selection of the guest of honour at the opening ceremony who was no other than Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, who addressed the audience by video link.

In his address Zelenskyy said, “We have no choice but to continue fighting for our freedom” and explained there is nothing amiss in mixing filmmaking with fighting for a cause. He cited Charlie Chaplin as a glorious and shining example of his conception of the deep connection between cinema and political fight. He spoke about Chaplin’s film, The Great Dictator, to draw parallels between fictional war and dictators and the one Ukraine now faces. “Hundreds of people are dying every day. They won’t get up again after the clapping at the end,” he told the audience. He asked filmmakers and actors present at the festival whether cinema will “keep quiet” or speak up. “If there is a dictator, if there is a war for freedom, once again, everything depends on our unity. Can cinema stay outside of this unity?” Zelenskyy said. He referred to the power of cinema during World War II, including the 1940 Chaplin film The Great Dictator which mocked Nazi leader Adolf Hitler. Chaplin’s dictator did not destroy the real dictator, but thanks to cinema, thanks to that film, cinema did not stay quiet, Zelenskyy said, underscoring the need for cinema taking up political positions. His final message was: “We need a new Chaplin to prove today that cinema is not mute.”

His speech received a standing ovation from the crowd in the southern French resort town’s Palais des Festivals.

But, there were contrary noises as well about the festival’s ban on official Russian entries. And that too from a film director from Russia itself, Serebrennikov, who has been invited to the festival for his persistent stand against Putin. For this he was kept in house arrest and released only weeks before the Cannes festival. He sparked off a controversy in a 19 May Press conference when he said, “We should not boycott language, we should not boycott Dostoyevsky, Chekhov, Tchaikovsky, deprive people of music, theatre, cinema. On the contrary, this is what makes people feel alive.” In the same breath he emphasised he could fully understand the people’s anger who are so pained and hurt by what is happening in Russia. He has called the war in Ukraine a “total catastrophe” and believes that art has no frontiers.

Another film, a documentary, Mariupolis 2, selected for special screening, is on the armed conflict in the Ukrainian city of Mariupol. The Lithuanian director Mantas Kvedaravicius was allegedly killed by Russian forces when he was making the documentary in Mariupol, which had, till recently, been facing the brunt of Russian attack. His fiancée, Hanna Bilobrova, who was with him in Mariupol, was able to bring back the footage filmed and edited it.

The festival, almost in keeping with its spirit of political activism, witnessed an unidentified woman appearing on the red carpet. Seconds later she ripped off her gown, revealing the Ukraine flag painted on her bare chest with the words “stop raping us” written on her abdomen while other parts of her body flashed red handprints. The woman kept yelling, “Don’t rape us!” as security quickly encircled her and took her off the red carpet.

Such acts prove that politics has always been a part of human existence and the borderline between art and politics is blurred.

Symploce

Symploce is a combination of anaphora and epistrophe. The first of these, anaphora, has more than one sense; in this case it refers to an oratorical device by which the first words of a section of prose are repeated. Hillary Clinton’s speech to the 1996 Democratic National Convention is a good example: “To raise a happy, healthy, and hopeful child, it takes a family; it takes teachers; it takes clergy; it takes business people; it takes community leaders; it takes those who protect our health and safety. It takes all of us.” In epistrophe the repetition occurs at the end of phrases. One of the best-known examples is in Abraham Lincoln’s famous Gettysburg Address in which he speaks of government “of the people, by the people, for the people.” Another appears in Paul’s first letter to the Corinthians in the King James’s Bible: “When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child.” With symploce, the repetition occurs at both the beginnings and the ends of lines. A much-quoted example is in Anne Morrow Lindbergh’s book of 1955, Gift from the Sea: “Perhaps this is the most important thing for me to take back from beach-living: simply the memory that each cycle of the tide is valid, each cycle of the wave is valid, each cycle of a relationship is valid.” All three words derive from Greek, though not altogether obviously. Anaphora combines ana-, back, with pherein, to bear (in other words, to repeat); epistrophe is from epistrephein, to turn around; symploce derives from symplekein, to weave together.

THE GLOBAL HUNGER CRISIS

Global food prices are soaring. The United Nations Food and Agriculture Organisation’s Food Price Index – which covers a basket of basic food commodities (cereals, meat, dairy, vegetable oils, and sugar) – reached an all-time high of 159.7 in March, up from 141.1 the previous month. While it declined slightly in April, to 158.5, ongoing developments – not least Russia’s war in Ukraine – are set to keep driving prices to new highs, with devastating implications for global hunger.

The COVID-19 pandemic exposed the fragility and dysfunctionality of the world’s food systems, with movement restrictions and supply-chain disruptions driving up prices, damaging rural livelihoods, and exacerbating food insecurity, especially for the poor. Now, the war in Ukraine is compounding these challenges, because both sides are major exporters of food, fuel, and fertilizer.

Moreover, climate change poses an even larger threat to global food security. Already, extreme weather like heatwaves, floods, and prolonged droughts has triggered shocks to agricultural production and food availability. As temperatures rise, these shocks will become increasingly frequent and powerful. If global warming crosses the 1.5° Celsius threshold (relative to Earth’s pre-industrial temperature), they are likely to become catastrophic.

As the latest Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change report shows, avoiding the threshold will require immediate and drastic action. But mitigation is only part of the challenge. Large-scale investments in adaptation will also be needed to protect vulnerable communities from the warming that is already locked in.

Even under the most optimistic mitigation scenario, global warming is expected to hit the 1.5°C threshold in a decade, before receding. This will result in shifts in climatic zones, rising sea levels, and disruptions to the water cycle that increase the frequency and intensity of extreme weather. Beyond raising economic and

health risks, the resulting disruptions to food and water supplies are likely to drive social and political upheaval, fueling a vicious cycle of poverty, hunger, instability, and even conflict, accompanied by sharp rise in migration.

A more resilient, sustainable, and equitable food system must be a pillar of any climate mitigation or adaptation agenda. But the barriers to building such a system should not be underestimated, especially for countries and regions where soil is poor; land has little agricultural value, other natural resources, such as water, are limited or degraded, and socioeconomic conditions are difficult.

Given the low productivity of their agricultural land, such marginal environments are unable to support the sustainable production

of sufficient food to meet local people’s nutritional needs. In fact, while marginal environments are home to less than 25% of the global population – an estimated 1.7 billion people – they account for 70% of the world’s poor and most of its malnourished.

Poverty and hunger can lead farmers to overuse fragile environmental resources in order to ensure their short-term survival, even at the cost of long-term depletion of their lands and impoverishment of their households and communities. Those living in remote areas with minimal infrastructure, few alternative economic opportunities, and limited market access are particularly likely to make such choices.

Given this, countries with significant marginal lands rely on food imports – in some cases for

more than 80% of their needs. But pandemic- and war-related disruptions, together with the price increases they have fueled, have shown just how vulnerable such countries are. According to the FAO’s State of Food and Agriculture 2021 report, an additional 161 million people were affected by hunger in 2020, compared with 2019. And the World Food Programme is now cautioning that the combination of conflict, COVID, the climate crisis, and rising costs has pushed 44 million people in 38 countries to the edge of famine.

With countries struggling to secure enough food to meet their populations’ nutritional needs, many are now re-evaluating their food dependencies and seeking to expand local production. But unless sustainability is taken into account, efforts to increase short-term resilience by shortening supply chains could undermine medium- and long-term resilience by further depleting agricultural resources like soil and water.

Sustainability isn’t cheap. Efficient production amid biophysical and climate constraints requires investment in costly technologies. But poor governance structures, limited growth prospects, and high debts pose major challenges for many countries. The pandemic has placed massive strain on public budgets, and debt crises loom for many governments, as loans taken out to address the pandemic come due.

Poor and vulnerable countries cannot be expected to address the myriad interconnected challenges they face, from pollution and biodiversity loss to hunger and poverty, without help. To bolster long-term food and nutritional security, we must look beyond country-level solutions to regional and international ones that consider the needs of communities living in marginal environments. Otherwise, there will be no escaping destabilising cycles of hunger, migration, and violence.

Temple economy: \$4 billion at stake!

The temple economy is as large as the Indian budget sustaining the country. Its contours across religious denominations of Hindu, Muslim and Christians, are much wider than perceived. This is changing society and its financial parameters. An NSSO survey estimates that temple economy is worth ₹3.02 lakh crore or about \$40 billion and 2.32 per cent of the GDP. In reality it may be larger. It includes everything - flowers, oil, lamps, perfumes, bangles, vermilion, images and puja clothes.

Donations in 2021 collected for the Ram Temple in Ayodhya were ₹5450 crore, almost equal to ₹5000 crore of the country’s defence budget. Others are Tirumala Tirupati ₹3023 crore; Vaishno Devi ₹2000 crore, Ambaji ₹4134 crore (₹5163 crore in 2019-20), Dwarkadhish ₹1172 crore, Somnath ₹1205, Golden Temple ₹690 crore. Donations to Kamakhya temple in Guwahati; Krishna Janmabhoomi, Mathura; Banke Bihari Mandir in Vrindavan, Padmanabha mandir, Siddhivinayak mandir and Kashi Vishvanath mandir have similar huge earnings.

The Pew Global Attitude sur-

vey reveals that over 25 per cent of Indians are reported to have become more religious over the past four-five years. Between 2007 and 2015, the share of respondents in India, who perceived religion to be very important, increased by 11 per cent to 80 per cent now.

It can be said that the Ram Mandir movement and the court verdict have been a game changer. It has poured in huge funding into a region that was one of the most backward. It boosted funding for mosques and Islamic shrines as well. During the pandemic the silent real estate boom took place in Ayodhya, Varanasi, Vindhyachal, Mirzapur and Mathura. Land prices soared in the most backward places and the premium on land is unprecedented.

Whether religious activities can sustain such places would be interesting to observe. The enthusiasm is high but would it surpass the next industrial revival? Domestic religious tourism is surpassing the number of foreign visitors. Over 100 crore domestic visits to new destinations suggest there is a churning beyond the Delhi-Agra-Jaipur golden triangle. Even 20 per cent of nine crore foreign tourists are visiting Madurai and

Mahabalipuram in Tamil Nadu and Tirupati, in Andhra Pradesh.

The NSSO figures suggest that 55 per cent of Hindus undertake religious pilgrimages, patronising mid and small sized hotels, after two years of the pandemic slump. This NSSO data says that Indians do more pilgrimage than business trips and spend more on pilgrimage than traveling for education purpose.

The government has chalked out religious circuit tourism. The Ramayana circuit is over the life philosophy of Lord Ram. Along with this, the Char Dham road project has also been prepared. The government has also strengthened the Buddha circuit. Apart from this, Prime Minister Narendra Modi relaunched the Varanasi corridor, Kedardham and Badridham. Not only this, the government is renovating about 50,000 temples in Jammu and Kashmir. No other Prime Minister made a visit to religious shrines an event. Indira Gandhi used to visit such places and saints but often kept it low profile, perhaps even at the dead of night, away from the public glare.

The dargahs of Chisti, Aulia, Charar-e-Sharif, Jama Masjid of

Bhopal, Delhi and other shrines have large income in cash and kind. Similarly various churches have decent incomes. The enormous ‘donations’ reaching various small and big organisations are used for many activities in places like Haridwar, Vrindavan, Ayodhya and Ujjain and even non-descript places such as Deoband. One particular activity is to launder the funds by issuing donation cheques at cuts of 20 to 60 per cent depending on the exigencies. It ensures that illicit or non-tax paid money is channelled back to the system. Many institutions have a “secular” approach in dealing with money. During demonetisation some heads of mutts were in the news for their wide connections and effective delivery. Their services were not limited to India alone. They could deliver new currency notes with ease even in dollars to Dubai, Canada, England or other destinations at premium price. The hawala linkages helped. Plus, they are good at balance sheet manipulations for whatever the amount may be for turning black into white. Even scrapped notes were equally exchanged with élan. Adjusting ‘murky’ money is no longer difficult.

Boost soil health

4 robbers nabbed

Gurugram: A crime branch unit of Gurugram police nabbed four robbers including two juveniles for looting over Rs 6.64 lakh from a cash collection agent, the police said Sunday. The police have recovered Rs 4.8 lakh, 2 iPhones, clothes, shoes, documents and a motorcycle used in the crime. According to the police, the complainant told the police that on Saturday around 3.40 p.m., he was going to Udyog Vihar after collecting cash. When he reached Belvedere Rapid Metro Station, three men riding a motorcycle snatched his bag which contained Rs 6, 64,413 cash, his wallet and other belongings.

50 sheep killed

Srinagar: A total of 50 sheep were killed when lightning struck the flock in J&K's Ganderbal district Sunday, officials said. District administration sources said that local shepherd, Abdul Salam Chopan of Haknar village in Gund area of Ganderbal, had taken out his animals for grazing when lightning hit the area during rains. "Fifty sheep were killed in this incident. Rescue teams were deputed to the area," a source said.

6 die, 7.2 lakh hit

Guwahati: The flood situation in Assam deteriorated on Sunday with six more persons, including two children, losing their lives and nearly 7.2 lakh people coming under the impact of the deluge across 22 districts. According to the daily flood report of the Assam State Disaster Management Authority (ASDMA), four persons drowned in Kamrup revenue circle of Nagaon district. One person at Doboka in Hojai district and a child at Silchar in Cachar district, too, died due to the flood, it said.

Room sealed with foils, suicide note affixed on wall

New Delhi, May 22: As investigations continued Sunday into the triple suicide case in Delhi, more details have come to the fore.

Saturday, a 55-year-old woman and her two daughters aged 30 and 26 years were found dead at their House no.207, Vasant Apartment, Vasant Vihar. The deceased were identified as Manju Srivastava (mother) and two daughters -- Anshika and Anku.

Deputy Commissioner of Police (southwest) Manoj C said a local resident made a PCR call at Vasant Vihar police station around 8.55 p.m. Saturday stating that the said house is locked from inside and the people are not opening the door.

The police immediately swung into action and the Station House Officer along with other staff reached the spot and found the doors and windows closed on all sides, and the flat locked from inside. "The police managed to open the door and found that a gas cylinder was partially opened and there was also a suicide note," the DCP said.

As the police went further to check the rooms, they found three bodies lying on the bed, along with

four small traditional hearths.

The room was completely sealed with foils to prevent the fumes from the hearth leaving the room, making it impossible for the three women to escape the toxic fumes, just like a 'gas chamber death'. "Most likely they died due to suffocation," the senior official said.

It was also learnt that the a few pages of the suicide note were affixed on the wall of the room, however, the police refrained to share the content. "The content and veracity of the note are yet to be verified and are still under investigation," the official said, adding the inquest proceedings have been initiated.

The preliminary probe revealed that the owner of the house, Umesh Srivastava died in April 2021 due to Covid and since then the family was in depression as the mother, Manju, was bedridden due to illness. Though there are three casualties in this particular incident, yet, it has brought the horrific memories of the Burari suicide case in which 11 members of a family died by suicide in 2018. Ten people were found hanged, while the oldest family member, the grandmother, was strangled

Kolkata, May 22: Bringing an end to all speculations and in another jolt to the BJP, BJP's Barrackpore MP Arjun Singh rejoined West Bengal's Trinamool Congress Sunday evening.

He was greeted back into the party by Trinamool General Secretary Abhishek Banerjee at the party office at Camac Street

in central Kolkata. Other top Trinamool leaders, MLAs, and ministers from the North 24 Parganas district were present on the occasion.

The development comes as another setback for the BJP against the backdrop of the West Bengal Panchayat polls in 2023 and the Lok Sabha polls in 2024, as Singh was an important pillar in expanding its organisational base in North 24 Parganas district, especially in the Barrackpore, area since 2019.

Speculations were rife for quite some time that Singh might come back to Trinamool as he continued with his salvos against the Union government on the issue of fixing the price of jute. Recently Singh also became vocal against the state leadership of BJP claiming that the latter has become social media-oriented instead of focusing on grassroots level organisation.

Union Textiles Minister Piyush Goyal and BJP's national President J.P. Nadda even had separate meet-



ings with Singh in New Delhi to address his grievances. However, as the latest developments show, those did not prove to be fruitful.

After rejoining, Singh said that he had switched over the BJP in 2019 after misunderstandings with Trinamool leadership.

"But after joining BJP, I faced hurdles in acting independently as an elected Lok Sabha member from the state. I tried hard to settle the jute price issue and there too

I faced hurdles. So, I decided to join back...", he said.

Asked whether he would resign as a Lok Sabha member on moral grounds, Singh said that currently there are two Lok Sabha members from Bengal, who are officially Trinamool MPs, but are actually with the BJP.

"The day these two MPs resign on moral grounds, I will also resign within an hour and face fresh elections," he said.

His clear hints were towards the Leader of Opposition in Assembly, Suwendu Adhikari's father, Sisir Adhikari, the Trinamool MP from Kanthi and brother, Dibyendu Adhikari, the Trinamool MP from Tamluk. Both these constituencies are in East Midnapore district.

Reacting to Arjun Singh's exit, BJP's national Vice President, Dilip Ghosh said that Singh was unable to bear the administrative and police pressure on him since the time he was elected on behalf of the BJP from Barrackpore.

SUV CRASH KILLS 8 IN UP

Siddharthnagar (UP), May 22: An SUV carrying a marriage party rammed into a stationary truck here killing eight people and injuring three, police said Sunday.

The incident occurred around 1 am near Katya village in the Jogia Udaypur area. The SUV was returning to Mahla village from a wedding ceremony at Mahuwara in Shivanagar, they said. Of the 11 people travelling in the car, four died on the spot and others were rushed to a hospital, where four more died during treatment.

Those killed have been identified as Sachin Pal (16), Mukesh Pal (35), Lalaram Paswan (26), Shiv Sagar (18), Ravi Paswan (19), Pintu Gupta (25), Ram Baran (35), and driver Gaurav Maurya (22), police said. Ram Baran was admitted to the medical college in Gorakhpur where he died.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi condoled the loss of lives in the accident and announced an ex gratia of Rs 2 lakh each for the kin of the deceased.



"The road accident in Siddharthnagar, Uttar Pradesh, is very painful. My condolences are with the bereaved families. May God give them the strength to bear this immense sorrow," Modi was quoted as saying by his office.

The prime minister also wished a speedy recovery to all the injured. "The prime minister has announced an ex gratia of Rs 2 lakh each from PMNRF for the next of kin of those who lost their lives in an accident in Siddharthnagar, UP. The injured would be given Rs 50,000 each," the Prime Minister's Office said in a tweet.

Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath has also condoled the death and directed officials to ensure the best treatment for the injured.

Farmers can change govt, says KCR

29 children in MP, 14 in Raj went missing per day in 2021: Report

The report revealed that the number of missing girls in Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan was reported five times higher than that of boys in 2021

New Delhi, May 22: On an average, 29 children in Madhya Pradesh and 14 in Rajasthan went missing every day in 2021, according to a new report of child rights NGO CRY, which revealed that there was a significant increase in the number of missing children cases in four major states of north India.

Also, five children went missing per day in Delhi in 2021 in eight police districts, according to the "Status Report on Missing Children"

report of Child Rights and You (CRY), which also said on an average, eight children -- six girls and two boys -- went missing per day from 58 districts of Uttar Pradesh.

The report revealed that the number of missing girls in Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan was reported five times higher than that of boys in 2021. While 8,751 cases of missing children were registered in Madhya Pradesh and 3,179 in Rajasthan (National Crime Records Bureau, 2020), the figures increased to 10,648 in Madhya



Pradesh and 5,354 in Rajasthan in 2021, as revealed by the state governments in response to RTI applications filed by the CRY's part-

ner organisations.

The data received from Madhya Pradesh shows that the number of missing girls over a period of 11

months is about five times higher than that of the boys. The data collected through RTI applications shows that the top five districts in terms of number of missing children are Indore, Bhopal, Dhar, Jabalpur and Rewa.

"On an average, 29 children, including 24 girls and five boys, went missing per day from Madhya Pradesh," the report said. A total of 2,998 children -- 835 boys and 2,163 girls -- were reported missing in Uttar Pradesh in 2021 (data of 58 of the 75 districts). About

88.9 per cent of the children reported missing in the state belonged to the age group of 12-18 years. The data shows that the top five districts in Uttar Pradesh in terms of number of missing children are Lucknow, Moradabad, Kanpur Nagar, Meerut and Maharajganj. The report said five children went missing per day in Delhi in 2021 in the districts for which data was available and a total of 1,641 children were reported missing in eight districts of the national capital in 2021.

Delhi's illegal factories ticking time bombs

New Delhi, May 22: Those who are not residents of Delhi get astonished whenever they walk down the narrow streets of the national capital's congested areas and suddenly encounter a small-scale industry.

People usually visualise a factory as a big building in an open space with a chimney on the top, but, the reality bites in Delhi, and one wonders why these are not on the radar of bulldozers.

The city is the epicentre of thousands of such factories which are ticking time bombs. When IANS compiled the data of major fire accidents that have occurred in the past couple of years, the factories being run without fire safety standards were found to be a substantial part of such incidents.

Twenty seven human lives perished May 13 in one of the deadliest tragedies the national capital has seen in the recent years. A massive fire gutted a four-storey building near a metro station, charring to



death 27 and wounding 12 in west Delhi's Mundka.

In December 2019, 44 died after a fire broke out in an illegal factory at Anaj Mandi. A firecracker storage unit in Bawana killed 17 persons, including 10 women, in January 2018. If we do not go by the number of casualties, then fire breaks out every now and then in some Delhi factory.

Every year, the Delhi Fire Service provides a Fire No Objection Certificate (NOC) to around 50-70 factories, however, several still run unnoticed. A senior fire depart-

ment official told IANS that they do not directly deal with the public to provide an NOC.

"We are not a licensing authority to do that. It is the duty of the building authority or the civic agency to refer the case to us before permitting or giving a license to a building or even a factory," the official said.

Most of the buildings gutted in fire incidents lack fire safety standards and most importantly a Fire NOC. A Fire NOC certifies that a building complies with the fire prevention and fire safety require-

ments in accordance with Rule 33 of the Delhi Fire Service Rules.

Delhi Fire Service chief Atul Garg, while speaking to IANS, informed that till now 42 people have died in May alone while 117 have suffered injuries. The casualties in previous years during the month of May are 41 in 2021, 10 in 2020 and 18 in 2019.

Clearly, the numbers have risen

when compared to the previous years. Not just the number of casualties, the Fire calls also soared by 49 per cent this year in May.

In 2020, as many as 1,432 calls were received till May 19 while this year so far 2,145 calls were attended by the DFS, i.e. over 2,000 incidents were reported in just the first 19 days of the month.

Delhi Fire Service is constantly upgrading itself both technically and manually, but the rising levels of temperature and population of the workers in the alleged factories are adding to the woes. Every year, lakhs of poor people come to Delhi to improve their living conditions and finally get trapped in these factories as workers.

The gut-wrenching audio clip of a phone call between two brothers, where the one who was trapped inside the building told the other that he won't survive and to take care of his family, during the Anaj Mandi blaze in 2019 was a wakeup call for the authorities but even now, three years later, such incidents continue to happen.

Gehlot approval to new urban job scheme rules

Jaipur, May 22: Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot has approved new guidelines for the implementation of the 'Indira Gandhi Shahari Rozgar Yojana'.

The scheme, intended to provide employment in urban areas on the lines of the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA), was announced by Gehlot in the 2022-23 budget.

Under the new urban employment scheme, 100 days of employment per year will be provided to the families residing in urban areas. The state government will spend Rs 800 crore per year on this ambitious scheme, an official statement said.

According to the new guidelines, under the scheme, the people in the age group of 18 to 60 years residing in the urban local body area

Delhi 'won't get' extra water from HP & UP

New Delhi, May 22: Uttar Pradesh and Himachal Pradesh have "backed out" from plans to give extra water to Delhi, while Haryana is not keen to pursue a water exchange proposal with the national capital, according to officials.

Proposals involving Himachal Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh were being pursued since 2019. The two states pulled out around six to eight months ago, they said.

Delhi had a plan to exchange 140 million gallons a day (MGD) of treated wastewater for freshwater from Uttar Pradesh.

"Uttar Pradesh said it could share 270 cusecs of water from the Ganga through the Murad Nagar regulator and Delhi had promised to release an equal amount of treated wastewater to UP from Okhla for irrigation purposes. After multiple meetings and field inspections, Uttar Pradesh wrote to us around six months ago that the idea has been dropped," an official said on condition of anonymity. The Centre was in favour of the proposal but Uttar Pradesh denied it. They did not give any reason for doing so, he said.

Delhi also held deliberations with Haryana on a proposal to share 20 MGD of treated wastewater for irrigation through Jaunti and Auchandi regulators in lieu of freshwater through Carrier Lined Canal (CLC) and Delhi Sub Branch (DSB). "Haryana has not agreed to the proposal yet. There is a very slim chance of it happening now," the official said.

Another official said the proposal for a water exchange with

Haryana is pending at the level of the Upper Yamuna River Board.

Delhi generates around 770 MGD of wastewater. The 34 sewage treatment plants located at 20 locations across the city treat up to 570 MGD of sewage. Around 90 MGD of treated wastewater is being utilised for horticulture in parks and forests, irrigation and DTC depots. The capital is obligated to release 267 MGD of treated wastewater into the Yamuna to maintain the environmental flow.

In December 2019, Himachal Pradesh signed a MoU to sell its share of Yamuna water to Delhi at Rs 21 crore per annum. Water had to be delivered at Tajewala, Haryana, to Delhi.

According to a statement released at that time, Himachal Pradesh was supposed to "provide regular, daily supply of 368 cusecs (198 MGD) from November to February and 268 cusecs (144 MGD) from March to June every year".

According to a multi-state agreement signed in 1994, Himachal Pradesh gets a three per cent share of Yamuna water. This share has remained unclaimed since then.

It was Haryana which had first opposed the Himachal Pradesh's plan to sell its share of Yamuna water to Delhi. Haryana contended that its "canals did not have the capacity to carry extra water from Himachal Pradesh to Delhi", another official said.

Thereafter, Himachal Pradesh also "backed out" from the agreement around six months ago. An official said, "Our engineers worked really hard to turn these plans into reality, but the neighbouring states backed out due to political reasons."

Children at Delhi landfills have little to do but sort litter

New Delhi, May 22: Despite Sarva Shiksha and Beti Padhao Beti Bachao Abhiyan, thousands of children in the national capital are living in garbage dumps with no future in sight. These children run their homes with garbage. While they may stand explained by the Utilitarian principle, it is the apathy of the government towards this class that is hollowing out a progressive society.

This issue, however, is not new. Many incidents of fire in landfill sites of Delhi have made headlines. It is mostly children who work at these landfills, picking up plastic, iron and other metal pieces, and anything else of any value in the market. This is a means of livelihood for these children and their families.

Delhi has 3 large litter 'hills' at Okhla, Bhalswa, and Ghazipur landfill sites around which, slums have been built. There are 40-50 huts near each garbage hill which is home to children that work in these landfills. Even while the garbage hill is on fire, these children continue to work as usual, knowing well that the gases released are toxic and suffocating. One can barely imagine how difficult it must be to choose between being hungry and breathing healthy. As the saying goes, the finest steel has to go through the hottest fire, but the future of these children in this fire has no end in sight.

Toxic gases like methane and hydrogen sulfide keep emanating from the garbage. When they burn,

carbon dioxide and carbon monoxide are also released. Methane is flammable.

A similar fire broke out at Bhalswa garbage mound and blazed for two weeks at stretch. The 12-year-old Satara residing there said that he studied till class VI but has been working as a waste-picker for the last two years. After the death of his parents, he quit studies and began working to run his household and get his sister married.

Neha, a resident of Ghazipur slum, said that she has been doing this work for the last 3 years. The 8-year-old Neha has never been to school. Her elder sister worked as a waste-picker earlier and Neha joined her at the garbage mound every day, picking up iron and plastic.

Many claims have been made by Delhi and Central governments regarding eradication of poverty, education, and health. Yet, 14-year-old Manju could never study, despite being very desirous of going to school because no school admitted her. Her entire family also is engaged in picking and sorting waste from sun rise to sunset.

These kids spend all day at the garbage dump and have remained too distant from books. Delhi and the Central government claim their respective figures. The Delhi government has announced the opening of 11 more schools in the Budget for the year 2022. This year, the maximum chunk of the Budget (Rs 16,278 crore) has been allocated for education. According to the ruling Aam Aadmi Party in Delhi, the standard of education in Delhi has improved in the last few years.

According to the Central government, under the Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan, children between 6-14 years of age have a Fundamental Right to Education. The Ministry of Women and Child Development has also started many schemes to provide education to poor girls.

Opening up more schools and devising means of education for these children have so far not done enough to secure their future. The truth is that these children need the support of the society to undertake the journey from mountains of garbage to a school.

dinosaur bone, shark teeth, big diamonds and the "Floating Stones" used by Lord Ram and his army to build the "Ram Setu" to Lanka.

Patna: Four teenagers, all sons of police personnel, drowned in the Ganga river off Patna's LCT Ghat Sunday, police said. The four were part of six teenagers who went to the river banks at LCT Ghat under Buddha Colony police station to play cricket in the morning. The accident occurred around 11.30 a.m. "There were six teenagers, all belonging to police families, who went to the LCT Ghat to play cricket. After the end of the game, five of them decided to take a bath in the river. While bathing, one of them started drowning. Four others who were in the river tried to save him but they also started drowning. One of the victims managed to swim out but the other four disappeared in the water," Buddha Colony SHO, Nihar Bhushan, said.

Racket busted

New Delhi: Delhi Police has busted an Indian Premier League (IPL) gambling racket and arrested six people in connection, an official said Sunday. Furnishing details, Deputy Commissioner of Police (outer district) Sameer Sharma said a tip-off was received May 15 that gambling activities on the IPL cricket matches were going on at Chander Vihar, Phase-III, Nihal Vihar and if timely raid be conducted they can be arrested red-handed.

Locals loot oil

Palghar: A tanker carrying edible oil overturned on the busy Mumbai-Ahmedabad highway here in Maharashtra, disrupting traffic movement on the road for about three hours, police said Sunday. After the accident took place on Saturday, a number of locals rushed to the spot and looted the oil overflowing from the tanker, they said. The driver of the tanker, carrying 12,000 litres of edible oil for processing from Surat in Gujarat to neighbouring Mumbai, lost control over the wheels near Tawa village. As a result, the vehicle overturned and the oil leaked from it.

ENCOUNTER KILLINGS

New Delhi, May 22: The alleged encounter killing of four suspects in the gang-rape and murder case of a veterinarian in Hyderabad in 2019 is not the only incident where fingers have been pointed out at the police, with there being several other such instances including the 2009 Dehradun encounter case that left an MBA student dead and the 1997 Connaught Place shootout in which two people were killed.

Recently, a three-member inquiry commission headed by a retired Supreme Court judge on the Hyderabad encounter submitted that the firing by the police personnel was allegedly deliberate and that three of the deceased were minor at the time of death.

Some of the other encounters where police officials have been

found on the wrong side of the law either by a commission or a court, include that of Sadiq Jamal, who was shot dead by Gujarat Police.

In 2003, the Gujarat Police shot dead Jamal, claiming to have information that he was planning an attack on the then Chief Minister Narendra Modi and other top BJP leaders. According to an investigation by the CBI, not only was Jamal shot dead by the police in an alleged fake encounter, but also that the Intelligence Bureau played a role in it. Many police inspectors and top IB officials were questioned and later accused in the case of his 'encounter'.

In 2006, Tulsiram Prajapati, known to be an associate of Sohrabuddin Sheikh, was killed in an alleged fake encounter. According to the CBI, Prajapati was with Sheikh and Kausar Bi



when the Gujarat Police caught them. Prajapati was shown to be arrested in Rajasthan and later killed. Similarly, Sohrabuddin Sheikh, who the Gujarat Police claimed was also a terrorist, was killed in an alleged fake encounter by the Gujarat and Rajasthan police in 2005.

His wife Kausar Bi disappeared, and was alleged to have been elim-

inated by police.

In December 2018, a special court in Mumbai had acquitted all the 22 accused, including 21 policemen in the case. In the case of Ishrat Jahan, who was killed along with Javed Shaikh, Amjadali Akbarali Rana and Zeeshan Johar by Gujarat Police in an encounter near Ahmedabad in June 15, 2004, the police had claimed that the four were terrorists who were planning to assassinate then Gujarat Chief Minister Modi.

A high court-appointed Special Investigation Team concluded that the encounter of Ishrat Jahan was "fake".

However, a special court in Ahmedabad discharged three police officials in the case in March 2021. Ram Narayan Gupta alias 'Lakhan Bhैया', who was allegedly an aide to gangster Chhota Rajan, was shot

dead in 2006 by the Mumbai Police when he was picked up from Vashi and killed in a purportedly staged encounter in Versova.

Following the encounter, a Mumbai sessions court had sentenced 21 people, including 13 policemen, to life imprisonment in 2013 for killing Gupta while holding them guilty of conspiring and kidnapping him. However, one of the accused, encounter specialist Pradeep Sharma, was acquitted.

Another case which grabbed headlines was that of MBA student Ranbir Singh.

In this encounter case, the Delhi High Court in February 2018 had upheld a trial court's order convicting and awarding life terms to seven policemen for killing the 22-year-old in a staged shootout in Dehradun in 2009, while describing the matter as "a tragic case."



Committee formed to probe tunnel collapse

New Delhi, May 22: The Centre has constituted a committee of 3 independent experts to investigate the reasons for recent collapse of a part of under-construction tunnel in Ramban on Jammu-Srinagar highway and suggest remedial measures.



State-owned National Highways Authority of India (NHAI) has already initiated process to handle such emergency situation and also taking all possible measures to avoid such incidents in future, an official statement said Sunday.

A committee of 3 independent eminent experts has been constituted by the central government which has already moved to the site to investigate the reasons for slide/collapse and remedial measures thereof... Further action will be taken based on report of committee," it said.

According to the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways (MoRTH) office order, Professor J T Sahu of IIT Delhi will be the chairman of the committee, and it will submit the report to the ministry within 10 days.

Dominica drops illegal entry charges against Mehul Choksi

New Delhi, May 22: In a relief to PNB bank scam accused diamondaire Mehul Choksi, the Dominica government has dropped "all charges" related to his mysterious unlawful entry from Antigua and Barbuda in May last year, according to his spokesperson from London.



Choksi was taken into custody in Dominica, the Caribbean island country, in May last year after he went missing from Antigua and Barbuda where he had taken citizenship before allegedly escaping from India to avoid charges of orchestrating Rs 13,500 crore scam in Punjab National Bank in which his nephew Nirav Modi is a co-accused.

He was left on bail after 51 days by the Dominica High Court there. During the period, India made desperate attempts to bring him back with a CBI team stationed there with a private jet. His lawyers however had alleged that he was abducted from Antigua by "Indian looking men" who had brought him to Dominica.

Role of police under scanner in several cases

New Delhi, May 22: The second in-person Quad Leaders' Summit in Japan will provide an opportunity for leaders of four countries to review the progress of the grouping's initiatives and exchange views on developments in the Indo-Pacific as well as on global issues of mutual interest, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said Sunday.

In his departure statement ahead of his visit to Japan from May 23-24, Modi said during his visit he will also hold a bilateral meeting with US President Joe Biden, where they will discuss further consolidation of the multi-faceted bilateral relations.

"We will also continue our dialogue on regional developments and contemporary global issues," he said. Modi said he will be visiting Tokyo at the invitation of his Japanese counterpart Fumio Kishida, and noted that in March 2022, he had hosted Kishida for the 14th India-Japan Annual Summit.

"During my visit to Tokyo, I look forward to continuing our conversation further, with an aim to strengthen the India-Japan Special Strategic and Global Partnership," he said. In Japan, Modi said, he will also participate in the second in-person Quad Leaders' Summit, which will provide an opportunity for the leaders of the four Quad countries to



review the progress of initiatives taken by the grouping. "We will also exchange views about developments in the Indo-Pacific region and global issues of mutual interest," Modi said.

The Quadrilateral Security Dialogue comprises India, the US, Japan and Australia. Modi also noted that the newly-elected Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese will be joining the Quad Leaders' Summit for the first time.

"I look forward to a bilateral meeting with him during which the multifaceted cooperation between India and Australia under the Comprehensive Strategic Partnership, and regional and global issues of mutual interest will be discussed," Modi said. In his statement, the prime minister also said economic cooperation between India and Japan is an im-

Noting that Japan is home to nearly 40,000 members of the Indian diaspora, who are an important anchor in our relations with Japan, Modi said he looks forward to interacting with them.

Prime Minister Modi's visit to Japan on May 23 and 24 to attend the summit is taking place under the shadow of the Russia-Ukraine conflict.

Delayed Ayodhya visit after sensing trap: Raj

Woman ends life in Gujarat police station

Rajkot (Gujarat), May 22: A married woman committed suicide in a police station in Gujarat's Rajkot early on Sunday after she was summoned to record her statement, police said.

Nayna, who was in her late 20s, was summoned by the Aji Dam police station Saturday evening to

record her statement in connection with some offence. On Sunday morning, she requested that she be allowed to freshen up, went to women's toilet in the police station, and hanged herself, Deputy Commissioner of Police, Zone-1, Praveen Kumar Meena, said.

The official also revealed that Nayna had an extra-marital affair with Mukesh, who is arrested by the Aji Dam police under the Indian Penal Code for voluntarily causing hurt with a dangerous weapon, and it was in this connection, she was called for recording her statement.

Though the process was completed around 8 p.m. on Saturday, the woman, fearing that if she returned home late night, her husband will inquire and may scold her, so she decided to stay back in the police station overnight, and in morning, she committed suicide.

But sources say that the decision to send Pradhan was taken as part of BJP's exercise to contact some of the Chief Ministers as part of garnering support for the Presidential candidates. Though the NDA has more than 45% votes in the kitty and if it gets the support of the regional parties, it will cross the hump very easily.

VP post: Anandiben in race

There is a growing feeling that a woman will be made Vice President this time. Insiders say that Anandiben Patel has a bigger claim to the post among other women candidates. She was removed as Chief Minister of Gujarat prematurely and PM Modi inducted her as Governor of Madhya Pradesh and later shifted to UP. She belongs to the powerful Patel community. BJP desperately needs Patidar votes in Gujarat Assembly polls. There are reports that powerful Patel leader from Gujarat, Naresh Patel may join the Congress. He has not opened his cards so far. But the BJP is also wooing him. If he goes to the Congress or AAP, then BJP has reasons to worry. Bhupendra Patel, Gujarat's new CM has not been able to make any mark in the state. Therefore, the importance of Anandiben Patel has gained ground.

100 Cong rebels in line?

After a gentle rebuff to the Group of 23 leaders at the Chintan Shivir where none of their key demands was accepted, the battle lines seem to have been drawn. The dissidents may at best wait until May 31, the last date of filing nomination for the 57 Rajya Sabha seats. Ghulam Nabi Azad, Anand Sharma, Kapil Sibal, Vivek Tankha and many others are waiting to hear from the high command about their re-nomination. Sonia Gandhi has already told partymen that the party has given them enough and now it's time to repay the debt. The hint is clear. Meanwhile, the BJP has a twin strategy to give the Congress a body blow. Sources in the BJP say that it wants a ginger group of 100 leaders to be formed first. This non-

political forum will raise issues of importance to embarrass the Gandhis.

One RS seat, 3 claimants

After sulking for the past two years, a former Haryana Chief Minister Bhupinder Singh Hooda finally got the command of the state from the Gandhis. He succeeded and succeeded in dislodging Kumari Selja with his protégé Uday Bhan Haryana Congress Chief. He himself is Congress Legislature Party leader and his son is a sitting Rajya Sabha MP. After consolidating his position, Hooda now wants the high command that the Rajya Sabha seat be given to either senior party leader Anand Sharma or another non-Jat leader. On the other hand, Selja is saying that she has quit her PCC post and needs to be compensated with a Rajya Sabha seat. The biennial polls for the two Rajya Sabha seats in Haryana is due this month end.

Israel reports 1st monkeypox case

Tel Aviv: Israeli authorities say they have detected the country's first case of monkeypox in a man who returned from abroad and were looking into other suspected cases. Israel's Health Ministry said late Saturday the man was in a Tel Aviv hospital in good condition. It called on anyone returning from abroad with fever and lesions to see a doctor.

Tourist plane crashes, 5 dead

Paris: A tourist plane crashed near the town of Les Adrets in southeast France, officials said. Five dead bodies, including a child, were discovered at the site of the crash Saturday afternoon, French news channel BFMTV reported. Local media reported that four people were of the same family, *Xinhua* news agency reported. According to BFMTV, eyewitnesses to the crash tipped off local authorities, and nearly 60 firefighters were deployed to the site to douse the fire.

IRGC member assassinated

Tehran: A senior member of Iran's powerful Revolutionary Guard was killed outside his home in Tehran Sunday by unidentified gunmen on a motorbike, state TV reported, giving only scant details about the attack. The two assailants shot Col. Hassan Sayad Khodayari five times in his car in the heart of the capital, state media said.

Quake jolts Japan

Tokyo: An earthquake with a magnitude of 5.8 on Sunday struck off Japan's Ibaraki prefecture, but no tsunami warning was issued. According to the Japan Meteorological Agency (JMA), the temblor occurred at 12.24 p.m. at a latitude of 36.8 north and a longitude of 141.5 east and at depth of 30 km, reports *Xinhua* news agency.

30 ultras killed

Ouagadougou: At least 30 terrorists were killed in an attack against a military detachment in north-central Burkina Faso, said the Army in a statement. The military detachment of Bourzanga located in Bam province, Center-North Region, "vigorously fought back" an attack against its base on Saturday, the Burkinate Army added.

Russia intensifies offensive as Polish leader visits Kyiv

Pokrovsk (Ukraine), May 22: Russia pressed its offensive in Ukraine's eastern Donbas region on Sunday as Poland's president travelled to Kyiv to support the country's Western aspirations and became the first foreign leader to address the Ukrainian parliament since the start of the war.

Ukrainian lawmakers stood to applaud Polish President Andrzej Duda, who thanked them for the honour of speaking in a place where "the heart of a free, independent and democratic Ukraine beats", according to remarks carried by the Polish state-run news agency PAP.

Duda's visit, his second to Ukraine's capital since April, came as Russian and Ukrainian forces engaged in battles along a 551-kilometre wedge of the country's eastern industrial heartland.

After declaring its full control of a sprawling seaside steel plant that was the last defense hold-out in the port city of Mariupol, the Russian military launched artillery and missile attacks in Ukraine's industrial heartland, seeking to expand the territory Moscow-backed separatists have held since 2014.

In a Saturday night video address to the nation, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy described the situation in the Donbas as "really hard", but he said his country's ability to withstand nearly three months of full-scale war against Russia "is good news". "Every day that our de-

fenders take away from these offensive plans of Russia, disrupting them, is a concrete contribution to the approach of the main day. The desired day that we are all looking forward to and fighting for: Victory Day," Zelenskyy said. Zelenskyy stressed Saturday that the 27-member European Union should consider Ukraine's desire to join the bloc as soon as possible within the context of Russia's invasion.

"I want to emphasise that our European integration path is not just about politics," Zelenskyy said. "It's about quality of life. And about the fact that Ukrainians perceive the values of life in the same way as the vast majority of Europeans."

Poland is ramping up efforts to persuade other EU members that are more hesitant about accepting Ukraine as a member. The country's potential candidacy is set to be discussed at a Brussels summit in late June.

"The free world has the face of Ukraine," Duda told the Verkhovna Rada, Ukraine's legislature, Sunday. "Despite the great destruction, despite the terrible crimes, the great suffering that the Ukrainian nation experiences every day, the Russian invaders did not break you, they did not manage to do it and I believe deeply that they will never succeed," he said.

Thousands of Cov-ve Beijing residents sent to quarantine

Beijing, May 22: Thousands of Covid-negative Beijing residents were forcibly relocated to quarantine hotels overnight due to a handful of infections, as the capital begins to take more extreme control measures resembling virus-hit Shanghai. China's strategy to achieve zero Covid cases includes strict border closures, lengthy quarantines, mass testing and rapid, targeted lockdowns.

Over 13,000 residents of the locked-down Nanxinyuan residential compound in southeast Beijing were relocated to quarantine hotels overnight Friday due to



26 new infections discovered in recent days Beijing has been battling its worst outbreak since the pandemic started.

The Omicron variant has infected over 1,300 since late April, leading city restaurants, schools and tourist attractions to be closed indefinitely. "Experts have determined that all Nanxinyuan residents undergo centralised quarantine beginning midnight May 21

Long march to Islamabad from May 25: Imran

Peshawar, May 22: Pakistan's ousted Prime Minister Imran Khan Sunday asked his supporters to march peacefully to Islamabad May 25 to press for the dissolution of the National Assembly and fresh elections in the country.

Khan, 69, who served as Prime Minister for over three and half years, was removed from the position through a no-confidence vote in parliament by the Opposition parties last month. Since his removal, Khan has addressed several rallies in different cities. Addressing a press conference after his party's core committee meeting in Peshawar, Khan said the march would convert into a sit-in and continue until his demands are accepted.

92 monkeypox cases now in 12 countries

As of Saturday, 92 confirmed cases and 28 suspected cases of monkeypox have been reported from 12 member states that are not endemic for the virus, the World Health Organisation said

London, May 22: The World Health Organisation said it expects to identify more cases of monkeypox as it expands surveillance in countries where the disease is not typically found.

"Available information suggests that human-to-human trans-



mission is occurring among people in close physical contact with cases who are symptomatic", the agency added.

Monkeypox is an infectious disease that is usually mild, and is endemic in parts of west and central Africa. It is spread by close contact, so it can be relatively easily contained through such measures as self-isolation and hygiene.

"What seems to be happening now is that it has got into the population as a sexual form, as a gen-

ital form, and is being spread as are sexually transmitted infections, which has amplified its transmission around the world," WHO official David Heymann, an infectious disease specialist, told *Reuters*.

Heymann said an international committee of experts met via video conference to look at what needed to be studied about the outbreak and communicated to the public, including whether there is any asymptomatic spread, who are at most risk, and the various routes of transmission.

He said the meeting was convened "because of the urgency of the situation". The committee is not the group that would suggest declaring a public health emergency of international concern, WHO's highest form of alert, which applies to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Davos, May 22: With nearly 100 CEOs and over a dozen government leaders here for a rare spring-time annual meeting of the World Economic Forum, the Indian contingent at this Swiss ski resort town is brimming with confidence when it comes to share their story of fighting the Covid-19 pandemic and attracting more investments.

The government leaders and their associates are also confident that India will be able to tell the world that their approach towards the Ukraine crisis has been the most balanced, even as a vast majority of the world leaders who have congregated here are expected to take on Russia strongly for waging the war. Some are also of the

view that the unfolding political situation back in India in the run up to the general elections of 2024, and various state polls before that, would be of keen interest for the global leaders assembled here, while so could be the issues of societal conflicts as well as income and gender inequalities.

One Indian CEO, however, said almost the entire world is seeing a rising level of polarisation and any India-specific issue should not gather much momentum at a summit the size of the World Economic Forum Annual Meeting.

The Ukraine crisis, climate change and preparing a pandemic-ready world are the three main issues that would dominate the discussions over the next five days here, he added.

New Delhi, May 22: Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman Sunday said that the ₹8 a litre cut in petrol and ₹6 reduction in diesel have been done in road and infrastructure cess levied on the two fuels, collection on which was never shared with states.

Taking to Twitter, Sitharaman said she is sharing some useful facts on levies on petrol and diesel for the benefit of all.

"Basic Excise Duty (BED), Special Additional Excise duty (SAED), Road & Infrastructure Cess

(RIC) and Agriculture & Infrastructure Development Cess (AIDC) together constitute Excise Duty on petrol and diesel. Basic ED is sharable with states. SAED, RIC & AIDC are non-sharable," she said.

The excise duty reduction of ₹8 per litre on petrol and ₹6 a litre on diesel has entirely been made in RIC. This was the case even in November 2021 when tax on petrol was cut by ₹5 and that on diesel by ₹10, she said.

Petrol commanded ₹13 a litre additional excise duty in form of RIC and ₹8 of such tax was levied on per litre of diesel. This has been cut in Saturday's excise reduction. Only ₹1.40 per litre BED collected on petrol and ₹1.80 on diesel are shared with states.

The SAED, AIDC and



As per the centre-state tax sharing formula, 41 per cent of taxes collected by the Centre go to states. These however do not include collections from levy of cess. Most of the tax on petrol and diesel is made up of cess

While total incidence of central tax on petrol prior to Saturday's cut was ₹27.90 per litre, basic excise duty was only ₹1.40 a litre. Similarly, out of Rs 21.80 a litre total central tax on diesel, basic excise duty was only ₹1.80

Special additional excise duty of ₹11 a litre on petrol and ₹8 per litre on diesel was levied. A Rs 2.50 a litre (AIDC) was levied on petrol and Rs 4 per litre on diesel

"Basic ED which is sharable with states has not been touched. Therefore, the entire burden of these two duty cuts (made in Nov, 21 and yesterday) is borne by the Centre," she said.

Chidambaram had Saturday evening stated that the cut in excise duty was "equal to rob Peter more & pay Peter less!"

"FM's exhortation to States is meaningless. When she cuts Central Excise by one rupee, 41 paise of that rupee belongs to the States," he had stated. Sunday, he retracted saying contrary to what he had said Saturday "the

'Steelmakers face impact on Europe deals'

New Delhi, May 22: Indian steel firms could be forced to cancel European orders and suffer losses after an overnight decision to impose export taxes on steel products, VR Sharma, managing director at Jindal Steel and Power told Reuters.

ket share in Europe, whose supplies have been hit by Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

"They should have given us at least 2-3 months of time, we did not know about such a substantial policy," Sharma said.

Sharma said Indian steelmakers have about 2 million tonne in pending export orders, mostly to Europe, which are stuck in ports or in various stages of production.

"This could possibly lead to force majeure. And the customer has done no wrong here and he doesn't deserve to be treated that way," he said. "We alone have 260,000 tonne of orders, which were taken when export duty was zero," Sharma said.

New Delhi, May 22: All logistics and connectivity infrastructure projects, entailing investment of over ₹500 crore, would now route through the network planning group (NPG) constituted under the PM GatiShakti initiative with the finance ministry issuing the necessary instructions and creation of the national master plan digital platform, an official said.

According to an office memorandum of the department of expenditure dated April 28, a revised format has been issued for Public Investment Board (PIB)/Delegated Investment Board (DIB) project proposals.

"The revised format of the PIB/DIB memorandum...Will apply to all the PIB/DIB proposals for new projects submitted on or after April 28, 2022," it has said.

As per the revised format, proposals should include whether the project has components of logistics or infrastructure connectivity; and whether it has been examined by NPG for convergence and integration at the conceptualisation or feasibility study stage.

This will help bring down the logistics cost and promote effective and efficient planning of infrastructure projects. An integrated infrastructure network planning group (NPG) has been constituted

Govt mulls spending additional ₹2 trillion to control inflation

New Delhi, May 22: The Indian government is considering spending an additional ₹2 trillion (\$26 billion) in the 2022/23 fiscal year to cushion consumers from rising prices and fight multi-year high inflation, two officials told Reuters.

The new measures will be double the ₹1 trillion hit government revenues could take from tax cuts on petrol and diesel the finance minister announced Saturday, both the officials said.

"We are fully focussed on bringing down inflation. The impact of Ukraine crisis was worse than anyone's imagination," one official, who did not want to be named, said.

The government estimates another ₹500 billion additional funds will be needed to subsidise fertilisers, from the current estimate of ₹2.15 trillion, the two officials said. The government could also de-

liver another round of tax cuts on petrol and diesel if crude oil continues to rise that could mean an added hit of ₹1 trillion-1.5 trillion in the 2022/23 fiscal year started April 1, the second official said.

One of the officials said the government may need to borrow additional sums from the market to fund these measures and that could mean a slippage from the its deficit target of 6.4% of GDP for 2022-23.

The official did not quantify the amount of borrowing or fiscal slippage saying it depended on how much funds they eventually divert from the budget in the fiscal year.

The government plans to borrow a record ₹14.31 trillion in the current fiscal year, according to February budget announcements. The other official said the additional borrowing will not impact the planned April-September borrowing of ₹8.45 trillion and may be undertaken in January-March 2023.



Cost overruns of ₹4.83L cr hit 425 infra projects

As many as 425 infrastructure projects, each entailing an investment of ₹150 crore or more, have been hit by cost overruns of more than ₹4.83 lakh crore, according to a report. According to the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation, which monitors infrastructure projects of ₹150 crore and above, out of 1,579 projects, 425 projects reported cost overruns and as many as 664 projects were delayed. "Total original cost of implementation of the 1,579 projects was ₹21.95,196.72 crore and their anticipated completion cost is likely to be ₹26,78,365.62 crore, which reflects overall cost overruns of ₹4,83,168.90 crore (22.01 per cent of the original cost)," the ministry's latest report for March 2022 said. According to the report, the expenditure incurred on these projects till March 2022 stood at ₹13,88,760.73 crore, which is 51.85 per cent of the anticipated cost of the projects.

New Delhi, May 22: Amazon has accused independent directors of Future Retail Ltd (FRL) of facilitating "fraudulent stratagem" of transfer of 835 stores to billionaire Mukesh Ambani's Reliance group, saying the narrative of that transfer was on account of failure to pay huge outstanding rent was a "sham" as the retailer had a month prior to such move stated that outstanding rent was only ₹250 crore.

The US retailer wrote May 19 to

independent directors of FRL stated that the firm had in meeting with core lender banks January 1, 2022, "categorically admitted that the unpaid rental dues was ₹250 crore only. FRL further stated that it voluntarily retained the amount."

"Surprisingly, FRL had managed to do so without discontinuing any of its operations or handing over its stores," it wrote. "Consequently, any narrative that there was a purported transfer on account of failure to pay huge outstanding rent for as many as 835 retail stores, that too as quickly as



February 26, 2022, is nothing but a sham and a false narrative to regulators, creditors, the shareholders and the Courts."

The Reliance deal fell last month after the lenders to FRL rejected it. But prior to that, Reliance group, referred to as MDA group by Amazon, took over operations of

dozens of Future stores after the retailer failed to pay rent.

"January 22, 2022, FRL issued a letter to Bank of India, State Bank of India and Saraf and Partners, wherein FRL reiterated its stand on selling the small store formats, in blatant disregard of the binding injunctions operating against it. If the

retail stores were not available with FRL, FRL would be incapacitated from making such a statement," Amazon said. "The purported handover of retail assets of FRL is, thus, not on account of non-payment of outstanding lease rentals."

"The purported handover is nothing but an intentional fraudulent action in furtherance of the stratagem to ostensibly alienate the retail stores, without following the rule of law. It has been carried out without notice to the Courts, regulators, lender banks and solely motivated by the desire to defeat any final award passed in the Arbitration Proceedings in favour of Amazon," it said.

"The stratagem to alienate the retail stores grossly undervalues the retail stores and moreover falls under acts amounting to wrongful trading to defraud creditors," it alleged warning that the promoters, KMPs and directors, including independent, are liable for terms

of imprisonment under various provisions of law including the Companies Act, 2013.

Amazon said FRL had March 9 stated for the first time that termination notices were issued by entities affiliated to the MDA Group. "FRL further went on to disclose that at least 835 retail stores (contributing 55% - 65% of the total revenue of FRL) had been purportedly shut down, possibly making way for stores operated by entities belonging to the MDA Group."

Accusing independent directors of "gross failure" in performing their statutory obligations and duties, the US retailer that, "Your inaction and material omissions have resulted in the execution of this stratagem orchestrated to commit a fraud by FRL, its Promoters, directors and KMPs on various stakeholders inter alia constitutional Courts, regulators, lender banks and its shareholders in collusion and connivance with the MDA Group."

Tough challenge awaits new-look Indian team

Jakarta, May 22: A second-string Indian men's hockey team will have to tactfully deal with the pressure when they open their title defence against arch rivals Pakistan in the Asia Cup here Monday. Pakistan also have fielded quite a few new faces for this tournament. However, India will be represented by its 'A' team under the leadership of veteran Birendra Lakra, who came out of retirement after the Tokyo Olympics. For India, the Asia Cup provides a platform to test their bench strength ahead of a busy season that includes the Birmingham Commonwealth Games and the FIH World Cup next year for which the Tokyo Olympic bronze medalists have already qualified as the host nation. Pakistan, on the other hand, are

looking at the tournament to make the cut for the 2023 World Cup in Bhubaneswar and Rourkela. The top three teams in Asia will qualify directly for the January showpiece. MANCHESTER CITY PIP LIVERPOOL TO THE PL TITLE WITH THRILLING 3-2 WIN OVER ASTON VILLA

London, May 22: They were destined to retain the Premier League title and in spite of falling 0-2 behind by the 70th minute, Manchester City conjured up sheer magic in five minutes. In those five minutes, the Blues scored three goals through Ilkay Gundogan (76th and 81st) and Rodri (78th) to go past Aston Villa and win the Premier League title. Pep Guardiola's team did the unthinkable when even their most ardent fans had given up hope. Liverpool were breathing hard on City's neck with just a point separating the two sides before the game began. When Manchester City looked down and out, Liverpool were 2-1 up against the Wolves. It seemed that nothing could catch up. But City players thought otherwise. In a six-minute spell they scripted a turnaround that only



champions can conjure up, that only men of steel can think about. In the end after 38 games of the toughest league in the world, City ended with 93 points to emerge champions while Liverpool missed out finishing on 92 points. And with the results Sunday, Liverpool's hopes of a quadruple disappeared. They can still make it a treble though if they win the Champions League title beating Liverpool May 28 at Paris. In the Liverpool-Wolves game it was the underdogs who had taken the lead with a third minute goal by Pedro Neto. However, Sadio Mane

(24th) restored parity and then Mo Salah (84th) and Andrew Robertson (89th) ensured all the three points from the game for Liverpool. City looked a completely disjointed in the first half against Villa. Their usual free-flowing passing game was missing. Matty Cash put the visitors ahead in the 37th minute at the Etihad. And then when Philippe Coutinho doubled the tally for Villa in the 70th minute, it seemed that the title was going to Liverpool. However, Gundogan and Rodri thought otherwise. Coming off the bench, Gundogan scored two goals, the second one being a peach. He sped past two Aston Villa defenders as Kevin de Bruyne danced into the Villa box and laid the perfect ball. Gundogan was in flash to poke the ball home. Prior to the winning goal, Rodri had restored parity for City driving the ball home from the edge of the Villa box.

Jabeur, Thiem suffer first round losses at French Open

Paris, May 22: Tunisian trail-blazer Ons Jabeur crashed out of the French Open at the first hurdle Sunday at the Roland Garros here. Sixth seed Jabeur, seen as a potential champion, despite never having previously got past the fourth round, lost 3-6, 7-6 (7/4), 7-5 to Poland's 56th-ranked Magda Linette. Jabeur came into the event with a season-leading 17 wins on clay in 2022 and with the prestigious Madrid title under her belt. However, she was undone Sunday by 24 unforced errors in the two hour 28-minute match. "I just tried to stay focused after the first set and tried to make her uncomfortable. I was happy to fight for every single point," said Linette who needed treatment on a leg injury after dropping the first set. Two-time runner-up Dominic Thiem, whose ranking has slipped

to 194 after a lengthy battle with a wrist injury, was another early casualty, losing 3-6, 2-6, 4-6 to 87th-ranked Hugo Dellien of Bolivia. Thiem, the 2020 US Open champion, is yet to win a match in six attempts since his return to the courts in March. He has now lost 10 tour-level matches in a row. His last victory came in Rome just over a year ago. The 28-year-old Austrian, a former World No. 3 reached at least the quarterfinals at Roland Garros five years running from 2016 to 2020. He finished runner-up to Rafael Nadal in 2018 and 2019. Meanwhile all eyes will be on Spanish teenager Alcaraz after his sensational show this year. He is bidding to become just the eighth teenager to capture a major men's title and is widely tipped to end the dominance of 13-time champion Rafael Nadal and two-time winner Novak Djokovic.
