Right to Health (RTH)

Important Provisions of the Right to Health Bill

- OPD, IPD, Consultations, Medicines, Tests, Transport, Procedures, and Emergency Care are free in Government and Designated Private Medical Institutions.
- If the patient does not pay the hospital after emergency treatment, the government will reimburse it.
- Treatment will be given even if the police report is not received.
- Right to get complete information about treatment.
- Right to choose the place to get medicine or get tested.
- Right to seek opinion about the treatment from some other doctor or hospital.
- There is also a provision for grievance redressal mechanism in the Act.
- Provision of auto-approval for timely payment to private medical institutions.
- Right to go to civil court against the decision of the authority.

All government medical institutions along with designated private medical institutions are included in RTH.
The reach of the designated hospitals will be increased in a phased manner.
It is proposed to provide additional facilities to the designated private hospitals included in RTH.

Medical personnel and doctors have an important role in the effective implementation of the Right to Health. Therefore provisions related to their dignity have been kept in RTH, along with have also mentioned the rights, duties and responsibilities of hospitals, medical personnel and citizens. It is the responsibility of all of us to respect the medical personnel.

Protection to Doctors through the Rajasthan Medicare Service Persons and Medicare Service Institutions (Prevention of Violence and Damage to Property) Act, 2008 and SOPs issued on 29 May, 2022.

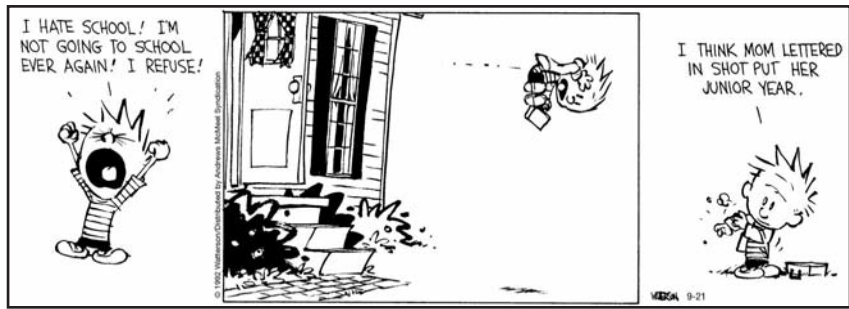

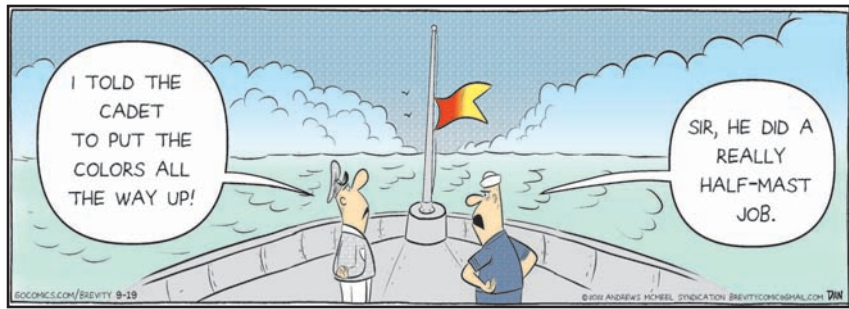

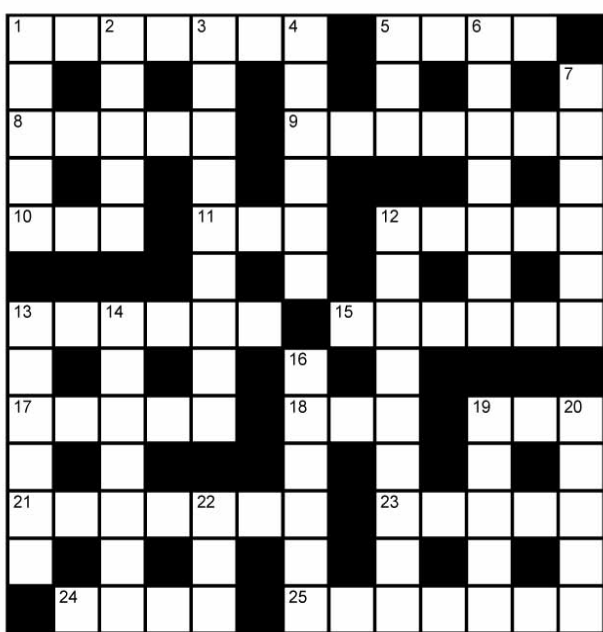

J'khand education minister dies

Ranchi: Jharkhand minister Jagannath Mahto died Thursday at a hospital in Chennai where he was undergoing treatment, a senior doctor of the health facility said. He was 56. Mahto, the minister for school education and literacy, was airlifted to Chennai last month due to health complications. He had undergone a lung transplant in November 2020 after suffering from COVID-19. "Mahto breathed his last today," Dr Apar Jindal of MGM Healthcare told PTI.

Mehbooba daughter gets passport

Srinagar: PDP president Mehbooba Mufti's daughter Iltija has been issued a passport for a limited period of two years to allow her to study abroad despite an adverse report by the CID, officials said Thursday. Iltija, 35, had moved the Jammu and Kashmir High Court in February for issuance of the passport for her studies after her application for the travel document was not cleared. Her passport had expired January 2 and she had applied for a fresh one in advance June 8 last year.

LeT terrorist associate held

Srinagar: Security forces have arrested a terrorist associate of the Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) in Bandipora district of Jammu and Kashmir, police said Thursday. On specific information regarding the movement of terrorists in Alooosa area of Bandipora, in north Kashmir, a special checkpoint was established near Canal Road Alooosa, by security forces, a police spokesperson said. During checking, one terrorist associate linked with proscribed terror outfit LeT was apprehended, he said.

55 fall sick after eating ice cream

Khargone: Fifty five people fell sick, two of them critically, due to food poisoning after eating ice cream at a religious function in Madhya Pradesh's Khargone district, officials said. Those who took ill included 25 children, they said, adding the ice cream samples have been sent for testing. These people ate the ice cream prepared and sold by one Dinesh Kushwaha Wednesday night during a religious function at a temple in Chhatal village, 14 km from the district headquarters, Khargone's Chief Medical and Health Officer Dr Daulat Singh Chauhan told PTI.

Centre recommends CBI probe against Oxfam India

New Delhi, April 6: The Union Home Ministry Thursday recommended a CBI probe into the affairs of the Indian arm of the global NGO Oxfam for alleged violation of the Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act, sources said.

The home ministry found that Oxfam India continued to transfer foreign contributions to various entities, including other NGOs, even after registering under the FCRA, which prohibits such transfers after an amendment that came into force September 29, 2020, sources said.

On March 20, the home ministry recommended a CBI inquiry against Aman Biradari, an NGO established by activist Harsh Mander. Aman Biradari was one of the NGOs to which Oxfam India transferred foreign contributions, violating the law, sources said.

There was no immediate reaction from Oxfam India. During a survey by the Income-Tax department, multiple emails were found which revealed that Oxfam India was allegedly planning to circumvent provisions of the FCRA by routing funds to other FCRA-registered associations or through the for-profit consultancy route, sources said.

The survey also "exposed" Oxfam India as a probable instrument of the foreign policy of foreign organisations or entities, which have funded the NGO liberally over the years, they said.

Oxfam India, which is registered to carry out social activities, allegedly routed funds to the Delhi-based think tank Centre for Policy Research (CPR) through its associates and employees in the form of a commission, sources said.

The same is also reflected in the TDS data of Oxfam India, which

shows a payment of ₹12,71,188 to the CPR in 2019-20. Oxfam India received foreign contributions amounting to about ₹1.50 crore directly into its foreign contribution utilisation account instead of receiving them in the designated FCRA account, they said.

Following these findings, the home ministry recommended a CBI probe against Oxfam India, they added. The Income-Tax department conducted surveys against CPR and Oxfam India, besides a media foundation, in September as part of a probe related to alleged FCRA contravention in funds received by them.

Oxfam India's FCRA licence was suspended in January 2022, after which the NGO filed a revision petition with the home ministry. The FCRA licence of CPR was suspended for six months on March 1 for alleged violation of laws.

All NGOs receiving foreign contributions have to mandatorily register with the home ministry under the FCRA. According to the Oxfam

India website, the NGO has been in India since 1951 and it is a "movement of people working to end discrimination and create a free and just society". "We work to ensure that Adivasis, Dalits, Muslims, and Informal Sector Workers, especially women and girls have safe, violence-free lives with freedom to speak their mind, equal opportunities to realise their rights, and a discrimination-free future," the website says.

Officials said between 2018 and 2022, the FCRA registration of 1,827 NGOs was cancelled due to violation of its provisions and rules. As March 10, 2023, there were 16,383 FCRA-registered organisations.

A total amount of ₹55,449 crore in foreign funding has been received by Indian NGOs in the last three years. An amount of ₹16,306.04 crore was received by NGOs across the country in 2019-20, ₹17,058.64 crore in 2020-21, and ₹22,085.10 crore in 2021-22, the Rajya Sabha was informed last month.

Hope China will allow continued presence of Indian journalists: MEA

THE COMMENTS BY ARINDAM BAGCHI IN DELHI CAME DAYS AFTER CHINA DECIDED TO "FREEZE" VISAS OF TWO INDIAN JOURNALISTS

New Delhi/Beijing, April 6: India Thursday hoped that Chinese authorities would facilitate continued presence of Indian journalists in China.

The comments by External Affairs Ministry spokesperson Arindam Bagchi in Delhi came days after China decided to "freeze" visas of two Indian journalists.

"There are Chinese journalists who have valid Indian visas to undertake journalistic activities," Bagchi said responding to a question on the issue.

From that perspective, we don't see any difficulties in doing reporting (by the Chinese journalists), he said. "As regards to Indian journalists working in China, we would hope that Chinese authorities would facilitate their continued presence and reporting from China," Bagchi said.

"We are in touch with Chinese authorities in this regard," he said. Meanwhile, China has sought re-

iprocal measures from India for the facilitation of its journalists even as it defended its recent move to freeze the visas of the two Indian correspondents.

China's Foreign Ministry officials on Tuesday informed Ananth Krishnan, the China correspondent of The Hindu, and Anshuman Mishra, the Beijing-based correspondent of Prasar Bharati, who are currently in India on leave that their visas have been "frozen" and they cannot return until further orders.

Asked why China resorted to the suspension of visas of the two Indian journalists, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Mao Ning told a media briefing that "for a long-time Chinese journalists have received unfair and discriminatory treatment in India". "In 2017, India shortened the visa for Chinese journalists from three months to one month. In 2020, India refused to approve applications from Chinese journalists to go to India," she claimed.

Delhi Excise 'scam': ED files supplementary chargesheet

New Delhi, April 6: The Enforcement Directorate Thursday filed a supplementary charge sheet before a court here in a money laundering case related to the alleged Delhi excise policy scam in which former deputy chief minister Manish Sisodia is also an accused.

Special Judge Vikas Dhull put up the charge sheet before the judge concerned for consideration April 14. Sisodia is currently in judicial custody till April 17 in the matter and a Delhi court is scheduled to hear his bail plea April 12. This is ED's second supplementary prosecution complaint (agency's equivalent of a charge sheet).

The complaint has been filed against Raghav Magunta, Rajesh Joshi, Gautam Malhotra and five firms related to them. The agency, which has arrested senior AAP

leader Manish Sisodia, has yet not filed a charge sheet against him. With today's report, filed by ED's Special Public Prosecutor N K Matta, the number to accused charge-sheeted in the case rose to 25.

In its charge sheet containing around 2,000 pages, the agency has included statement of witnesses and accused persons as well as e-mail and other data.

During the arguments on Sisodia's bail application, the ED had told the court on April 5 that the investigation in the case against Sisodia is at a "crucial" stage and it has found fresh evidence of his complicity.

A Delhi court had earlier dismissed Sisodia's bail application in the corruption case related to the excise scam that is being probed by the CBI.

SC closes contempt plea against Delhi police

New Delhi, April 6: The Supreme Court Thursday closed activist Tushar Gandhi's contempt plea against the Delhi Police after taking note of submissions that a charge sheet in a case of hate speeches made at religious assemblies in the national capital in 2021 was filed in a court here.

A bench comprising Chief Justice D Y Chandrachud and Justice J B Pardiwala considered the submissions of Additional Solicitor General K M Nataraj, appearing for the Delhi Police, that a charge sheet after conclusion of the investigation was filed in a court of the Metropolitan

Magistrate here April 4. The bench refused to direct Delhi police that a copy of the charge sheet be made available to Gandhi, who is not part of the proceedings before the trial court.

Now the charge sheet is filed, our role has come to an end," the bench said, adding that now the proceedings in the trial court will

be conducted as per the Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC).

Earlier, the Delhi Police had said the investigation into the case was at an advanced stage and a probe report will be filed shortly.

Nataraj had said that the police were expecting a Forensic Science Laboratory report on voice samples of the accused and the charge sheet will be filed after that.

Air pollution linked to lower Covid vax response: Study

New Delhi, April 6: People exposed to higher levels of air pollution before the pandemic had lower antibody responses to Covid-19 vaccines, according to a study.

In particular, exposure to fine particulate matter (PM2.5), nitrogen dioxide (NO2) and black carbon was associated with about a 10 per cent decrease in IgM and IgG antibody responses in people without prior infection, the researchers said.

The findings, published in the journal Environmental Health Perspectives, provide further evidence on the adverse effects of air pollution on the immune system.



"Air pollution has been linked to adverse health outcomes, including lung cancer, cardiovascular and respiratory disease, and diabetes," said Manolis Kogevinas from the Barcelona Institute for Global Health (ISGlobal). "Air pollutants have been shown to affect immune

Air pollutants have been shown to affect immune responses. Previously it has been linked to adverse health outcomes, including lung cancer, cardiovascular and respiratory disease, and diabetes

responses, so in this study we wished to determine whether air pollution also affects antibody responses to COVID-19 vaccines," said Kogevinas.

The team analysed data from 927 participants aged 40 to 65 years, who answered questionnaires and gave blood samples in the summer of 2020 and in the spring of 2021. All had received one or two doses of the main Covid-19 vaccines administered in Spain made by

AstraZeneca, Pfizer or Moderna. The research team measured IgM, IgG and IgA antibodies to five viral antigens (three of them on the spike protein contained in the vaccine). Exposure to PM2.5, black carbon, NO2 and ozone (O3) was estimated for each participant based on their address before the pandemic.

"The collaboration of all volunteers in the cohort, with more than ten years of data, has allowed us to reliably estimate the level of en-

vironmental exposure of all participants," said Rafael de Cid, co-author of the study.

The results show that in uninfected individuals, pre-pandemic exposure to PM2.5, NO2 and black carbon was associated with a 5 to 10 per cent reduction in vaccine-induced spike antibodies.

The decrease in antibodies was shown both for early IgM responses and late responses measured by IgG, the researchers said. The IgG response after the first dose peaked later in participants exposed to higher air pollution levels, and lower IgG levels persisted for several months after vaccination. Results were similar for the three vaccines.

"Air pollution can induce chronic inflammation, which has been associated with a negative effect on vaccine efficacy," said Carlota Dobano, co-senior author of the study together with Cathryn Tonne. "Our findings are consistent with evidence that persistent organic pollutants reduce vaccine responses in children," Dobano added.

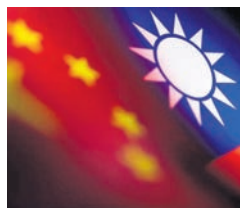
The fact that previous infections lead to higher vaccine responses could explain why the effect of pollutants was only observed in people without a prior infection, the researchers said. However, the role of long-term exposure to air pollution on hybrid immunity (infection plus vaccination) deserves further investigation, they added.

4 dead in 2 road accidents

Jharsuguda, April 6: Three truck drivers were charred to death as their vehicles collided and caught fire in this district in the wee hours of Thursday, police said. Two others were also critically injured in the blaze. The Odisha government is observing 'zero fatality week' but there has been no let up in the spate of road accidents in the state.

The accident happened on National Highway 49 near Jharsuguda Sadar police station, police informed. The drivers of the three trucks could not come

out of their vehicles after the collision, following which they were burnt alive, police informed. They added that since one of the trucks was laden with coal, the blaze spread very quickly not giving the victims any chance to come out of the vehicles.

Fire services personnel arrived at the spot and doused the blaze. They informed that the identities of the victims or the injured are yet to be ascertained. With the injured, who are undergoing treatment at the district headquarters hospital here, still not regaining sense, police have not been able to get their identities.

Police also stated that most of the documents in the vehicles have been reduced to ashes and hence, there is no proof to establish the identities of the victims.

In another road accident, a person was killed when a car and truck collided head-on near Bidanasi Square in Cuttack late Wednesday night, police said. Two others were seriously injured and are currently undergoing treatment at the SCB Medical College and Hospital in Cuttack. The deceased and the injured are from Dhenkanal district. Police added that the car was moving on the wrong side of the road.

LS productivity only 34%

Despite the Budget Session going full distance, the first time during the Modi 2.0 regime, frequent disruptions affected functioning of both Houses

New Delhi, April 6: After a series of truncated sessions during the 'Modi 2.0 regime', the Budget Session of the Parliament was the first one to conclude as per schedule. It was the only session to have gone the full distance in the last three years. The Budget Session began January 31 and ended April 6 with a recess from February 14 to March 12.

Both the Rajya Sabha and the Lok Sabha were adjourned sine die Thursday amid disruptions. The 2023 Budget Session saw both the Treasury Bench and the Opposition causing frequent disruptions and both were responsible for hampering the proceedings. As a result productivity of both the Houses suffered. While the Lok Sabha had a productivity of little over 34 per cent, the same for the Rajya Sabha was a poor 24.4% as per information provided by Union Minister of State for Parliamentary Affairs, Arjun Ram Meghwal.

"The productivity of the Lok Sabha during the Budget Session, 2023 was approximately 34 per cent and that of the Rajya Sabha was 24.4 per cent," informed the minister. Against the 27 scheduled sittings, a total of 25 only could be held in both the Houses, but for 18 days the Houses could not sit for the scheduled six hours per day due to ruckus.



Disruptions claimed at least 108 hours and 30 minutes of the Rajya Sabha and over 96 hours of Lok Sabha.

According to the PRS Legislative Research, both Houses witnessed repeated adjournments of the Question Hour throughout the Session. The Lok Sabha could take

questions for 4.32 hours while the figure for Rajya Sabha was worse at 1.85 hours for the entire Budget Session. Meanwhile Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla said in his speech that the House began January 31 and President Droupadi Murmu delivered her address to the joint sitting on that day. He said there were over 13 hours of debate on motion to thank the President for her address and 143 MPs participated in it. The Prime Minister replied to the debate.

Birla said the budget was presented February 1 and the debate on it took place for over 14 hours with 145 MPs participating and Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman giving her replies. Birla stated that the Lok Sabha has not been functioning properly since the second part of the Budget Session began March 13 due to protests by Opposition and the Treasury Benches.

While the Opposition was unrelenting in its demand for a JPC, the Treasury Benches demanded an apology from Congress leader Rahul Gandhi for his democracy is under attack remarks in London.

Significantly despite the continuous logjam in both the houses, the Session was not curtailed as it had happened in the last three years.

SI held for taking bribe

Bhubaneswar, April 6: A sub-inspector (SI) of Khandagiri police station was caught red-handed Thursday along with an accomplice while receiving a bribe of ₹50,000. The SI, Susanta Kumar Swain was allegedly accepting the money to help a person against whom a fraud case had been registered in the same police station in 2021. Sources said Swain had joined the service in 2015. Meanwhile, the other accused, Chiranjiv Bala, was working as a computer operator on a daily basis at the same police station.

Sources in the Vigilance department said Swain was the investigating officer in the case (No 22/21) registered January 9, 2021. It was filed by Amiya Kumar Ratha who accused that one Prakash Chandra Nayak allegedly duped him of ₹16 lakh on the pretext of providing a plot of land

in the Odisha capital.

Swain allegedly asked Nayak to pay ₹2 lakh to him promising that he would provide a favourable final report in the case. Sources said that earlier he had taken bribes to the tune of ₹4 lakh. However, Swain continued to press for more money from the complainant.

Irritated at the constant demand for bribes, Nayak informed the Vigilance department. Accordingly a trap was laid and Swain was apprehended red-handed.

"Following the arrest, simultaneous raids are being conducted on properties of Swain. Both Swain and Bala have been arrested and will be forwarded to the court," Vigilance sources said.

A case (No 9/23) has been registered at the Bhubaneswar Vigilance Police station under sections 7 PC Act, 1988 as amended by PC (Amendment) Act, 2018.

Kalahandi to get new medical college soon

Bhawanipatna: The National Medical Commission (NMC) approved Thursday the opening of a government Medical College in this town of Kalahandi district. The medical college which will be functional from 2023-24 academic season onwards will have 100 MBBS seats. Hope for Humanities

At a recent conference of German and American literary scholars, I suggested that our high-level discussions would matter only if we helped change students' lives. It is not enough to tell students how the skills developed in reading literature can “transfer” to other parts of their lives. Rather, we must help them become better interpreters of each other, so that they can become better friends, family members, and citizens.

I had anticipated that this argument would meet with skepticism or insistence that studying great works of literature is important for its own sake. To my surprise, the response went much further than that, and even included an accusation that I was condoning “tyranny.” The idea that we might teach people how to live well, I was told, wrongly assumes that we ourselves know how to live well, and that we are right to impose our views on others.

There is some logic to this concern. After all, far-right politicians in many countries are currently trying to impose their values on students by banning certain subjects and books. But I was not advocating for university instructors to tell people how to live. My point was simply that we should help our students connect the classroom to their daily lives through meaningful reflection. The heated response I received speaks volumes about how some humanists have abdicated their historic role: to help people find meaning.

Too many teachers nowadays avoid engaging in serious conversations about living well. With the future of humanities instruction in doubt, this is a grave mistake. We urgently need to reconnect the humanities classroom to the age-old quest for a meaningful life, not least because there is deep yearning for this kind of education. From 2013 to 2019, sales of “self-help” books increased annually by 11% – and that was before they became an even bigger hit during the pandemic. Psychological treatment for stress and anxiety continues to rise, with reports of year-long waitlists just to see a therapist. In many countries, there simply are not enough mental-health services to meet the demand.

Moreover, as universities have gradually ceased to be centers for deep conversations about life, people have been creating their own forums for humanistic engagement. Groups like the Catherine Project, Night School Bar, and Premise are bringing people together outside of universities to hold wide-ranging discussions about life and art. It is little wonder that when universities do offer these kinds of classes, students respond. Three of Yale University's most popular courses are about happiness, death, and how to lead a life worth living. Unfortunately, these are the stand-out exceptions that prove the rule.

In the absence of thoughtful guidance, people will increasingly seek meaning elsewhere, and not always in healthy or fruitful ways. Social-science research demonstrates that when people feel adrift or deprived of meaning in their lives, they become more susceptible to authoritarian leaders. Open-minded humanists should probably worry less about the “tyranny” of helping people find meaning, and more about how the lack of meaning can lead to actual tyranny.

Given that there is massive demand for humanistic knowledge, why has such teaching been marginalised in the university? One reason is rooted in the Enlightenment's ideal of disinterested knowledge. Modern scientific investigation was supposed to free itself from “interests,” especially misguided quests to deny science and follow religious dogma. But as science freed itself from oppressive theology, it also moved away from the search for meaning. Scientists rightly wanted to explain what was empirically verifiable, and there was no mathematical formula for how to live well.

Humanistic research also went down this path. For example, many scholars stopped trying to understand what poetry can teach us about how to live, and focused instead on offering formal, sociological, and historical accounts of poetry's role in human society. But as worthwhile as such research may be, it became too dominant, unwittingly leading to an academic monoculture of knowledge production that marginalises the bigger questions of life.

The good news is that we can re-engage with these bigger questions without recreating the problems of the past. Considerate classroom discussions of big humanistic questions can help everyone (students and instructors alike) better understand what a good life can be; and the knowledge of modern scholarship about topics like ecology, identity, narrative, and interpretation can be valuable aids in adding depth and relevance to these discussions.

The coming years may offer humanists a major new opportunity to reinvent themselves as the people who can best help students explore the wonders and challenges of human existence. Since the start of the pandemic, when so many people began to question economic pieties about the increasingly career-oriented nature of college, universities around the world have reported a resurgent interest in humanistic study. In the current academic year, for example, the number of declared humanities majors at the University of California, Berkeley, surged 121% compared to last year.

To be sure, these are preliminary figures, and we will have to see if the trend continues. But even a small uptick represents a crucial opportunity for the humanities. Even as we avoid “tyrannically” imposing our own assumptions on our students, we should be equally wary of neglecting to help them understand how to live well on their own terms.

The humanities can do that, and it is an instructor's job to show students how. Our classrooms should be places where the thorniest issues of life are considered, debated, and reimagined; where meaning and purpose are kindled and cherished; and where everyone can work together to understand and appreciate the fullness of life. It falls to us to ignite new enlightenments, where we combine the best of our scientific knowledge with the wisdom to make a meaningful world for all.

EUROPEAN DILEMMA



Europeans realise and admit that Beijing is posing a systemic threat to the world seeking to change the global political system beyond what Europeans have lived with for centuries

a hat. They will like to do brisk business with Beijing as a matter of national economic interest and will go with the USA as their history, culture and security are unbreakably linked. The European countries, the big ones like Germany and France may not warm up to either China or USA, but they carry on with both.

The German Chancellor Olaf Scholz was in China immediately after coming to power. At the time of writing, the French President, Emmanuel Macron was in Beijing. Europe does not have direct enmity with Russia, yet it has to go with USA in isolating Russia for their affinity with the former for the reasons mentioned above. In fact, they are in quite an uncomfortable position. In view of the sanctions, Europe could not buy oil and gas from Russia and is compelled to buy at a much higher rate from USA. My friend asserted that the USA is benefitting considerably from the war in Ukraine through their sales of weaponry to Ukraine and fuel to Europe. USA too is pragmatic!

The Scandinavian countries have a bigger problem now. Dealing with an autocratic regime in Russia is a nightmare. Soviet Union made a blunder in 1979. Putin is doing it in the neighbourhood – Chechnya,

Georgia and now Ukraine. Putin believes that break-up of Soviet Union was the biggest mistake to have happened in his lifetime. If he had his way, he would restore the Union by force. At any rate, brow-beating Ukraine is a nationalistic issue. Countries like Finland and Sweden are geographically close to Russia and cannot risk living beside an autocratic regime. So, they are joining NATO (Finland has already joined).

Europe is thrown into an existential dilemma with China. Following USA, they have had booming trade and commerce with Beijing to exploit the captive labour force, strict labour laws and so on. China has become too powerful now, a Frankenstein as I said before in this column. Europeans realise and admit that Beijing is posing a systemic threat to the world seeking to change the global political system beyond what Europeans have lived with for centuries, so said my friend. Second, China is challenging the supremacy of USA. On the other hand, USA is trying to curtail China. Europe will have to follow suit.

Although Europe is dithering at the moment on China, they will have no more room to manoeuvre, if Beijing took any militarily

aggressive step in Japan, Taiwan, Australia or any of the USA's formal allies. China is belligerent on India but since New Delhi is a hybrid ally of USA and perhaps of Europe, Indian predicament may not spur Europe to act against China.

This is precisely the strategic point I wish to underline for Europe and India to consider. I have long argued that European Union and the Union of India are natural partners, and it is high time they grasped and embraced this reality. Both are diverse, federal democratic polities. The trajectory of their union-building is contrasting but the nature and the purpose are the same. India began as a Union of States and is maintaining it. Europe constructed the Union and is seeking to profile it.

There are two elements missing on both sides. Europe needs to defocus on economic growth at the expense of human rights (like dealing with China). Europe is economically and politically advanced enough; it needs to maintain then the changing mindsets on consumption. India on the other hand needs to build its economy and society in material terms and maintain its federal and democratic polity. Instead of falling for China's economic bubble, the so-called miraculous growth, Europe needs to refocus on its political richness and social modernism.

Europe should be patient with India for its slower but steadier growth. India is going to be the biggest country and the largest market in the world with greater diversity and stability. Likewise, New Delhi should reach out to Europe, not Russia, which is fading, nor China which hangs as the 'sword of Damocles' over the world, and not the USA which feeds its own interests rather than anyone else's. It is time for Union of India and the European Union to draw closer.

Investment strategy for current scenario

AS THE SVB CRISIS UNFOLDED, GOLD AND SILVER FOUND A NEW LEASE OF LIFE, THIS TIME LED BY A VERY SHARP FALL IN INTEREST RATE EXPECTATIONS

The Federal Reserve of the US has practically endorsed the notion of 'All is Well' as far as financial stability is concerned, by hiking the policy rates by 25 bps (basis points). This was something that was expected before the meeting. Albeit, the Fed could have justified a 'no hike', but it would have led to more conjectures and wouldn't have done any good.

As per the Fed, the peak rate is expected to be 5.125%. Hence there is a room for another 25 bps hike as per the SEP (Summary of Economic Projections). There has been no upward revision to this forward-looking measure. A lot will depend on strength of economic data. The Fed has modestly revised its growth estimate for 2023 – from 0.5% earlier in Dec to 0.4% now. More dovish is the downward revision to GDP estimate for 2023, wherein now it expects the US to grow by mere 1.2% as compared to its December estimate of 1.6%.

Therefore, most importantly, the Fed's projection for interest rate cuts by 100 bps in 2024 assumes significance now. Earlier Fed had guided for three cuts of 25 bps each and now it is guiding for four cuts. Maybe, we have one more rate

hike coming up next quarter, which may not matter to the market significantly anymore, if it is accompanied by a view that rate hikes are done with. Extended pause and eventual rate cuts are likely to take centre stage going forward. On financial stability, the probability for any systemic risk which can have economy wide contagion remains very much possible.

From an 'equity strategy perspective', considering the time correction, it's appropriate to shed 'defensive stance' towards equities. This implies that one can remain equal weight in equity asset class, and those who are under-invested, should execute their investments in next six months, rather than twelve months (a reluctant position).

A durable rally may commence once inflationary data looks decisively on the decline. This may still take 3 to 6 months to show up. Growth and quality stocks may outperform value-based stocks over 2 to 3 years. Equities are at a juncture which can outperform debt over three years' time (not necessarily in one year). Dynamically managed equity funds can still outperform debt in next one year.

From a 'debt investment strategy perspective', it is prudent to invest in FMPs (Fixed Maturity Plans) and Target Maturity Products to lock the high prevailing yields. The 10Y government G-Sec yields is close to 7.6%. If any rate cut takes place in November this year, the mark-to-market value of debt investments will be more lucrative. Event risks and accidents like SVB (Silicon Valley Bank) and Credit Suisse are the unknown risks, which may continue to offer opportunities in the fixed income space.

Gold and silver, once again have come back to prominence, as risk aversion takes prominence due to developed market's 'banking turmoil'.

The rally in gold, witnessed in October-January, was led by a sharp fall in USD (against a basket of other currencies), fall in real US yields and some build up in speculative demand. During this period, silver outperformed gold by 5%, being a high 'beta' (risk) asset class as compared to gold.

Since then, gold prices have reversed, primarily because US interest rate expectations have shot up sharply (from 4.5% by Dec 2023 at start of February, to 5.55% by 8

March before the SVB crisis unfolded).

As the SVB crisis unfolded, gold and silver found a new lease of life, this time led by a very sharp fall in interest rate expectations (Dec 2023 forecast has fallen from 5.55% to 3.98% currently – a massive fall). Absolute level of yields in the US has also fallen sharply. Risk aversion has also gone up as evident in increased volatility in equities and global bonds. As a result, gold prices are up by 9% while silver is up by 12%.

Going forward, the probability of bond yields falling are higher than the other way round, which is positive news for gold (and therefore for 'high beta' silver). Speculative demand remains much below the cycle peak. Therefore, the macro set up remains favourable, wherein silver can naturally outperform.

Both gold and silver (put together) should ideally not exceed 10% of the overall portfolio, and should only be seen as diversifier or a hedge instrument (reduces portfolio volatility) instead of big contributor to portfolio gains.

Transgression of sovereignty

Sir, Persistent attempts made by China to rename certain regions in Arunachal Pradesh are a violation of India's sovereign rights. India must deal with this issue strictly. China recently released the third batch of “standardised” names of 11 places in Arunachal Pradesh and these places are called Zangnan or Southern Tibet. It may be recalled that in 2017 and 2021 China had released six and fifteen names respectively for regions in Arunachal Pradesh. In 2021 the Indian government had severely criticised the renaming. As transgression of sovereignty of our country is a great threat, India needs to deal with it effectively. As China is adopting similar strategies in Taiwan and in many parts of South Asian region, its assertions must not be taken lightly. China does not recognise the legitimacy of McMahon Line and it gives importance to the cultural and historical ties with the region. However, it is unjustified to reclaim parts of Arunachal Pradesh on such flimsy grounds. China must understand that Arunachal Pradesh is an integral part of India and such moves by it will lead to conflicts. Such acts by China must be countered on an urgent basis. China may adopt pressurising strategies to make bargains at international meetings. India has done well in increasing deployment of military force in the LAC. In the same way it must be on alert so that its sovereign rights are not transgressed by China.

On the mug shot letter board is written "President Donald J Trump 45-47 04 04 2023." The numbers 45-47 refer to Trump being the 45th President of the United States as well as the 47th if he is re-elected in the 2024 elections. The date '04 04 2023' refers to the historic day Trump was arrested and arraigned.

Another email from the campaign signified the popularity of the Trump mug shot T-shirt as it stated: "Never has an item flown off the shelves of the 'Official Trump Store' faster than our limited-edition NOT GUILTY T-Shirt."

Parl productivity very low

Since 2020, not a single session of the Parliament under the current regime could function till the last day. As per the analysis of Lok Sabha data, at least eight sessions were adjourned sine die before the due date. The Budget session and Monsoon session in 2020 were curtailed due to the outbreak of Covid-19 and the Winter Session was not called the same year.

In 2021, the Budget session was adjourned 14 days before the scheduled adjournment. The government said that the decision was taken after consulting all the parties due to ensuing Assembly elections. The Monsoon and Winter Sessions too were curtailed citing the completion of government business. The saga continued in 2022 too.

Congress MP Saptagiri Ulaka termed it a waste of taxpayers' money. "When you become an authoritarian ruler you do this kind of drama. The House didn't function for more than a few minutes each day but just to show the country that we are not running away from holding the Session, they have been doing this. This is ridiculous and should not happen," Ulaka said.

State has potential to up seafood export: Min

Bhubaneswar, April 6: Having been blessed with natural resources like a long coastline and brackish water areas, Odisha holds huge potential for seafood exports in future, said Agriculture, Fisheries and Animal Resources Development Minister Ranendra Pratap Swain at a workshop on Odisha seafood export here Thursday.

Inaugurating the workshop organised by the department, Swain said that 86,481 metric ton of seafood worth Rs 4,526 crore has been exported from Odisha in 2021-22. The state has seen a 12 fold increase in seafood exports in last 20 years.

"Odisha has a huge potential to augment exports of seafood and the state government is eying many-



fold growth in the exports in future," he added.

Odisha occupies fourth place in the country in terms of aquaculture production with a supply of 10.60 lakh metric tons of fish annually, contributing to nearly 2.7 per cent of the state's GSVA. There is a four-fold increase in total fish production in last one decade, said Swain.

Swain also focused on value addition of seafood as it will fetch

good market in western countries. He suggested chilled seafood export by air to nearby markets like the Middle East, West Asia and East Asia. He further emphasized on deep sea fishing along the Odisha coast encouraging people to go for high value fishes like Tuna.

Swain assured all support to the seafood industries in terms of policy intervention and ease of doing business. Speaking on the occa-

sion, Balasore MLA Swarup Kumar Das urged for a roadmap to achieve the targeted export value.

Department principal secretary Suresh Kumar Vashishth said that state government is giving priority in developing new infrastructure in fishing harbours and fish landing centre.

The Bhawaniapatna government hospital will function as teaching hospital for the medical college.

Health and Family Welfare secretary Shalini Pandit said the institution would fulfil the long-standing aspirations of the people of Kalahandi district. The college would have 100-intake capacity in MBBS from the academic session 2023-24.

The state government has set a target to commence classes of medical college and hospital from the next academic session. Infrastructure development of the medical college has already been completed, official sources said.

EOW nabs bank manager for misappropriating ₹8cr

Bhubaneswar, April 6: The manager of a public sector bank was arrested in Odisha's Kandhamal district for allegedly misappropriating Rs 8 crore, officials said.

A case was registered by the Economic Offences Wing (EOW) of the Odisha Police against the accused deputy manager on the basis of a complaint filed by the regional manager of the bank, they said.

The deputy manager, posted in Phulbani, was accused of illegally recommending and processing 59 'Xpress Credit' loans meant for the salaried person to non-salaried people, and 26 pension loans meant to non-pensioners, they added.

He allegedly misappropriated the loan amount of Rs 8.01 crore by transferring the money to the account of his family members, Police (EOW) deputy superintendent Dilip



Tripathy said.

The loans were sanctioned on the basis of the recommendation of the accused, based on forged documents such as salary slips, he added.

"The accused is highly ambitious and was trying to make easy money by investing the loan amount in some other profitable businesses," Tripathy said.

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Students form human chain to create awareness on G20 event

Berhampur, April 6: Ahead of the third G20 Education Working Group Meeting at Bhubaneswar from April 27 to 29, students of Industrial Training Institute (ITI) here formed a human-chain in the form of the acronym of the Group of Twenty. Wearing blue and saffron uniforms, 1,500 students, including 400 girls, Wednesday sat in the playground of the institute as part of the Jan Bhagidari event for the ensuing G20 Education Working Group Meeting in the state capital. Drop in fish population raises concern

Paradip, April 6: Decline in marine fish population has posed a serious threat to the fishery business in this port town and rendered scores of fishermen jobless, a report said Thursday. The fishing harbour in this town, which was once abuzz with activities, now wears a gloomy look with a visible slump in fishing activities. Things have come to such a pass that many boats have stopped venturing into the sea for fishing. While some of them are berthed at the fishing harbour, some others can be found parked at the dry dock meant for boat repairing. Arabinda Swain, secretary of Odisha Marine Fish Producers Association (OMPA) said that fishing in sea is a major means of earning livelihood for scores of fishermen in unorganised sector. Out of the 559 functional boats only 10 per

cent now go to the sea for fishing. While fish traders are struggling to stay afloat in the business, the two-month ban on fishing which is going to be imposed soon will further hit them hard, he said, adding that all the boats will stop venturing into the sea for two months from April 15, as per the government order. OMPA president Srikanth Parida said that over 50,000 people are directly or indirectly dependent on the Paradip fishing harbour for their livelihood. It is a major avenue of employment and no other sector gives employment to so many people like fishing. He said that the state government is receiving lot of foreign exchange from fish exports but has done little for the development of the fishing harbour and fishermen. The Paradip fishing harbour alone exported 2,00,602 metric tonne of fish in 2022-23 FY, he said. Meanwhile, the Centre has im-

Centre has imposed a ban on fishing in West Bengal, Odisha, Andhra Pradesh, Puducherry, and Andaman Nicobar Islands from April 15 to June 14 to allow the growth of fish population in the sea

posed ban on fishing in West Bengal, Odisha, Andhra Pradesh, Puducherry, Andaman Nicobar islands on the eastern coast from April 15 to June 14 for a period of 61 days to allow the growth of fish population in the sea. Similar ban has also been imposed in Gujarat, Goa, Daman, Diu, Karnataka, Maharashtra, Kerala, Tamil Nadu and Lakshadweep on the western coast from June 1 to July 31 for a period of 61 days. Parida demanded the state government to intervene and supply them diesel at concessional rates, construction of cold storages and financial assistance to the fishermen during the fishing ban period. He said that the fish catch has dropped sharply while the rise in fuel

price has served a blow to their business. With a sharp drop in catch, fish traders suffer heavy loss in comparison to the expenses they incur in their business. As a result, they have voluntarily withdrawn from fish business due to drop in fish catch and ever increasing in establishment and maintenance costs. A local fisherman TB Ramanna said that fish catch has dropped as the fish are escaping to the deep sea due to blow of southern wind. Gone are those days when fishermen used to catch fish from the sea for 12 months in a year. Environmentalist and engineer Amaresh Naresh Samant blamed climate change, rampant industrialisation and increasing environmental pollution for decline in fish population in the sea. Another main reason is the use of ring nets and phasi nets that catch the mother fish along with the fingerlings, Samant said.

YOUTH BLUDGEONS BROTHER TO DEATH

Berhampur, April 6: A youth bludgeoned his younger brother to death with a dumbbell over a property dispute behind Gosaninuaagaon police station in Silk City, Wednesday. The victim was identified as Surendra Behera, 31, alias Budu, son of Seema Behera of 10th lane, Nehru Nagar here. The accused Purna Behera, 35, surrendered at the police station after the murder. Police sent the body for post-mortem and launched an investigation. A scientific team was also pressed into service and the blood-stained dumbbells were also seized from the spot. Police arrested the accused after registering a case over a complaint filed by the mother of the deceased and the accused. Preliminary inquiry by police suggested the woman Seema Behera had received a house-106, Block-B at 10th lane in Nehru Nagar under the Centre-sponsored Rajiv Awas

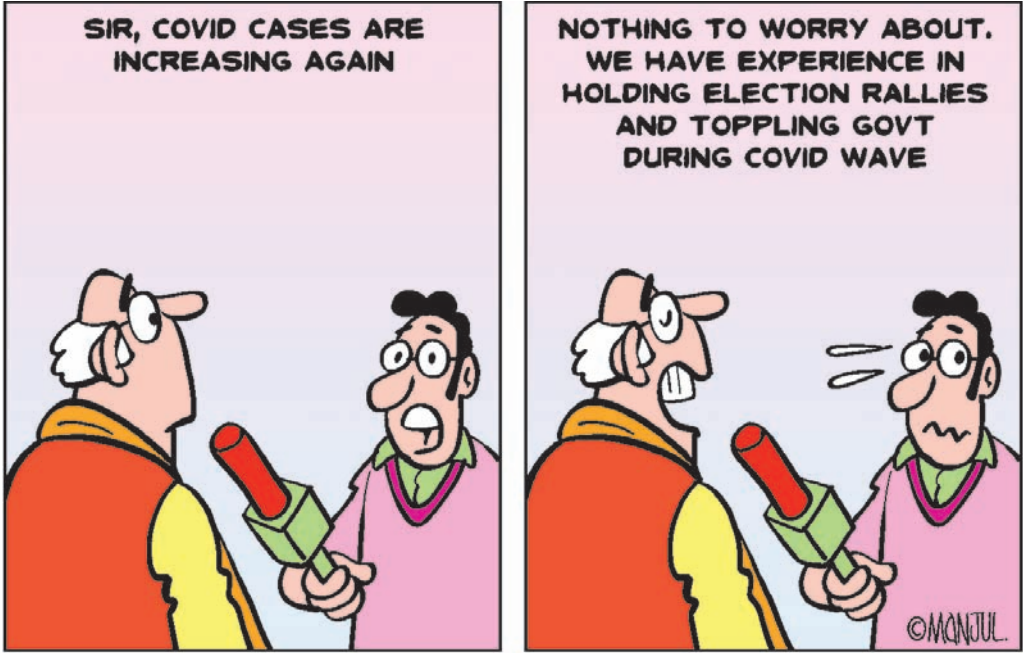


Yojana (RAY). The woman was staying in the house with her three sons. The eldest son was disabled. The house was the bone of contention between the two other siblings as the deceased was the nominee of the house owned in the name of their mother. This enraged Purna as he decided to eliminate Surendra. The incident occurred when their mother left the house to go to work Thursday morning. The eldest son had also gone out on some work. The matter came to the fore when Seema returned home at 9am and found her younger son lying dead in a pool of blood. She rushed to the police station and informed the police. There she found her middle son who had surrendered at the police station and admitted to his crime.

Public hearing held for expansion of sponge iron plant

Keonjhar: The expansion of MSP sponge iron plant at Haldiaguna village under Sadar block in Keonjhar got a boost as locals of the affected areas extended their support to its expansion at a public hearing camp, a report said Thursday. Chief Development Officer cum executive officer of Keonjhar ZP Bishnu Prasad Acharya presided over the public hearing camp held Wednesday. The integrated steel project will carry out its expansion at an expense of Rs 758 crore. The public hearing camp was held to gauge people's opinion on the effects of the expansion on the adjoining areas on the basis of rules framed by Union Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change. At the outset, Pradip Dey, director of the MSP sponge iron plant read out the projects details. He said that the plant when expanded will result in employment of 760 persons while works on peripheral development will be undertaken under the firm's CSR programme.

Rourkela, April 6: Odisha Police busted an IPL betting racket in Rourkela steel city and arrested six persons in connection with it, a police official said Thursday. The six were arrested in a police raid at a house in the city's civil township area Wednesday night after receiving information about the racket, the official said. Eight bank accounts, which had a total amount of Rs 2.5 lakh in them, being used by the alleged fraudsters were blocked, the police said in a release. No details were released by the police as to which match the bet-



ting was being done on. An IPL match was held between Kolkata Knight Riders and Royal Challengers Bangalore at the Eden Gardens in the eastern metropolis Thursday. The arrested are aged between 21 and 29 years. One of them hails

from Uttar Pradesh, one from Maharashtra and the rest from Chhattisgarh. The police seized 20 mobile phones, three laptops, four ATM cards of different banks, laptop and mobile phone chargers, besides extension cords. They have been booked under various sections of the Indian Penal Code, the police said. A police official said, "We have so far arrested six people. They tried to escape from the scene by pushing us. However, our alert personnel nabbed them." Asked about Rourkela being a hideout for IPL betting, he said, "We are still investigating the case."

Tribals make hay with natural farming

55 FARMERS ENGAGED IN ORGANIC FARMING ON OVER 80 ACRE LAND UNDER A PILOT PROGRAMME AT TELIGHANA VILLAGE OF KUTRA BLOCK IN SUNDARGARH DISTRICT

Sundargarh, April 6: Environment-friendly farming methods and chemical-free produce are the prime focus of agriculture in today's time. Going by this mantra, Integrated Tribal Development Agency (ITDA), Sundargarh promotes natural farming in its command area benefiting especially the tribal farmers in the district. Natural farming was started on a pilot basis during FY 2022-23 at Telighana village of Kutra block in Sundargarh district. Farmers from tribal families were engaged in the program. "In the tribal majority Sundargarh district, natural farming is being encouraged to restrict the use of chemical fertilisers and pesticides. The farmers have also shown a keen interest towards natural farming. There is a sure shot market demand for crops grown naturally. The pilot programme at Telighana will soon be expanded to other parts of the district," says ITDA, Sundargarh Project Administrator Ram Krishna Gond. The productivity of agricultural land gets degraded upon using chemical fertilisers and insecticides while also negatively impacting the envi-



ronment. ITDA Sundargarh sensitises the tribal farmers on the same while extending necessary support to pursue natural farming. District Mineral Foundation (DMF) Sundargarh extends financial assistance towards the same. 55 farmers of Telighana village are engaged in natural farming. Rice and groundnut cultivation was done

on 80 acre land. Traditional grains and natural fertilisers were given to the farmers free of cost. "Earlier, we used chemical fertilisers in the field. Then, officials from ITDA, Sundargarh came and explained the benefit of natural farming to us. We were interested in natural farming and started with rice and groundnut cultivation. The yield was

also good," says Eman Budu, a farmer from Telighana village. "Chemical fertiliser and pesticide proved heavy for our pockets. Now, by opting for natural farming, our costs have reduced. Along with rice and groundnut, we grow vegetables using this method. Apart from a good harvest, the produce sells well in the market," shares Bimla Barla, a woman farmer. Natural inputs like Jeevamruta, Ghana Jeevamruta, Dasaparni Arka, Bramhastra, Neemastra and Beejamruta are provided to farmers for use in cultivation. ITDA, Sundargarh trained the farmers on preparing the above nutrients themselves. The organic manure can be produced using cow dung, cow urine, droppings of other domestic animals, gur (sugar molasses) and besan (gram flour). Prior to starting the pilot programme, officials of ITDA, Sundargarh undertook a field survey at Telighana village. The farmers then prepared the land for rice and groundnut cultivation. The mandays for the same were provided under Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (MGNREGS).

The submission was made by Attorney General R Venkataramani before a bench of Chief Justice D Y Chandrachud and Justice J B Pardiwala during the hearing of a PIL challenging a CrPC provision related to service of summons only to a family's male member if an accused in a criminal case is unavailable.

The central government is actively considering amendments in criminal laws, the law officer said, adding, "Consultations have taken place. In fact, I have personally asked the government to take an active role in this. Some of this (amendments) has to do with the sedition laws."

Goyal described Anil Antony as a "very grounded political worker" who was convinced that the BJP cared for the country and also shared the prime minister's vision of sustainable growth.

"Today (Maundy Thursday) is the day of Judas (Iscaiot) who betrayed Jesus Christ for a payment of 30 silver coins. Many such things will happen on that day. This (Anil joining BJP) should also be seen as such an incident," Kerala Congress President K

Sudhakaran said in Thiruvananthapuram.

Soon after joining the BJP, Anil Antony began his address with a verse 'Dharmo Rakshati Rakshitah' from epic Mahabharat. The verse loosely translates into 'Dharma (religion) or state of law protects those who protect it'. "I believe in Dharma Rakshati Rakshitah. Nowadays, some Congress leaders believe that it is their dharma (duty) to serve the interests of a family. But, I believe that it is my duty to serve the nation," Anil Antony said.

JAIN'S BAIL PLEA DISMISSED

New Delhi, April 6: The Delhi High Court Thursday dismissed the bail plea of former Delhi minister Satyendar Jain in a money laundering case being probed by the Enforcement Directorate (ED), noting the witnesses' claim that he was the conceptualiser, initiator and fund provider in the alleged crime.

The high court said the senior AAP leader was an influential person having the potential to tamper with evi-



dence. It "out-rightly" rejected Jain's submission that he was not found in physical possession of any property, saying for the offence of money laundering physical possession of the pro-

ceeds of crime is not necessary.

Satyendar Jain, who was arrested May 30 last year by the ED, is accused of having laundered money through four companies allegedly linked to him. Justice Dinesh Kumar Sharma also rejected the bail pleas of Vaibhav Jain and Ankush Jain, the co-accused in the case. "The petitioner Satyendar Kumar Jain is an influential person and has a potential to tamper with the evidence as indicated by his conduct during the custody," the judge said.

The AG sought adjournment and requested that the matter be listed after the monsoon session of Parliament. "We are informed that amendments in CrPC and the IPC

are under active consideration," the bench said and fixed the PIL filed by Kush Kalra for further hearing in the last week of July.

Earlier, the top court had November 21 last year issued a notice to the Centre besides seeking the attorney general's assistance on the PIL challenging a CrPC provision related to service of summons on a fam-

ily's male member alone if an accused in a criminal case is not available. The plea alleged the provision discriminates between male and female and is violative of various fundamental rights, including the right to equality.

"Service when persons summoned cannot be found: Where the person summoned cannot, by the exercise of due diligence, be found, the summons may be served by leaving one of the duplicates for him with some adult male member of his family residing with him, and the person with whom the summons is so left shall, if so required by the serving officer, sign a receipt thereon on the back of the other duplicate," reads section 64 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. The PIL said the provision provides for serving the summons only to male members of the house if the accused is not found and this is violative of various fundamental rights.

Oppn shows unity, slams govt

New Delhi, April 6: Opposition parties, including the Congress, TMC, BRS and Samajwadi Party, came together in a show of unity Thursday and accused the Modi government of getting the second half of the budget session "washed out", while asserting that if this attitude continues, the country will move towards "dictatorship".

Kharage accused the Narendra Modi government of not walking the talk on democratic principles and causing disruptions in Parliament to divert attention from the Opposition's demand for a joint parliamentary committee (JPC) probe into the Adani issue.

In a boost to Opposition unity, the Trinamool Congress, Bharat Rashtra Samithi, the Aam Aadmi Party and the Samajwadi Party, which had been blowing hot and cold on sharing stage with the Congress on earlier occasions, participated in the march and the presser to give a joint call against



the government on issues such as the Adani matter, price rise and alleged attack on democracy.

Most Opposition leaders also skipped Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla's customary tea in his chamber in Parliament at the end of the session. However, National Conference's Farooq Abdullah and Nationalist Congress Party's Supriya Sule were present for the tea. In his remarks at the press conference, Kharage said, "The budget of Rs 50-lakh crore was passed in just 12 minutes, but they (BJP) always alleged that the opposition parties have no interest and they kept disturbing the House."

Asked if Rahul Gandhi was the

prime challenger to Prime Minister Narendra Modi, DMK's T R Baalu claimed that the BJP is jittery and after the Bharat Jodo Yatra it is afraid of Rahul Gandhi.

BRS MP K Keshava Rao said the parties on the podium had "distance and differences" between them but were now working to come together. To a query on the Opposition's leadership issue, Rao said, "Why are you are always obsessed with the leadership issue, a nation will certainly be led by a person, led by a combination of ideologies and the programmes. What we are trying to do is to see that kind of programme is on the board that we are all on the same page."

AAP's Sanjay Singh said the message behind Rahul Gandhi's disqualification was clear that one can attack the Centre but not Adani "for whom the government was working". Kharage said 18 to 19 opposition parties raised the Adani matter and how his wealth increased to Rs 12 lakh crore in just a period of 2 to 2.5 years.

Imran's interim bail extended

Islamabad: A Pakistani high court Thursday extended the interim bail of former Prime Minister Imran Khan in eight cases, including last month's judicial complex riot case, till April 18. A two-member bench of the Islamabad High Court, headed by Chief Justice Aamer Farooq, heard the bail pleas by the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) chief, who was not present at the hearing. The court accepted an exemption request from Thursday's attendance in all the cases filed by the PTI chief's lawyer.

Four kids stabbed to death in Brazil

Brasilia: A 25-year-old man stabbed at least four children to death at a kindergarten in Brazil, officials said. The attacker, who turned himself in to authorities after the attack on Wednesday, also left several children injured in the tragic incident in the town of Blumenau in Santa Catarina state, reports Xinhua news agency. The victims were three boys and a girl aged four to seven. According to the police, the perpetrator entered the kindergarten by jumping over a wall.

Tornado kills five

Glen Allen (US): A tornado ripped through southeastern Missouri before dawn on Wednesday, killing five people and causing widespread destruction as the third in a series of deadly massive storms over the past two weeks struck the nation's heartland. Forecasters are keeping a wary eye out for more extreme weather as this year's early severe storm season continues.

Pilot safely lands plane after cobra shows up in cockpit

Johannesburg, April 6: Pilots are normally trained for a number of worst-case scenarios, but certainly not for dealing with a snake in the cockpit.

But South African pilot Rudolf Erasmus has just done that. Erasmus has been lauded by flight experts for a safe emergency landing after a highly venomous Cape cobra reared its head in the cockpit mid-flight. Erasmus, who has been flying for the past five years, maintained his nerve as the cobra slid back under his seat as soon

as he saw it.

He was flying a small Beachcraft plane with four passengers on Monday morning, from Worcester to Nelspruit. Erasmus explained his dilemma to the website TimesLive. "When we did the preflight (procedure) on Monday morning, the people at Worcester airfield told us they had seen a Cape cobra lying underneath the wing on Sunday afternoon. They tried to catch it themselves but unfortunately it sought refuge inside the engine cowlings. The group opened the cowlings but the snake was not there so they assumed it had slith-

ered away," he said.

"I usually travel with a water bottle that I lodge between my leg and my hip towards the side wall of the aircraft. When I felt this cold sensation where my love handles are, I thought my bottle was dripping. As I turned to my left and looked down, I saw the cobra putting its head back underneath my seat," Erasmus said.

He said that for a moment he

was stunned silent. "I had a moment of stunned silence, not sure if I should tell the passengers because I didn't want to cause a panic. But obviously they needed to know at some point what was going on," he said.

"I just said, 'listen, there's a problem. The snake is inside the aircraft. I've got a feeling it's under my seat so we are going to have to get the plane on the ground as soon as

possible," he said. "We were cruising at 11,000 feet in the air when I felt something cold against my hip," Rudolf Erasmus said.

The flight was close to the airport at Welkom, so Erasmus declared an emergency with the control tower in Johannesburg. "I told them I had an unwelcomed passenger. As soon as the aircraft came to a stop, we started getting out. The three passengers in the back came out first and then the one sitting in front with me," Erasmus said.

"I got out last and as I rolled the seat forward, I saw it curled underneath my seat. We contacted a few people around trying to get some snake handlers but by the time they arrived it had disappeared inside the aircraft again," Erasmus said. Engineers stripped

parts of the plane in an attempt to find the snake but were unsuccessful by the time night fell, when they decided to continue the next morning.

They also left some maize meal around the plane, to see if the cobra perhaps slithered out during the night, but this was still undisturbed the next morning.

Erasmus said they are hoping it found its way out earlier while they were waiting for the engineers. Aviation specialist and SA chief air show commentator Brian Emmenis, who has been in aviation for 38 years, told the website Erasmus had displayed "the greatest skill in aviation". Emmenis said he had never heard of such a case in his four decades in the aviation industry.

Xi willing to call Zelenskyy: EU chief

Beijing, April 6: China's Xi Jinping expressed willingness to speak to Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, the head of the EU said Thursday, after French President Emmanuel Macron urged Beijing to talk sense to Russia over the war in Ukraine.

In closely watched talks, EU chief Ursula von der Leyen and Macron met with Xi in Beijing. Macron said the West must engage China to help end the crisis and prevent "spiral-ling" tensions that could split global powers into warring blocs.

Xi, who has sought to position China as a potential mediator in the conflict but is seen by the West as favouring Russia, responded by saying he hoped Moscow and Kyiv could hold peace negotiations as soon as possible.

"It was interesting to hear that President Xi reiterated his willingness to speak" to Zelenskyy, Von der Leyen said, calling his words "positive". Xi said a conversation could happen when the

"conditions and time are right", she added.

Zelenskyy has repeatedly asked Xi to meet him, including after the Chinese leader visited Russia's President Vladimir Putin in Moscow last month. A French diplomatic source said that Xi was "ready" to call Zelenskyy. "The Russian aggression in Ukraine has dealt a

blow to (international) stability," Macron told Xi, standing alongside the Chinese president outside the Great Hall of the People at the start of their bilateral meeting. "I know I can count on you to bring Russia back to its senses and every-one back to the negotiating table."

China has proposed a 12-point peace plan for the Ukraine crisis

that calls on both sides to agree to a gradual de-escalation leading to a comprehensive ceasefire. The plan was largely dismissed by the West due to China's refusal to condemn Russia, and the United States and NATO then said China was considering sending arms to Russia, which Beijing has denied.

"Arming the aggressor is a clear violation of international law," von der Leyen said. "This would indeed significantly harm the relationship between the EU and China." The French diplomatic source said Macron had urged Xi not to provide weapons to Russia, and that Xi had replied that it was not his war. In comments after the meeting, Xi called for Ukraine and Russia to resume peace talks and find a political solution to the conflict. More than a year into a conflict that has claimed thousands of lives, there is little sign either side is keen to negotiate. France said the discussions between the leaders were "frank and constructive," while China described them as "friendly" and "in-depth".

ROCKETS FIRED FROM GAZA

Jerusalem, April 6: Palestinian militants fired a barrage of rockets early Thursday, setting off air raid sirens in southern Israel, as violence erupted for the second day in a row during a sensitive period of overlapping holidays.

The Israeli military said seven rockets launched from the Gaza Strip all exploded in midair. No group claimed responsibility for the barrage. The barrage came after another tense night at Jerusalem's most sensitive holy site, the Al-Aqsa Mosque, where Israeli police clashed with Muslim worshippers attempting to stay overnight.

Since Ramadan began March 22, scores of Muslims have repeatedly tried to stay overnight in the mosque, a practice that is typically permitted only during the last 10 days of the month long holiday. Israeli police have entered nightly

to evict the worshippers, but on Tuesday the scene erupted in violence.

Worshippers threw stones and firecrackers at police, who responded with beatings that left dozens bloody and the arrest of hundreds. On Wednesday, the Israeli police made no arrests but did detain and question some Palestinians, a spokesperson said.

The Palestinian Red Crescent said it was not allowed into the compound Wednesday, but dozens were injured from beatings, rubber bullets and stun grenades, including an ambulance driver. Israeli newspaper Haaretz said protests on Wednesday night drew hundreds in communities across Israel's north, home to many of Israel's Palestinian citizens, who make up one-fifth of its 9.6 million people. Police said they arrested five protesters in the large town of Um al-Fahm.

RECONCILIATORY MOVE

Beijing, April 6: Iran and Saudia Arabia have agreed to jointly pursue economic stability, the Iranian foreign minister said Thursday, as well as reopen missions in their respective countries as the regional rivals stepped toward reconciliation after seven years of tension.

Iranian Foreign Minister Hossein Amirabdollahian made the announcement in a tweet after talks with his Saudi counterpart, Prince Faisal bin Farhan Al Saud, in Beijing. The ministers also agreed Thursday to reopen embassies in the countries' respective capitals and representative offices in two other major cities.

The rapprochement not only lowers the chance of armed conflict between the Mideast rivals – both directly and in proxy conflicts around the region – but also rep-



resents a major diplomatic victory for the Chinese as Gulf Arab states perceive the United States slowly withdrawing from the wider region.

It comes as diplomats have been trying to end a long war in Yemen,

a conflict in which both Iran and Saudi Arabia are deeply entrenched. Amirabdollahian's tweet came after Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Mao Ning said foreign ministers from both nations had signed a joint statement and expressed their determination to improve ties in line with their talks in Beijing last month.

The official Iranian news agency, IRNA, said that as part of Thursday's agreement, the two long-time regional rivals would reopen representative offices in their respective capitals and in two other major cities — Mashhad in Iran and Jeddah in Saudi Arabia.

Temple vandalised

Toronto, April 6: A prominent Hindu temple in Canada's Ontario province has been vandalised by unknown people with "anti-Hindu and anti-India graffiti", in what is described by police as a "hate-motivated incident."

In a statement, the police in Ontario's Windsor city said on Wednesday that it has launched an investigation into the incident and looking for two suspects. The High Commission of India in Ottawa, Canada has strongly condemned the act of vandalism.

"We have taken up with the Canadian authorities the hateful act of putting anti India graffiti on the walls of BAPS Swaminarayan temple in Windsor. We strongly condemn this act of vandalism," the mission said in a tweet.

The Windsor Police Service said officers were dispatched to the Hindu temple in the 1700 block of the Northway Avenue following a report of hate-motivated vandalism on Wednesday. "Officers discovered anti-Hindu and anti-India graffiti sprayed in black on an exterior wall of the building," the police said in a statement.

The Windsor Police Service was investigating vandalism at the temple "as a hate-motivated incident," the statement said. Through investigation, officers obtained a video that shows two suspects in the area just after 12 a.m. In the video, one suspect appears to commit the vandalism on the wall of the building while the other keeps watch, it said.

At the time of the incident, one suspect wore a black sweater, black pants with a small white logo on the left leg, and black and white high-top running shoes. The second suspect wore black pants, a sweatshirt black shoes, and white socks. Police asked residents in the immediate vicinity of the temple to check their home surveillance or dashcam video footage for evidence of the suspects.

Govt revises gas pricing formula

New Delhi, April 6: The Union Cabinet Thursday approved a revision in the formula for pricing of natural gas and imposed cap or ceiling price to help cut CNG and piped cooking gas prices by up to 10 per cent.

Natural gas produced from legacy or old fields, known as APM gas, will now be indexed to the price of imported crude oil instead of benchmarking it to gas prices in four surplus nations such as the US, Canada and Russia, Union I&B Minister Anurag Thakur told reporters.

APM gas will be priced at 10 per cent of the price of a basket of crude oil that India imports (Indian basket of crude oil). The rate such arrived at however will be capped at \$6.5 per million British thermal unit. There will also be a floor or base price of \$4 per mmbtu.

The ceiling price is lower than the current rate of \$8.57 per mmbtu and would translate into a reduction in prices of piped cooking gas as well as CNG sold to automobiles, he said. Piped cooking gas prices will be cut by up to 10 per cent across cities while CNG will see a little lower reduction, he said.

Rates of piped cooking gas, called PNG, and CNG have jumped 80 per cent in one year to August 2022. Following the decision, the CNG price in Delhi will be cut from ₹79.56 per kg to ₹73.59 and that of PNG from ₹53.59 per thousand cubic meters to ₹47.59. In Mumbai, CNG will cost ₹79 per kg instead of ₹87 and PNG will cost ₹49 per scm instead of ₹54.

The Indian basket of crude oil is currently priced at \$85 per barrel and 10 per cent of that translates into a price of \$8.5 but the cap would mean the APM gas produces, ONGC and Oil India Ltd would get only \$6.5 per mmbtu.

5-year global growth outlook weakest since '90, warns IMF

IMF notes India and China would account for half of global growth in 2023, but about 90% of advanced economies would see a decline in their growth rate this year

Washington, April 6: The International Monetary Fund expects global economic growth to dip below 3% in 2023 and to remain around 3% for the next five years, IMF Managing Director Kristalina Georgieva said in prepared remarks Thursday.

That is the global lender's lowest medium-term growth forecast since 1990, and well below the average growth of 3.8% seen in the past two decades.

Georgieva said strong and co-ordinated monetary and fiscal policy actions to respond to the Covid-19 pandemic and Russia's invasion of Ukraine had prevented a much worse outcome in recent years, but growth prospects remained weak in both the near- and medium-term given persistently high inflation.

"Despite surprisingly resilient labor markets and consumer spending in most advanced economies, and the uplift from China's re-opening, we expect the world economy to grow less than 3 percent in

RBI cuts inflation target for FY24

RBI SLASHES INFLATION PROJECTION TO 5.2% IN FY24 AMID ADVERSE CLIMATE, UNCERTAINTY IN GLOBAL FINANCIAL MARKETS AS RISKS

New Delhi, April 6: The Reserve Bank Thursday marginally cut retail inflation projection to 5.2 per cent in the current fiscal, but flagged adverse climatic conditions and rising uncertainty in international financial markets as future risks.

Although the expectation of a record Rabi harvest bodes well for easing of food price pressures, milk prices are likely to remain firm going into the summer season due to tight demand-supply balance and fodder cost pressures, RBI said.

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) Thursday decided to keep the key benchmark policy rate at 6.5 per cent even as inflation is trending above its tolerance level.

The rate hike has been paused after six consecutive rate increases aggregating to 250 basis points since May 2022.

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) had earlier projected the gross domestic product (GDP) at 6.4 per cent. India's GDP is expected to have recorded a growth of 7.0 per cent in 2022-23. The World Bank in its latest 'India Development Update' (IDU) has slashed the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) forecast to 6.3 per cent, against the earlier estimate of 6.6 per cent in 2023-24. Asian Development Bank also expects India's economic growth to moderate to 6.4 per cent due to tight monetary conditions and elevated oil prices, as compared to 6.8 per cent expansion for the financial year ended March 2023.

financial, banking and auto shares. The rupee declined by 12 paise to close at 82.02 against the US dollar on Thursday as the RBI decided to keep the key benchmark policy rate at 6.5 per cent. Strict rules for internet firms

New Delhi, April 6: Internet firms like Google, Facebook and Twitter may lose protection under safe harbour if they fail to remove content identified by the government-notified fact-checker as false or misleading information, Minister of State for Electronics and IT Rajeev Chandrasekhar said Thursday.

He said that fact-checkers are a reference point to fight against misinformation and rejected arguments that it will adversely impact "free speech".

"If you want section 79 safe harbour protection as an intermediary then you have some obligation. The obligation is that you have to be proactive on misinformation. If you choose to have a disagreement with the fact checker, you can continue to have that on your platform but then the person who has been aggrieved by that disinformation and you will have a legitimate dispute in the court ... Section 79 was a safe harbour. That will get removed," he said.

Internet platforms and social media platforms such as Google, Facebook, Twitter, and internet service providers etc fall within the ambit of an intermediary.

The safe harbour clause protects intermediaries from legal action on them for any objectionable content posted online by their users.

The IT ministry will notify an entity that will flag false information posted online pertaining to the government, Chandrasekhar said.

While releasing guidelines under the IT rules 2021, the minister said that the work on fact check is still in progress.

"Government has decided to notify an entity through MeitY and that organisation then would be the fact checker for all aspects of content online and only those content that are related to the government," he said.

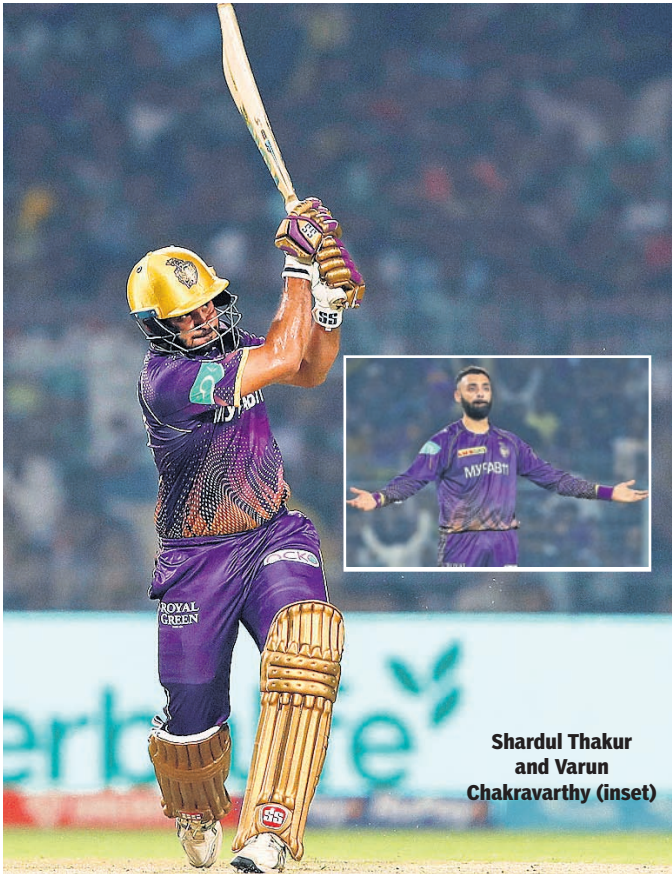
KKR found themselves tottering for 89/5 before Thakur led a superb recovery with his knock to power his team to 204/7 after RCB opted to bowl.

Barcelona, April 6: Barcelona entered the final 'clasico' of the season with a chance of earning a fourth straight win against Real Madrid in the same season for the first time. But when it was all over, they had endured one of their worst ever home losses to their archrival.

With another hat-trick by Karim Benzema, Madrid overturned Barcelona's advantage in the Copa del Rey semifinals with a resounding 4-0 win at Camp Nou Stadium to reach the final for the first time in nearly a decade. Madrid hadn't beaten Barcelona by four goals at Camp Nou since a 5-1 win in 1963.

Vinicius Junior also scored as Madrid advanced 4-1 on aggregate after having lost the first leg 1-0 at home. Benzema also had a hat-trick in Madrid's 6-0 rout of Valladolid in the Spanish league Sunday.



Madrid will face Osasuna in the May 6 final in Seville. Osasuna eliminated Athletic Bilbao 2-1 on

aggregate after a 1-1 draw in extra time Tuesday in Bilbao, reaching the final for the first time since

losing the title match against Real Betis in 2005. Madrid hadn't made it to the final since 2014, when they beat Barcelona to win the last of their 19 Copa titles.

Barcelona, the tournament's most successful club with 31 titles, were trying to return to the final for the first time since winning it in 2021 for their last triumph with Lionel Messi still in the squad.

With the win, Madrid avoided losing four straight matches to Barcelona in the same season for the first time. Madrid won 3-1 in the first "clasico" of the season in the Spanish league, but since then had lost 3-1 in the Spanish Super Cup final, 1-0 in the first leg of the Copa semifinal and 2-1 in the other league match.

Barcelona coach Xavi was trying to win four 'clasicos' in the same season and repeat a feat last achieved when Pep Guardiola won five in a row from 2008-10. Barcelona beat Madrid four times in 1982-83, but not in consecutive matches.

With 1200.66 total points, the Igor Stimac-coached team is, however, at 19th place among 46 Asian nations. India's best ranking was 94th, attained in 1996. World Champions Argentina rose one place to be on top of the list, followed by France, Brazil, Belgium, England, Netherlands, Croatia, Italy, Portugal and Spain in the top 10. Japan are the top-ranked side among the Asian countries.
