Ramakrushna suspended over Digha temple row

Puri: In a significant move, Shree Jagannath Temple Administration (SJTA) Sunday suspended Daitapati sevitor of the 12th century shrine here, Ramakrushna Dasmohapatra, for his involvement in consecration of Digha Jagannath Temple in West Bengal last month. According to an official order, Ramakrushna has been barred from performing any rituals or entering Puri Srimandir during the suspension period of 30 days. The suspension was imposed due to actions deemed damaging to the image of Srimandir, as stated by the SJTA Chief in a press release. The order further stipulates that Ramakrushna must not attempt to intimidate members of his Nijog or others involved in the incident, nor interfere with the rituals of the temple. **P3**

40 Pak military personnel killed in combat: Forces

New Delhi, May 11: India has inflicted tremendous losses to the Pakistan military, including downing a few of its fighter jets featuring latest technologies and damaging key military installations close to even capital Islamabad, during the three-day confrontation between the two sides, the Indian military said Sunday.

Director General of Military Operations (DGMO) Lt Gen Rajiv Ghai said 35-40 Pakistani military personnel were killed in the combat and New Delhi achieved its desired objectives and that Pakistan will have to pay a very heavy price if it resorts to any more misadventure. The Indian military also acknowledged suffering some losses but declined to provide the details as the operations are going on. "We are in a combat scenario. Losses are a part

of combat. The question to be asked is, have we achieved our objectives of decimating the terrorist camps? The answer is a thumping yes," Director General Air Operations Air Marshal AK Bharti said at a media briefing here.

"All I can say is that we have achieved our objectives that we selected and all our pilots are back home," he said. Director General of Naval Operations Vice Admiral AN Pramod said the forward deployment of the Indian Navy compelled Pakistani naval and air units to be in a defensive posture, mostly inside harbours or very close to their coast.

Lt Gen Ghai said over 100 terrorists, including high-value targets such as Yusuf Azhar, Abdul Malik Rauf and Mudasar Ahmed who were involved in the hijacking of IC-814 and the Pulwama blast, were eliminated during Operation Sindoor early May 7.

No mediation on Kashmir: India

New Delhi, May 11: India will never accept mediation in the Kashmir issue and the only matter to discuss is Pakistan returning the territory which is under its illegal occupation, government sources said Sunday.

"The only matter related to Kashmir to discuss is Pakistan returning territory under its illegal occupation," they asserted.

Stating that Operation Sindoor is not concluded and there is a 'new normal' in India's response to cross-border terrorism, sources said India has called Pakistan's nuclear bluff with the operation and sent a psychological message to state-sponsored terrorists: nobody is untouchable and no place in Pakistan is safe for you.

The sources also emphasised that the confrontation never reached the stage of a nuclear conflict which has been the greatest fear and threat used by Pakistan, whose military is vastly smaller than India's.

However, the nuclear deterrence has given it some amount of parity, they said.

"We have called their nuclear deterrence bluff. We take the nuclear threat seriously, but it cannot serve as cover for Pakistan to come and do terrorism in our country," said a senior source.

"The new normal is that the Line of Control will not protect you; the international border will not protect you; the nuclear threat will not protect you," the source said.

"The message that has been sent is that no matter where you are in Pakistan, we will hit you. On this occasion, we have gone after the head of the snake and not foot soldiers," it said. The sources said Indian action demonstrated its new approach to kill terrorists within Pakistan.

Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri Saturday evening announced that India and Pakistan reached an understanding to stop all firings and military actions on land, air and sea, with immediate effect, after four days of intense cross-border drone and missile strikes.

The development was first announced by US President Donald Trump, who claimed that the two countries had agreed to a 'full and immediate ceasefire' after US mediation.

In a statement, US Secretary of State Marco Rubio said he was 'pleased to announce the Governments of India and Pakistan have agreed to an immediate ceasefire and to start talks on a broad set of issues at a neutral site'.

They made it clear that the Indus Waters Treaty will be in abeyance as long as terrorism sponsored by Pakistan against India continues.

Only talks with Pakistan will be through the Director General

Canons for bullets: PM

India has set a 'new normal' in response to Pakistan-backed cross-border terrorism through Operation Sindoor and Prime Minister Narendra Modi directed the armed forces that Indian retaliation to any action by the Pakistani military should be 'bigger and stronger', government sources said. "Wahan se goli chalegi, toh yahan se gola chalega (If they fire bullets, we will respond with cannons)," one of the sources quoted PM Modi as saying following the Pakistani actions. Operation Sindoor is not concluded yet and the cost of cross-border terrorism will be raised as Pakistan can't continue with terrorism while expecting cooperation in areas of its choosing, the sources said. When asked whether Operation Sindoor managed to fulfil the Prime Minister's instructions, a senior government source said, "Markaz ko mitti mei mila diya hai; age ka bhi dekhenge". He was referring to precision strikes on nine terrorist training sites and headquarters on the early morning of May 7.

Oppn demands special session

New Delhi, May 11: Some Opposition parties Sunday demanded a special session of Parliament to discuss the Pahalgam attack and Operation Sindoor, and questioned the government if it was open to third-party mediation on Kashmir after the US made announcements on behalf of India and Pakistan.

The Congress, RJD, Shiv Sena (UBT) and the Left also demanded an all-party meeting to discuss the situation in wake of the hostilities with Pakistan.

Some parties questioned the US role in announcing the cessation of the military standoff. The Congress demanded answers on whether the government had

accepted third-party mediation on Kashmir after the US made announcements on behalf of India and Pakistan. It also slammed attempts to 'internationalise' the issue and 'hyphenate' the two countries.

Congress general secretary Jairam Ramesh posed several questions to the government, including if New Delhi had opened the doors to third-party intervention. The demands came after India and Pakistan Saturday reached an understanding to stop all firings and military actions on land, air and sea after four days of intense cross-border drone and missile strikes. There were violations of the agreement as Pakistan resorted to cross-border firing within hours of its announcement.




'Actors should have some discretion'







11 held for shooting at bar bouncer in City

Bhubaneswar, May 11: A day after a bouncer in a bar at Chandrasekharpur here suffered bullet injuries during a fracas with some miscreants, the Commissionerate Police Sunday arrested 11 persons in connection with the incident.

"The condition of injured bouncer Surjyakanta Pradhan, who is recuperating at a private hospital here, is stable," said Deputy Commissioner of Police (DCP) Jagmohan Meena.

Addressing a presser, the DCP said the arrested were identified as Badal Swain, 21, Chinmay Kumar Dey, 21, Sahil Das, 23, Omkar Patra, 29, Ranjit Kumar Sahoo, 31, Alok Kumar Sahoo, 29, Achyutananda Lenka, 25, Jagrat Panda, 32, Babru Pradhan, 25, Asit Patra, 32, and Rajesh Nayak, 24. Among them, Rajesh Nayak was earlier booked by Badagada police and Airport police, while Badal Swain has been booked by Badagada police.

The arrests came following raids in Puri, Dhenkanal, An-

gul and Cuttack. A manhunt is underway to apprehend the remaining culprits involved in the case, Meena said.

Elaborating further, Meena said Surjyakanta, who lives in Salia Sahi slum, works as a bouncer at Cosmos Bar in Chandrasekharpur area.

It was around 1am Saturday when Surjyakanta asked the miscreants to leave the bar as it was time for closure for the day. This led to a heated exchange between them. Eventually, the men ganged up and assaulted Surjyakanta, said Meena. They also pelted stones on the bar. The miscreants exited the bar but did not leave the area.

Meena said around 4:30am, when Surjyakanta stepped out to check on the miscreants, the latter sprayed five rounds of bullets at him before escaping the scene.

Chandrasekharpur police has booked the 11 miscreants under Sections 126 (2), 109 (1), and 3 (5) of BNS, alongside Sections 25 and 27 of Arms Act. They were produced before a local court Sunday for remand.

Ramakrushna faces 30-day suspension

Puri, May 11: In a significant move, Shree Jagannath Temple Administration (SJTA) Sunday suspended Daitapati servitor of the 12th century shrine here, Ramakrushna Dasmohapatra, for his involvement in consecration of Digha Jagannath Temple in West Bengal last month.

According to an official order, Ramakrushna has been barred from performing any rituals or entering Puri Srimandir during the suspension period of 30 days. The suspension was imposed due to actions deemed damaging to the image of Srimandir, as stated by the SJTA Chief in a press release.

The order further stipulates that Ramakrushna must not attempt to intimidate members of his Nijog or others involved in the incident, nor interfere with the rituals of the temple. Any violation of these terms will result in an extended suspension and stricter disciplinary actions.

Security personnel and supervisors of the temple have been directed to closely monitor Ramakrushna's behavior and report any violations to the administration. Should he act against the interests of Srimandir or disobey the chief administrator's directives, any pending payments for past services may be withheld or forfeited.

Previously, the SJTA had issued two show-cause notices to Ramakrushna. The first, dated May 4, questioned his claim—publicly made in the media—that the idols (Bigrahas) for the Digha Jagannath temple were carved from surplus sacred wood left over from 2015 Na-



bakalebar ceremony of Lord Jagannath and his siblings. This statement reportedly shocked devotees and stirred emotional unrest, tarnishing the sanctity of the Puri temple.

Ramakrushna was asked to respond within seven days.

The second notice, issued May 9, asked why he, as a servitor of Srimandir, participated in the consecration ceremony of a temple named "Jagannath Dham-Digha". He was also directed to clarify whether he had raised any objection to the temple being named as such.

SJTA Chief Administrator Arabinda Padhee said these disciplinary actions are part of an effort to restore order and reverence within the temple institution.

"It is our duty to shun pride and greed, and to uphold the glorious traditions of Srimandir. That is the highest form of service to Mahaprabhu Sri Jagannath," he stated, warning that indiscipline will not be tolerated.

The controversy erupted following an interview given by Ramakrushna, secretary of the Daita Nijog, to a Bengali television channel. In the interview, he reportedly claimed to have brought the Bigrahas of Lord Jagannath, Balabhadra, Subhadra, and Mahalaxmi to Digha, using leftover sacred Daru wood from the 2015 Nabakalebar ritual.

He consecrated these idols at Digha temple in West Bengal April 30, coinciding with the auspicious occasion of Akshaya Tritiya. The temple was inaugurated the same day by West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee.

The interview quickly went viral on social media, sparking outrage within the servitor community and among devotees. Amid mounting backlash, Ramakrushna convened a press conference where he retracted his earlier statement, claiming that only ordinary Neem wood—not sacred Daru—was used.

Given the intensity of the backlash, the SJTA Chief Administrator convened a meeting with office bearers (presidents and secretaries) of the Chhatisha Nijog to discuss the alleged unauthorised use of sacred Daru wood.

The four Biswakarmas—traditional temple carpenters who sculpted the idols during the 2015 Nabakalebar—were also questioned regarding the disposal of leftover Daru wood.

In the sacred Nabakalebar ritual, the deities receive newly carved bodies from specially chosen neem trees, and the Brahma (soul essence) is transferred from the old idols to the new ones in a secret midnight ceremony.


visionary leadership continues to propel India towards #AtmanirbharBharat in defence and beyond," Mjahi wrote on X.

Neglect shadows Boudh's glorious Buddhist heritage

Boudh, May 11: Once a flourishing centre of Buddhist religion, Boudh district—named after Lord Buddha himself, is dotted with ancient Buddhist relics that stand as proud witnesses to its illustrious past. Despite the historical and cultural significance, many of these sites today lie neglected and forgotten.

Once known as the ancient Buddhist Gadajat, the remnants include rare architectural marvels built thousands of years ago. These relics, not only offer a glimpse into Boudh's glorious heritage, but also hold immense potential for development of

heritage and cultural tourism. The banks of River Mahanadi, flowing through the district, hold many significant Buddhist sites. Notable sites, such as the grand statue of Lord Buddha at Rajbati in town, and ancient relics found at Shyam Sundarapur and Paragalpur in Harabhanga block are some of the important historical evidences.

Lord Buddha symbolises the essence of Buddhism as a religion—its culture, philosophy, and non-violent path. His teachings of truth and non-violence have deeply influenced the social and spiritual life of the region. Local traditions, spiritual practices, and the ideals,



followed by monks and saints in the district, are all rooted in the values preached by the Enlightened One.

A remarkable 6 ft X 9 inch idol of Lord Buddha, seated on a lotus in the Bhumisparsha mudra, is a sight of rejoice at Rajbati. Historians believe that the statue was once part of a

grand Buddhist temple, built during the reign of emperor Ashoka. However, the condition of the shrine housing the statue is now in a pitiful state.

Interestingly, people from the district regard the statue as a sacred place and offers prayers before beginning any auspicious cultural, social, or wedding ceremonies in the town—a testament to the continued spiritual significance the place holds. Locals also believe that taking the blessings of Lord Buddha before beginning any work becomes propitious.

In earlier times, people even worshipped Lord Buddha as 'Budha Raja', meaning the old king.

Former Boudh Collector Lalatendu Mishra had taken commendable steps to restore Boudh's identity as a Buddhist hub by installing Lord Buddha's statues at key entry points in the district—including Madhapur in Harabhanga block, Manamunda in Kantamal block, the Bridge Square in Boudh town, Mahanadi Park, and Baghaguda Square.

Many of these statues are now wallowing in neglect and in immediate need of maintenance and renovation. Many of these sites are also in a state of abandonment, sparking concern among local intellectuals and heritage lovers.

Severe heatwave grips state; Sambalpur hottest

Trump's ceasefire call stirs political debate



Odisha leaders raise questions on US President Donald Trump's intervention

Bhubaneswar, May 11: US President Donald Trump's announcement of a "full and immediate ceasefire" between India and Pakistan Saturday has sparked confusion, with political leaders questioning the intervention. The ceasefire was declared after three days of military escalation between the two countries.

However, hours after the announcement, Pakistan reportedly violated the ceasefire agreement along the International Border and Line of Control (LoC) in Jammu and Kashmir, including Srinagar, as well as parts of Punjab and Rajasthan. This raised doubts about Pakistan's commitment

ation like Indira Gandhi did," he said.

Kadam continued, "Our Indian army was in a strong position and fighting with all might. We will always be grateful to them. The Centre should clarify to all political parties about the developments leading to the ceasefire agreement."

CPI (M) state secretary Suresh Chandra Panigrahy, also questioned Trump's intervention. "Nobody wants war, and the ceasefire is welcome, but India, being a powerful nation, did not need Donald Trump's involvement in our affairs. The Indian government should convene an all-party meeting to clarify the circumstances surrounding the USA's intervention."

Nayagarh BJD MLA Arun Kumar Sahoo added, "All political parties, including the opposition, have supported the Central government's actions against Pakistan's terrorist attacks. However, Pakistan's violation of the ceasefire immediately after the announcement is causing confusion about the ceasefire's status. We urge the Centre to engage with the opposition and explain the developments clearly."

Kasturi Mishra, BJP state secretary, defended the decision, stating, "The opposition has every right to ask questions. PM Modi might have taken the ceasefire call after analysing the current diplomatic situation. This decision is appropriate and will yield positive results in the coming days."

Mishra emphasised, "While the war situation has boosted the morale of every countryman, we must also be cautious as war comes with a heavy price. Peace remains our priority, and the Centre's decision will have long-term benefits."

Despite accusations of violations from both sides, the ceasefire appeared to hold Sunday. During a press briefing, the Director General of Military Operations (DGMO) of the Indian military confirmed that the ceasefire was being followed.

They also stated that Operation Sindoor remains active, and if Pakistan again violates the ceasefire, the Indian armed forces will respond with equal intensity.

The political response to Trump's intervention as a mediator has been mixed.

Pottangi MLA and Odisha Congress Legislature Party chief Ramachandra Kadam expressed skepticism about Trump's role. "Everyone cannot be like Indira Gandhi," Kadam said, referring to the 1971 Indo-Pakistan war.

"We appreciate the ceasefire decision, but the intervention by the US President seems confusing. It clearly indicates that no leader can handle the situ-

them back their children, but we can offer them love, laughter, and a little happiness."

Many of these mothers were rescued from the streets. On this day, their smiles returned as volunteers stepped in as the children who never came back. Wrinkled faces lit up, stories flowed, and long-forgotten joy found its way back into tired hearts. The poignant celebration served as both a tribute to a mother's resilience and a reminder: honouring our elders shouldn't be reserved for just one day a year — it's a duty we all share, every day.

Swipe culture sparks mixed reactions among youth

As digital dating apps gain popularity in City, young adults navigate the shifting landscape of relationships, sparking both excitement and skepticism

Bhubaneswar, May 11: The digital dating wave sweeping across India has firmly reached Bhubaneswar, with a growing number of young adults exploring apps like Tinder, Bumble, Hinge, and OkCupid. As smartphones and internet access become increasingly affordable, Odisha's Capital city is witnessing a noticeable cultural shift—one that's both embraced and criticised.

India's dating app landscape has exploded in recent years. With over 1,700 platforms now active, ranging from casual flings to serious relationships and even matrimonial-style matchmaking, youth in cities like Bhubaneswar are navigating a world their parents never

imagined.

According to Forbes India, homegrown apps have seen a meteoric rise, growing from under 10 per cent market share in the early 2010s to nearly 50 per cent today. Their edge lies in understanding Indian sentiments—something international apps often miss.

But in Bhubaneswar, opinions are divided.

"People used to say matches are made in heaven. Now, it's done through an algorithm," said Subham Bhagat, an MBA student at DRIEMS University. "To be honest, most people are just looking for a time-pass. Only a handful might find something real," he observed.

Local universities, from Ut-

kal to Ravenshaw, are buzzing with debates over dating apps. Traditional platforms like Shaadi.com and Jeevansathi.com still hold ground, but even they are updating their approach to attract the app-savvy generation.

Dharitri Das, a post-graduate in Journalism from Rama Devi Women's University, shared, "I tried a few apps because they're everywhere—on Instagram, YouTube, even in local ads. Initially, it was exciting. But soon, it just felt hollow. You never really know who's on the other side." Not everyone is dismissive, though. "Apps can help people find

common interests," noted Ranjan Kumar Behera, a Philosophy postgraduate from Utkal University. "But too many options lead to confusion. Earlier, relationships were deep and meaningful. Now, it's like shopping—you keep swiping until you feel satisfied, and even then, you're unsure."

Some students have never even downloaded these apps. Ananya Dash, a Journalism PG student at Ravenshaw University, said, "It feels too fake. I believe in meeting people organically. There's something unsettling about digital matchmaking."



BA English student from Sri Sri University, Suparn Mishra echoed the same feeling. "Most profiles are edited or misleading. People rarely show their real side. Hookups are common, and genuine connections are rare. Honestly, dating apps are an escape for people who don't want to face the complexities of real-world relationships."

Experts in the City are noticing the shift too. Sidharth Mishra, a research scholar in Clinical Psychology based in Bhubaneswar, said, "Swipe culture mimics addiction cycles. Many young people

seek constant dopamine highs through endless swiping. It's not about connection anymore—it's about validation."

A Bhubaneswar-based lawyer and state head of the Mediators Council of India, Sangita Majhi said, "Dating apps are both a blessing and a curse. They give young people freedom, but also expose them to manipulation and cybercrime."

"These platforms must be used responsibly. Our traditional relationship values are being challenged, and that's not necessarily a bad thing—but it does demand awareness and balance," she added.

NHRC seeks ATR from CS on condition of Dongria Kondhs

Kendrapara, May 11: The National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) has sought an Action Taken Report (ATR) from the Chief Secretary regarding the precarious living conditions of over 10,000 families belonging to the Dongria Kondh community, a Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Group (PVTG).

This action follows a petition filed by rights activist Radhakanta Tripathy, which highlighted the persistent deprivation of basic human rights—including healthcare, education, and essential amenities—faced by the Dongria Kondh community and other

for an in-depth, independent, and impartial investigation into the funds allocated for development, especially since the region is covered with dense hills and forests, making such verification crucial.

Villages such as Kesarpadi and Serkapadi in Rayagada district were among the 12 locations identified by the state government for India's first environmental referendum, following a Supreme Court judgment.

Despite this significance, the Dongria Kondh—an endangered tribal community living in areas like Kunakadu, Palberi, Phuldumera, and Tadijhola (a forest hamlet in Kalahandi)—continue to be deprived of basic necessities. Similarly, residents of Kesarpadi, Jarapa, Batudi, Lamba, and Lakhpadar villages in Rayagada district lack access to essential amenities.

Tripathy also pointed out that the government has failed to adequately assess how factors such as road connectivity, parental employment, proximity to schools, and children's rights to education impact the Dongria Kondh community in these districts.

He urged the NHRC to intervene and ensure the provision of basic services, including education, healthcare, livelihood opportunities, and other essential needs.

Acknowledging the gravity of the petition and the consistent negligence by authorities, the NHRC stated in its order: "The commission is of the considered view that the allegations raised in the complaint represent serious violations of the human rights of the victims."

villagers in Kalahandi and Rayagada districts.

Despite repeated NHRC directives over the past five years, the Odisha government has reportedly failed to implement essential welfare measures such as all-weather roads, access to potable water, healthcare services, and education in these remote tribal areas. This ongoing neglect has resulted in severe human rights violations.

In his petition, Tripathy stated, "Despite the intervention of the NHRC, no progress report has been submitted. Ground verification reveals that no substantial steps have been taken to address the issues raised."

He further emphasised that even after seven years and at least 20 directives from both the NHRC and the Odisha Human Rights Commission (OHRC), the state and district administrations have yet to ensure basic human rights for the affected villagers.

Tripathy alleged that the reports submitted by state authorities consist merely of statistical data, serving as an eyewash to conceal administrative inefficiency and corruption. He stressed the need

Fake notes with face value of ₹10,000 seized; man arrested

Bhadrak, May 11: Police arrested one person in connection with the circulation of counterfeit currency and seized fake Indian currency notes (FICN) with a face value of ₹10,000 from his possession, a police officer said Sunday.

The incident came to light Saturday afternoon when two youths allegedly attempted to purchase goods using the fake notes at the Anand Bazaar under Bhadrak rural police station limits, the officer said.

According to an eyewitness, the two suspects, residents of Deopal village near Anand Bazaar, purchased groceries using ₹200 notes. When one of the

youths attempted to exchange another ₹200 currency note, the shopkeeper grew suspicious due to its texture and print.

"I sensed something was wrong when I touched the note. I showed it to other shopkeepers nearby, and we quickly realised it was a fake one. When confronted, the youth tried to flee, but locals caught them and alerted the police," said Utkalmani Panda, the shopkeeper.

One of the accused managed to escape the spot, while the other was caught by residents and handed over to police.

The Bhadrak rural police conducted a search and recovered counterfeit currency amounting to ₹10,000 in de-

nominations of ₹100, ₹200, and ₹500, the police officer said.

Preliminary investigation suggests the accused were targeting small shops where the chances of detection of counterfeit currency notes are lower, the police officer.

The police suspect that the detained person may be part of a larger counterfeit currency racket. "We have registered a case, and the seized currency has been sent for forensic examination," the Inspector-in-Charge (IIC) of Bhadrak rural police station, Dayanidhi Das, said.

A manhunt is on to track the absconding youth and uncover the network behind this racket, he said.

Man hacked to death by uncle

Lahunipada, May 11: A man was hacked to death by his maternal uncle over past enmity at Sanajal village in Haladi Kudar panchayat and this block in Sundargarh district late Saturday night.

The victim was identified as Dola Dehuri, 40, and the accused as Shuka Dehuri, 60, both residents of the village. Mahulapada police arrested the accused Sunday, and will produce him in the court Monday, IIC Suresh Chandra Pradhan said. A case was registered in this connection and further investigations are on.

Police said the accused and the victim often used to fight over some issues. This infuriated Shuka as he nursed a grudge against Dola and started looking for an opportune moment to settle his scores.

The incident occurred when Shuka spotted Dola alone and hacked him to death with a sharp-edged weapon late Saturday night. Profusely bleeding, Dola died on the spot.

Man killed, 2 others hurt in road mishap

Umerkote, May 11: In a major accident near Burja Chhak on the Umerkote-Raighar road in Nabarangpur district, a head-on collision between a motorcycle and a pickup van resulted in the death of one person and left two others critically injured.

According to reports, the pickup van was travelling from Raighar towards Umerkote to collect goods. At around 6am, three individuals on a motorcycle were headed in the opposite direction. The two vehicles collided head-on near Burja Chhak. Following the impact, the pickup van overturned on the roadside.

Parshu Gouda, a resident of Sandasa village under Chitabeda panchayat in Jharigaon block, died on the spot. The other two pillion riders, identified as Anandu Bhatra and Ravi Panka, sustained critical injuries and were admitted to the Umerkote Sub-Divisional Hospital.

The pickup van driver fled the scene following the incident. The accident caused tension in the area.

Police have seized the pickup van and taken it into custody. The body of the deceased was sent for post-mortem examination, following which it was handed over to the family.

Man confined in room for 20 yrs without aid

Titilagarh, May 11: For the past 20 years, 40-year-old Rabindra Patra has lived in confinement, locked inside a small room at his family home in Nilachakra Nagar in this town. Once a cheerful child, Rabindra, who is unable to move his limbs or speak, survives only with the care of his elder brother and sister-in-law as his parents have since long passed away.

Rabindra lost his mental stability as an infant. In 1984, when he was just six months old, the then chief minister Janaki Ballabh Patnaik had visited Titilagarh. Out of excitement, Rabindra's parents had carried their baby to witness the former CM's helicopter landing. According to the family, the loud noise startled the infant so severely that he lost consciousness. When he regained it, his mental faculties had deteriorated. Despite consulting multiple doctors at various hospitals and trying multiple treatments, his condition never improved.

As Rabindra grew older, life continued to deal cruel blows. At the age of 20, he collapsed

and broke a leg, a fracture that never healed properly despite repeated medical consultations. With both physical and mental disabilities, his condition became dire.

His parents eventually passed away in despair, leaving Rabindra in the care of his elder brother, Jeetendra Patra, and sister-in-law Priyanka Patra. Jeetendra works as a daily labourer at a private factory outside Titilagarh, returning home every day to care for his brother.

At home, Priyanka manages not only her two young children but also all of Rabindra's daily needs like feeding, bathing, and tending to him like a child.

Despite their tireless devotion, the family has received no significant government as-

sistance or specialised treatment for Rabindra. Recently, Rabindra was granted a disability certificate after 40 long years of waiting. But he still lacks an Aadhaar card, voter ID, and any disability pension. Every application for an Aadhaar card has been rejected for unclear reasons, making him ineligible for various social welfare schemes.

"Without an Aadhaar card, even basic banking transaction is not possible," said his visibly frustrated elder brother Jeetendra Patra. "We've knocked on every door, and all we have left is hope that the government will finally help."

Rabindra, once joyful in his parents' arms, now lies silent, forgotten by the system, surviving solely on the compassion of his family.

Wrong injection by quack leads to minor girl's death

Basudevpur, May 11: In a shocking incident, a five-year-old girl from Badagapuru village under Padmapur panchayat died Saturday afternoon allegedly after being administered a wrong injection by an unlicensed practitioner, who operates a private clinic at Edatal Chhak here in Bhadrak district.



According to reports, the child, identified as Sukanya Majhi, daughter of Kat Majhi and Sabitri Majhi, had been suffering from cold and fever. Around 5pm Saturday, her parents took her to the accused's clinic at Edatal Chhak. The practitioner reportedly gave her preliminary treatment,

including an injection and a syrup.

Within 10 to 15 minutes of receiving the injection, the child became unresponsive and collapsed. Alarmed, her parents rushed her back to the same clinic, but by then, she showed no signs of life. On realising the girl had died, the practitioner allegedly returned the ₹500 taken for treatment and took back the prescription and syrup bottle in an apparent attempt to cover his tracks, locals said.

Later that evening, the family took the child to the Basudevpur hospital, where doctors officially declared her dead.

The incident sparked outrage in the community with locals calling for a full investigation and strict action against the practitioner. The child's body has been sent to the Bhadrak District Headquarters Hospital for a post-mortem examination by Basudevpur police.

Concerns over unqualified medical practitioners, commonly referred to as 'quacks', are rising in several panchayats of Basudevpur block in Bhadrak district. Despite the growing danger, the Health department and district administration have allegedly remained passive, allowing life-threatening malpractice to continue unchecked.

Tribals earn pittance from tamarind sale as TDCC 'backs out'

Bhawanipatna, May 11: The collection and procurement of tamarind in Kalahandi district has taken a hit due to alleged lack of institutional support and incentives from the Tribal Development Cooperative Corporation (TDCC), and the state government.

As a result, farmers and collectors have to rely heavily on middlemen and traders which often lead to distress sale of their products, reports stated.

Despite expectations that TDCC would lead efforts to procure tamarind from local gatherers, their limited involvement has left tribal communities dependent on outside traders and middlemen, reports said.

exploit the situation, offering much lower than fair prices to marginalised communities, especially tribals who rely on tamarind collection and their sale for livelihood. As a result, tribals who are into this practice since generations continue to be fleeced by middlemen and outside traders.

TDCC is reportedly offering ₹3,600 per quintal of tamarind, but in remote and rural areas, setting and maintaining a fair market price per quintal procurement is proving difficult. As a result, some tribals are forced to offload their produce at prices as low as ₹1,000 per quintal, while others struggle to sell at competitive rates by vending in marketplaces.

Currently, market prices for tamarind range between ₹40 and ₹50 per kilogram, but TDCC



has not procuring the produce this season. TDCC officials confirmed that not even a single kilogram has been purchased so far this year.

Last year, TDCC procured tamarind through local women self-help groups (WSHGs), which collected it directly from

gatherers and handed it over to TDCC. In return, these WSHG volunteers received ₹72 per quintal as commission, while TDCC paid gatherers ₹3,600 per quintal.

In 2024, TDCC reportedly procured 966.74 quintals of tamarind in Kalahandi, dis-

bursing ₹34,80,264 in payments. Demand for tamarind remains particularly high in blocks such as Lanjigarh, Thuamul Rampur and Madanpur Rampur.

However, without access to proper pricing and support mechanisms, forest dwellers collecting tamarind are often forced to sell their collection to middlemen and traders at reduced rates, missing out on their rightful earnings.

Except for Lanjigarh, Madanpur Rampur, Thuamul Rampur, Bhawanipatna, and Kalampur, the TDCC has made no efforts to collect tamarind from other blocks in Kalahandi district, according to local residents. Although tamarind collection is also carried out in Kokasara, the TDCC has largely ignored these operations, they alleged.

Last year, middlemen allegedly purchased tamarind at rates as low as ₹15 per kilogram, and ₹800 per 50-kg sack, raising concerns about exploitation. While 32 WSHGs are active in five blocks under the TDCC last year, it has shown little interest this season.

It is estimated that up to 10,000 quintals of tamarind would be collected from the district this year. However, a lack of cold storage facilities has led to the produce being transported to the facilities in Sambalpur for preservation.

Tamarind is being sold in online market places. Observers believe that if cold storage facilities were developed locally and more beneficiaries were linked to the TDCC, it could significantly boost income for tribal communities.

institute a nonpartisan peace caucus in the UN and other global and regional forums to prevent tensions between the US and China (as well as Russia) from impeding international coordination on shared global problems such as climate change and pandemics. Lastly, APSP would do well to establish a development agency whereby richer members could provide technical and financial support to poorer members' efforts to achieve net-zero greenhouse-gas emissions, protect their biodiversity, and accelerate economic growth. This would offset the assistance that competing superpowers use to influence poor countries.

As ASEAN economies catch up with those in the Global North, their combined GDP could equal that of the EU and the UK by 2045. In such a scenario, APSP's economic might would be so great that the US and China would have to join the trade partnership or else risk defeat from self-isolation.

Cooperative multilateralism is middle powers' best hope for mitigating the fallout from the Sino-American cold war; and it might even eventually crowd out this conflict. that the US and China imposed against one another have effectively decoupled their trade. Will countries hit by his "reciprocal" tariffs be cowed into joining the US sphere of influence as part of bilateral trade deals?

The answer is no, so long as China respects its trade partners' right to befriend all superpowers. In such a scenario, the benefits of trading with China remain too large to forgo. But to take advantage of these benefits and maintain their autonomy, middle powers will need to pursue multilateral cooperation.

As a first step, middle powers must convince China that it is in its long-term interest to stop the potential fire sale of goods intended for the US market, which means voluntary export restraints.

The escalating US-China trade war, and the competing technological standards that stem from deeper geopolitical fragmentation, will cause substantial damage to middle

powers. Being forced into a sphere of influence would erode these countries' sovereignty and limit their export markets. To avoid becoming pawns in a proxy war, middle powers should form a union of independent buffer states based on the same principles as the United Nations and the World Trade Organization.

Members of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN), together with Japan and South Korea, should propose an Atlantic-Pacific Sustainability Pact to the European Union and the United Kingdom. Practicing open regionalism, APSP would have three main tasks. The first would be to create a free-trade area that is open to all countries, with an eye to building the biggest possible integrated market.

ASEAN members, Japan, and South Korea could then merge the main Asia-Pacific trade agreements under the economic umbrella of APSP. The second task would be to

As US tariffs begin to reshape global trade flows, many countries are worried that a tsunami of discounted Chinese goods, originally destined for America, will hit their shores. To keep them out, especially as recessionary pressures mount, some may be inclined to impose their own tariffs on Chinese imports. In that case, China would be cut off entirely from international trade, delivering an unexpected victory for US President Donald Trump, who would undoubtedly claim credit for this new Great Wall.

China harbors no illusions that it will be the twenty-first century's hegemon. India will inevitably become a superpower by mid-century. Europe might join their ranks, too, as Trump's might-is-right worldview seems poised to accelerate and deepen European integration.


The current Sino-American standoff seemingly reflects a shared understanding that avoiding the Thucydides Trap - when tensions between an incumbent hegemon and a rising power lead to conflict - will require an eventual agreement on respective spheres of influence. Both sides' defensive efforts to expand their global reach have devolved into a crude form of imperialism. Trump has designs on Canada, Greenland, Panama, and Gaza, while China's territorial claims in the South China Sea have brought its maritime border to the doorstep of several Southeast Asian countries.

But it remains to be seen how the trade war will factor into this contest. The tariffs

Dangerous Liaisons

India and Pakistan have halted military actions for now, a day after Pakistan breached a ceasefire initially announced to the world by US President Donald Trump on 10th May 2025. This comes after intense cross-border drone and missile strikes that brought both nuclear-powered nations close to the brink of a full-scale war. US President Donald Trump took the world by surprise by announcing that a night of talks mediated by Washington helped secure the ceasefire deal. Trump also offered to work with both countries for a 'solution' on the Kashmir issue. India has said it will not accept any third party intervention in the talks. On the other hand, Pakistan has for decades been clamouring for third party mediation in the Kashmir tangle.

India has to learn that it cannot trust the US vis-a-vis Pakistan, as our western neighbour has been a strategic partner of America for decades. Also, Pakistan as a 'rouge state', as referred to by the US in the past, remains crucial to keep running America's own military-industrial complex. That is why, the timing of disbursement of \$1 billion by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) to Pakistan at this critical juncture of conflict with India shows the real intent of the United States, without whose approval, IMF cannot possibly disburse funds. This huge sum of money is certainly not going to be spent by Pakistan on education or healthcare but to go shopping for military equipment to fuel its war efforts against India.

It is important to note that six out of the world's top ten defence companies are American. Where ever there is a point of conflict in the world, there is a surge in weapons sales. The French company Dassault Aviation which makes the Rafale fighter jets has seen its share prices surge by ten per cent in the two weeks of Indo-Pak tensions since the Pahalgam terrorist attack.

On the other hand, the coverage of this whole escalation between India and Pakistan in the aftermath of the Pahalgam massacre by the international media has not been pro-India. It won't be wrong to say that India has to fight this narrative war that is being waged against it. Also, the parallels that are being deliberately drawn between Palestine and Kashmir in the global media and the likening of India to Israel as the 'aggressor' are certainly harming India's interests in this narrative war.

Coming to China, our eastern neighbour has predictably and clearly sided with Pakistan and would be happy to pick the tab in this proxy war against India. Sporting heritage as survival kit

When Odisha Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi declared indigenous sports to be "not just physical contests but an integral part of our communities, our traditions, and our identity," he articulated a profound truth that resonates across India's diverse cultural landscape. In an era marked by escalating climate disasters and increasing social fragmentation, our traditional games - from Kabaddi to Kalaripayattu - are emerging as unexpected but powerful tools for building community resilience. These living traditions, often dismissed as mere cultural artefacts, contain generations of accumulated wisdom that can help us navigate the challenges of the 21st century.

THE PLAYGROUNDS WHERE GENERATIONS HAVE HONED THEIR SKILLS HOLD TIMELESS LESSONS FOR SURVIVING CONTEMPORARY CHALLENGES

The evidence from Odisha's experience with Cyclone Fani in 2019 is particularly compelling. Villages with active indigenous sports programmes demonstrated remarkable crisis response capabilities that went beyond official disaster protocols. Kabaddi players, accustomed to making split-second decisions under physical stress, naturally assumed leadership roles in relief distribution. Mallakhamb practitioners navigated floodwaters with extraordinary balance, their bodies conditioned by years of training. These weren't isolated incidents but manifestations of what anthropologists term "embodied knowledge" - physical competencies developed through generations of play that prove vital in emergencies.

Scientific research substantiates these observations with compelling data. Studies across Odisha's coastal districts reveal that adolescents practicing traditional pole gymnastics develop 31% better grip strength and 27% superior balance compared to their peers - attributes that prove invaluable when evacuating through floodwaters or climbing to safety. Communities maintaining boat-racing traditions recorded faster evacuation times during cyclones, demonstrating how culturally rooted physical literacy enhances disaster preparedness. These findings align perfectly with the United Nations Sendai Framework's emphasis on community-based risk reduction.

The psychological benefits are equally significant. Traditional sports create what experts call "muscular memory of resilience" - the ability to remain effective during crises because the body remembers performing under stress. Research indicates that communities with strong indigenous sports traditions report lower incidence of post-traumatic stress disorder following disasters, suggesting these activities provide natural psychological armor.

What makes this approach revolutionary is its organic adoption. Unlike imported preparedness programmes that often face implementation challenges, traditional games enjoy immediate community acceptance because they're already woven into the social fabric. In Odisha's tribal areas, children mastering gendi

(stick hockey) unknowingly develop flood survival skills - their improved reflexes, balance and spatial awareness becoming life-saving assets during emergencies.

Odisha's policy innovations demonstrate how a strategic government support can amplify this potential. The state's initiative to integrate indigenous sports into school curricula has created a generation equally fluent in academic knowledge and embodied survival skills. Economically, the case is compelling - every rupee invested in traditional sports infrastructure yields Rs 4.20 in risk reduction benefits, outperforming conventional disaster management expenditures.

The global implications are profound. From Japan's sumo-wrestling communities demonstrating enhanced tsunami response to Native American lacrosse players excelling in wildfire prevention, similar patterns exist worldwide. Odisha's systematic approach offers a replicable blueprint for climate-vulnerable regions.

As climate disasters grow in frequency and intensity, we urgently need solutions that are both effective and culturally sustainable. Odisha's experience shows how a village Kabaddi ground can be as crucial to community survival as any satellite warning system. By revitalising indigenous sports, we're activating a pre-existing network of resilience that operates independently when formal systems fail. When Kerala revived Kalar-

ipayattu training after the 2018 floods, communities reported not just better emergency response but improved mental health and social unity.

The path forward requires key steps like repositioning indigenous sports as critical infrastructure in national disaster plans, creating international knowledge-exchange platforms and developing standardised metrics to quantify resilience benefits for funding purposes. This approach can transform how traditional practices are valued and utilised.

As we face an uncertain climate future, the answers may lie not in expensive technological fixes alone but in reconnecting with our physical heritage. The playgrounds where generations have honed their skills hold timeless lessons for surviving contemporary challenges. Odisha teaches us that sometimes resilience means remembering rather than inventing - recognising that our ancestors often developed precisely the skills we need today.

In village squares across India, where children still play ancient games, we're witnessing the emergence of a new paradigm - one that values cultural wisdom as highly as technological advancement. The time has come to view indigenous sports not as relics but as living bridges between our heritage and our destiny.

(Baran (Rajasthan), May 11: In Moondiyar village, bordering the Shahbad forest in Rajasthan's Baran district, tribal communities are fighting to protect their ancestral land from a large renewable energy project. Greenko Energies Private Limited plans to build an 1,800-megawatt pumped storage project by diverting 408 hectares of forest and felling over 1.19 lakh trees.

Though only three villages are listed for official land acquisition, the project's impact stretches across at least seven,

affecting hundreds of tribal and Dalit families who depend on forest resources like mahua, amla, and tendu leaves for their livelihood. Many, like Ravi Sahariya, a 26-year-old Sahariya tribal, earn most of their income from forest produce. "If the forest goes, we go," he says.

Villagers allege land brokers have begun buying tribal land at low rates, hoping to resell it at a profit. This violates the Rajasthan Tenancy Act and Land Acquisition laws, which restrict the transfer of tribal land to non-tribals without collector approval. Baran Collector Rohitashva Singh Tomar denies



granting any such permissions. Greenko claims forest rights in affected areas have been settled, but villagers are unaware of any recognition. Loss of the forest

could worsen the malnutrition crisis in the region, already severe among Sahariya children. The Shahbad forest is ecologically vital, regulating tempera-

tures, replenishing groundwater, and housing endangered species like leopards, sloth bears, hyenas, and vultures. Locals even report sightings of cheetahs from nearby Kuno National Park.

Despite the environment ministry granting Stage-1 clearance, concerns about premature tree felling remain. Activists fear fragmentation of wildlife habitats and rising human-animal conflict. Environmental reports support these fears, citing potential biodiversity loss.

While some, like Bhup Singh, hope the project will bring jobs,

many doubt its promises. "A crusher plant nearby promised work but hired outsiders," says Manak Chand. Others, like goat herder Neeraj Kashyap, worry about losing their only means of survival.

India aims to add 500 GW of non-fossil fuel energy by 2030, with Rajasthan contributing 90 GW. However, villagers warn that clean energy expansion must not come at the cost of forests and lives.

As tree-felling begins and land pressures mount, Moondiyar's residents are left wondering: who will protect the forest that has long protected them?

The country's largest BrahMos integration and testing facility centre at the Uttar Pradesh Defence Industrial Corridor will strengthen India's efforts towards self-reliance in the defence sector, the Defence Minister said.

"As you all know, whether it is the Government of India or the state government, our policy is very clear - Make in India, Make for World. For us, self-reliance in the defence sector has a very broad meaning.

We are moving ahead with the idea that we have to make arms and equipment for ourselves, as well as export them to the whole world," Singh said.

Citing a report of the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute, Rajnath Singh said that the report stated that the world military expenditure in 2024 has increased to \$2,718 billion.

Two arrested on espionage charges for Pakistani official

Rural India fights extreme heat with age-old wisdom

New Delhi, May 11: As India braces itself for the upcoming scorching summers, rural communities across heat-wave-prone states are turning to traditional and low-cost solutions to shield themselves from rising temperatures.

From building check dams to planting native trees and adjusting daily routines, villagers are crafting ground-up heat resilience where formal cooling infrastructure is scarce. According to the Indian Meteorological Department (IMD), the number of heatwave days is likely to increase by up to 7-8 days in northern and western India, including Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Gujarat and Rajasthan.

Madhya Pradesh's Barwani district which is among the

hottest districts in the country saw temperatures soar above 50 degrees Celsius last year. In the Bijadandi block of Madhya Pradesh's Mandla district, Malati Yadav remembers a time when water was a rare luxury in her small village.

"There was a severe water crisis in our village. Those who woke up first got water, the rest didn't," she says. However, many villagers like Malati and Seema are confronting the upcoming crisis with innovative and low-cost adaptations rooted in traditional knowledge.

Today, Malati and other women of her self-help group are working towards constructing check dams and re-creating six village ponds. Seema explained that with a mix of brick and mud homes, families are turning to traditional



architecture to beat the heat. In Jharkhand's Garhwa district, farmers like 40-year-old Kunti Devi now begin their day before sunrise to avoid the punishing midday sun. With no shelter and irregular water supply, she and her

neighbours rely on natural remedies. "We drink chaach (buttermilk), eat light meals and try to stay under tree shade as the heat becomes unbearable," she said.

In Uttar Pradesh's Bundelkhand region, known for

its parched summers and agrarian distress, farmers are increasingly turning to deep-rooted native trees like ber, neem and aam for shade and resilience. But Ghamandi Lal, a small farmer from Lalitpur in Madhya Pradesh, said even that's becoming harder.

The cost of maintaining

livestock has also risen. In Maharashtra's Bobalwadi village, Sakela Bhatnagar spreads mango and palash leaves over tin roofs to keep homes cool. According to Neeraja Kudrimoti, Associate Director at Transform Rural India, such community-led adaptations are vital. "Rural India, where much of the population is engaged in outdoor manual work, lacks access to cooling infrastructure and reliable electricity. Heat waves are not only causing illness but also leading to economic disruptions," she said.

Kudrimoti called for localised Heat Action Plans, improved water security, and social protection schemes prioritising rural populations. In many districts, authorities are waking up to the urgency.

Fear of war sparks widespread anxiety

The escalating military tension between the two nations, a deluge of information, and the inability to sift through fake and real news can significantly affect the psychological well-being of individuals, said mental health experts



For seven-year-old Hazel, Pakistan was just a name—until earlier this week. Now, every knock on the door fills her with dread. “She says, ‘Pakistan will attack us and everyone will die,’” said her mother Annu Mathew from Trivandrum, Kerala. Hazel’s fears were sparked by an awareness session at school, followed by alarming conversations among classmates.

our stress regulation systems.” Children are particularly vulnerable. “War talk can instill fear, reinforce stereotypes, and disrupt their sense of safety,” Sharma added. She emphasized the importance of explaining situations to children in age-appropriate ways and reassuring them of their safety.

To manage the psychological toll, Chand recommends daily meditation, developing belief systems (not necessarily religious), and helping others cope. “Fear and anxiety are contagious. Helping someone else can also help you calm down,” she said.

Mathew has found a simple way to calm Hazel. “I take her to the balcony and ask her to point out where the explosions are. When she sees nothing, she feels reassured,” she said.

Chand encourages people to anchor themselves with reaffirming thoughts and routines. Sharma agrees, adding that people should take breaks from continuous news exposure and choose credible sources for information.

In Jaipur, Aniket Singh (name changed) has stocked up on rations, power banks, medicines, and cash, but still feels “anxious and unprepared.” After the Pahalgam attack, he began preparing for a possible emergency but admits the sense of dread remains.

Both experts emphasise the importance of seeking professional help when anxiety becomes unmanageable. “If intrusive thoughts, panic, or emotional numbness persist, therapy can provide personalized coping strategies,” said Sharma.

Mental health experts say preparedness can be a double-edged sword. “It may provide a sense of control, but also intensify anxiety,” said senior family therapist Mairi Chand. She described the current state as a “tightrope” where people are trying to balance awareness and fear.

As the geopolitical situation remains uncertain, the psychological impact is becoming a crisis of its own. Whether it’s a child fearing for her life, an adult compulsively checking the news, or a family over-preparing for disaster, the invisible toll of war talk is being felt far beyond the frontlines.

Stay safe, don't rush back: J&K police warns village residents

New York, May 11: US President Donald Trump Sunday praised the "strong and unwaveringly powerful" leadership of India and Pakistan for reaching a ceasefire, saying their legacy is greatly enhanced by their brave actions.

"I will work with you both to see if, after a "thousand years," a solution can be arrived at concerning Kashmir. God Bless the leadership of India and Pakistan on a job well done!!" Trump said in a post on Truth Social.

India and Pakistan agreed to a ceasefire along the Line of Control and International Border Saturday.

"I am very proud of the strong and unwaveringly powerful leadership of India and Pakistan for having the strength, wisdom, and fortitude to fully know and understand that it was time to stop the current aggression that could have led (led) to the death and destruction of so many, and so much," he said.

"Millions of good and innocent people could have died! Your legacy is greatly enhanced by your brave actions. I am proud that the USA was able to help you arrive at this historic and heroic decision," Trump said.

He went on to say that even though this has not been discussed, he is going to "increase trade substantially with both of these great Nations."

Trump Saturday announced that India and Pakistan had agreed to a "full and immediate" ceasefire after a "long

As a close neighbour and long-standing friend of both India and Pakistan, Sri Lanka remains hopeful that this ceasefire will lay the foundation for a peaceful and constructive resolution of long-standing issues through continued engagement, Dissanayake said.

UN leaders welcome understanding between India, Pak

United Nations: Top UN leaders have welcomed the understanding between India and Pakistan to stop all firings and military actions, calling it a "meaningful" and "positive step" toward ending current hostilities and easing tensions. President of the 79th session of the UN General Assembly Philemon Yang wrote in a post on X that he welcomes the development, saying, "it is a meaningful step towards de-escalation reflecting the commitment of both nations to regional peace and stability." Yang urged continued diplomatic efforts and dialogue to resolve differences and achieve lasting peace and stability in line with the UN Charter and international law. Immediately after India announced "understanding on stoppage of firing and military action" Saturday, UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres welcomed the move, describing it as a "positive step" toward ending current hostilities and easing tensions.

Awami League rejects ban by Bangladesh interim govt

Dhaka, May 11: Bangladesh's deposed prime minister Sheikh Hasina-led Awami League Sunday rejected with disgust the interim government's decision to ban the party and vowed to continue its operations despite the restriction.

The Muhammad Yunus-led interim government's Council of Advisers or the Cabinet Saturday night slapped a ban on "all activities of Awami League", including in cyberspace, under an anti-terrorism law.

Reacting to the move, in a strongly worded statement posted on X, the Awami League said, "We are rejecting and protesting the fascist autocrat Yunus government's decision with disgust...Awami League will carry on its activities in an appropriate course, defying the decision of the fascist Yunus government."

The party regretted that "today's independent Bangladesh" had to witness the ban on Awami League activities by an "undemocratic fascist" government that now runs the country "without people's



mandate", while the country "earned independence and sovereignty under its (Awami League's) leadership".

The statement said the ban is meant to "exile the spirit, ideals, and core values of the Liberation War and to empower the vulgar resurgence of anti-independence elements" and "only an anti-state and anti-independence evil force alone".

"We strongly believe that the people of Bangladesh will deliver a resounding response to this reckless decision by the fascist Yunus regime. We call upon all leaders and activists of Awami League to stand shoulder to shoulder with the people and build a total resistance against this incoherent and anti-people decision," it said.

Zelenskyy hopes for ceasefire with Russia

Kyiv, May 11: Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said he is hoping for a full and temporary ceasefire with Russia starting Monday, adding he would be in Türkiye to negotiate with Russian President Vladimir Putin 'personally.'

His comments came after US President Donald Trump insisted Ukraine accept Russia's latest offer of holding direct talks in Türkiye Thursday.

Ukraine, along with European allies, had demanded Russia accept an unconditional 30-day ceasefire starting Monday before holding talks, but Moscow effectively rejected the proposal and called for direct negotiations instead. It was not clear if Zelenskyy was conditioning his presence in Türkiye on the Monday ceasefire holding.

"We await a full and lasting ceasefire, starting from tomorrow, to provide the necessary basis for diplomacy. There is no point in prolonging the killings. And I will be waiting for Putin in Türkiye on Thursday. Personally. I hope that this time the Russians will not look for excuses," he wrote on X.

Trump said in a social media



post Sunday that Ukraine should agree to Putin's peace talks proposal 'IMMEDIATELY.'

"At least they will be able to determine whether or not a deal is possible, and if it is not, European leaders, and the US, will know where everything stands, and can proceed accordingly!" Trump wrote, adding: "HAVE THE MEETING, NOW!!!"

Zelenskyy, writing on X Sunday, said it was a "positive sign that the Russians have finally begun to consider ending the war" and said that "the entire world has been waiting for this for a very long time."

Chinese Foreign Minister speaks to NSA Doval, calls for lasting truce with Pak

Beijing: Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi spoke to India's National Security Advisory (NSA) Ajit Doval and expressed hope that New Delhi and Islamabad would address their differences through dialogue and achieve a lasting ceasefire. During their conversation, Doval told Wang that war was not India's choice but India needed to take counter-terrorism action after the Pahalgam attack, state-run Xinhua news agency reported in separate dispatches. Wang also condemned the April 22 terror attack in Jammu and Kashmir's Pahalgam, which had cross-border linkages and triggered the worst fighting between India and Pakistan in years. Wang also spoke to Pakistan's Deputy Prime Minister Muhammad Ishaq Dar. Xinhua's reports said. In his talks with Doval, Wang expressed hope that India and Pakistan would remain calm and restrained, properly handle differences through dialogue and consultation, and avoid escalating the situation, according to Xinhua's reports. Wang said China supports and expects India and Pakistan to achieve a comprehensive and lasting ceasefire through consultation, which is in the fundamental interest of the two countries and meets the common aspiration of the international community. Noting that the world is undergoing both transformation and upheaval, Wang said peace and stability in Asia are hard-won and deserve to be cherished. India and Pakistan are neighbours that cannot be moved away and they are both neighbours of China, he said.

SK's former PM Han drops presidential bid

Seoul, May 11: South Korea's former prime minister and acting president Han Duck-soo ended a short, ill-fated attempt to win the conservative party's presidential nomination Sunday after days of internecine disputes just days out from the election.

Rival Kim Moon-soo was chosen as nominee for the People Power Party after party members voted Saturday to retain him over Han, whose late entry into the race derailed the consensus over its candidate for the June 3 presidential vote.

Han Sunday said he "humbly accepts everything" and hopes Kim wins the snap election, which was triggered by the impeachment of the country's former president.

Kim formally registered as a PPP candidate Sunday morning, and is now South Korea's conservative hopeful against frontrunner Lee Jae-myung of the opposition Democratic Party.

Han and Kim struggled for unity in the past week and had held a series of failed talks to discuss how to unite their conservative campaigns to avoid splitting the vote.

Lee has been a clear frontrunner to replace conservative former President Yoon Suk Yeol, who was removed from office in April for violating his duties when he declared a short-lived martial law in December.

Kim, who was selected as the conservatives' candidate in a party convention a week ago, resisted pressure from the party to step aside in favour of the more popular Han, who had declined to participate in the nomination process while he was still serving as prime minister.

Iran, US conclude 4th round of N-talks

Dubai: Iran and the United States held a fourth round of talks Sunday over Tehran's rapidly advancing nuclear programme, with a US official describing American negotiators as being "encouraged" by the discussions. The talks took place in Muscat, Oman, again mediated by Omani officials. Iran similarly described the talks as wrapping up after several hours. "Agreement was reached to move forward with the talks to continue working through technical elements," the US official said, speaking on condition of anonymity to discuss the closed-door negotiations. "We are encouraged by today's outcome and look forward to our next meeting, which will happen in the near future. Iran insisted they only took place indirectly — possibly over internal political pressures within the Islamic Republic.

Israeli strikes kill 11, mostly women, kids

Deir Al-Balah: Israeli strikes overnight and into Sunday killed 11 people in the Gaza Strip, mostly women and children, according to local health officials. Two of the strikes hit tents in the southern city of Khan Younis, each killing two children and their parents. Other strikes killed a child and a man riding a bicycle, according to Nasser Hospital, which received the bodies. In northern Gaza, an Israeli strike killed a 16-year-old boy, according to the Indonesian Hospital. The Israeli military says it only targets militants and tries to avoid harming civilians. It blames Hamas for civilian deaths in the 19-month-old war because the militants are embedded in densely populated areas. There was no immediate Israeli comment on the latest strikes.

Higher currency limit for Indian tourists

Kathmandu: A prominent Nepali business organisation Sunday urged the government to allow Indian tourists arriving via land route to carry up to the equivalent of \$5,000 in Indian rupees, an increase from the current limit of ₹25,000, to boost tourism in the country. \$5,000 equates to approximately ₹4,25,000. The current provision of allowing Indian tourists entering Nepal via land route to carry only up to ₹25,000 is insufficient if the country aims to promote Indian tourism, said Federation of Nepalese Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FNCCI) president Chandra Prasad Dhakal.

Rama has spent the last week reiterating his promise to join the EU by the end of the decade, although some experts doubt that timeline will be possible given the reforms required to join the bloc, including eradicating graft.

Berisha also backs Albania's EU aspirations and has promised to fight corruption and increase wages.

"It's going to be a new summer day for Albanians," Berisha told Reuters after voting.

"Vote, vote, vote."

Opinion polls show Rama winning up to 50% of the vote and Berisha up to 35%. Rama may need help from smaller parties to maintain a slim four-seat majority in the 140-seat house.

Many young voters especially are tired of the likes of Berisha and Rama who have run the country in various roles since the fall of communism in 1990. They point to Albania's stark income inequality that sees many people drive expensive Range Rovers around the capital Tirana while others live in cramped Soviet-era housing.

Govt draft rules for oil and gas sector

New Delhi, May 11: Centre's new draft policy framed for the upstream oil & gas exploration and production sector aims to minimise the environmental impact of mineral oil operations, including gas flaring activities, and closer monitoring of greenhouse gas emissions and flared gas.

Routine flaring of gas takes place during production from oilfields due to the absence of facilities for gas utilisation, such as reinjection, on-site use, or transportation to market. The draft policy stipulates that all lessees and contractors shall submit reports specifying the volume of gas flared and the associated emissions on a quarterly basis in accordance with the format specified within fifteen days from the end of each calendar quarter.



The rules make it clear that every lessee and contractor will adopt measures to reduce greenhouse gas emissions that take place during the course of mineral oil operations and comply with the applicable environmental laws and norms.

The draft rules state that every lessee and contractor shall submit a monitoring plan within 180 days of the commencement of production of mineral oil from the leased area for the identification of sources of greenhouse emissions from mineral oil operations, and the methodology and frequency of measurements.

However, the Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas has invited the comments of stakeholders on the draft policy.

Equity hybrid funds pull 3.5L investors

New Delhi, May 11: Aggressive hybrid mutual funds or equity hybrid funds have been gaining traction among investors amid continued volatility in the capital markets, with the asset base of the category surging to ₹2.26 lakh crore in April 2025, an increase of 12 per cent compared to a year ago.

Additionally, the investor base expanded significantly, with the number of folios increasing by 3.5 lakh over the past year, to nearly 58 lakh by April 2025, latest data with the Association of Mutual Funds in India (AMFI) showed.

Aggressive hybrid funds, an investment solution blending equity and debt exposures, delivered robust returns over different timeframes. On average, these funds have delivered returns of nearly 9 per cent over the past year, 20 per cent over two years, 15 per cent over three years, and an impressive 21 per cent over five years, the industry data showed.

These funds differ from other hybrid mutual funds primarily in the equity exposure, as they invest 65-80 per cent in equities higher than the conservative or balanced hybrids that offer better return potential but also higher risk, making them ideal for investors with a moderate risk appetite and a 3-5 year view. Trivish D, COO Tradejini, said.

Looking ahead, the outlook for actively managed aggressive funds remains positive. Market movements are increasingly expected to be sector-specific and stock-specific rather than broad-based. As a result, fund managers with a dynamic and responsive approach will be better positioned to capture



emerging opportunities.

With the market expected to move more on sector-specific and stock-specific developments rather than broad-based rallies, fund managers with a dynamic approach will be better positioned to capture emerging opportunities, Santosh Joseph, CEO, Germinate Investor Services, said.

According to the AMFI data, the asset base of aggressive hybrid funds rose from ₹2.02 lakh crore in April 2024 to ₹2.26 lakh crore in April 2025, marking a 12 per cent growth yearly. There is a surge in retail interest in the category as investors seek balanced, tax-efficient products especially after Sebi's F&O tightening. Trivish said.

Performance-wise, industry data shows that 31 aggressive hybrid mutual funds, on an average, delivered returns of close to 9 per cent over the last one year. Over a five-year horizon, returns ranged between 18.5-24 per cent with the Mahindra Manulife Aggressive Hybrid Fund delivering the highest return at 23.62 per cent.

These funds are overweight in large-cap equities, especially in sectors like banking, consumer durables, and construction materials offers both stability and growth potential. Meanwhile, it maintains a cautious approach toward more volatile and global facing sectors like IT, oil & gas, and metals.

Respite for markets; FPIs infuse ₹14,167cr

Resurgence in foreign portfolio investor binds a hope for Indian market despite border tensions

New Delhi, May 11: Notwithstanding the tensions across border, foreign portfolio investors (FPI) continue to show confidence in Indian equity market, invested ₹14,167 crore so far, largely driven by favourable global cues and robust domestic fundamentals.

This positive momentum follows a net investment of ₹4,223 crore in April, marking the first inflow in three months, data with the depositories showed. Prior to this, foreign portfolio investors (FPIs) had pulled out ₹3,973 crore in March, ₹34,574 crore in February, and a substantial ₹78,027 crore in January.

Going ahead, global macros (declining dollar, slowing US and Chinese economy) and domestic macros (high GDP growth and declining inflation and interest rates) will facilitate increasing FPI inflow into the Indian equity, VK Vijayakumar, Chief Investment Strategist, Geojit Investments, said.

However, debt inflows are likely to remain very low, he added. According to the data with

India's equity market witnessed a sharp resurgence in FPI activity in April, and May signaling a marked reversal from the outflow seen earlier this year.

This renewed momentum was underpinned by a blend of favourable global cues and robust domestic fundamentals that bolstered investor confidence, Himanshu Srivastava, associate director, Morningstar investment, said.

One of the key catalysts behind this trend has been the

improving outlook for a potential US-India trade agreement. Additionally, the weakening of US dollar alongside a strengthening INR enhanced the appeal of Indian assets to global investors, he said.

Furthermore, upbeat quarterly earnings from prominent Indian corporate added to the positive sentiment, he added.

India expects 6.5% growth in FY26: CII

New Delhi, May 11: India's GDP is projected to grow at 6.5 per cent in the current fiscal and the country's economy is resilient enough to overcome the short-term impact of geopolitical issues, CII president Sanjiv Puri has said.

Puri stated that the country must pursue bilateral trade pacts with key trading partners to protect national interests in the backdrop of increasing trade barriers. The private investment is picking up across various sectors like energy, transportation, metals, chemicals, and hospitality. He emphasized on the current geopolitical uncertainties could lead investments with care.

At the outset of growth projection for India, he mentioned, "We are looking at 6.5 per cent. We believe this number can be achieved fundamentally, because the fact is, we are starting with a reasonably good foundation, robust economic foundation".

He said, "In the recent past, interest rates have eased. Inflation is becoming benign. There



is this personal income tax concession taking in from the first of April. Investments picked up in public and private space in the latter half of last year."

Meanwhile, on trade tariffs proposed by US President Donald Trump, Puri suggested a route to bilateral trade is beneficial and in the national interest.

"Therefore, the countries that India is pursuing, and the big ones among them, being the US and EU, are important. We should do whatever we have to do from a national interest perspective, and I think, most

important is these bilateral trade agreements".

Market watch on inflation, Q4 earnings, and more

New Delhi, May 11: The domestic stock market this week would monitor the geopolitical developments after India and Pakistan reached an understanding to stop military actions, analysts said.

Moreover, macroeconomic data announcements, Q4 earnings, trading activity of foreign investors and global market trends are also likely to influence sentiments. India and Pakistan on Saturday reached an understanding to stop all firings and military actions on land, air and sea, with immediate effect after four days of intense cross-border drone and missile strikes.

This de-escalation removes a key overhang on investor sentiment and is likely to be seen as a major positive development by financial markets. Historically, markets have shown resilience and a tendency to recover following such geopolitical de-escalations, Prashanth Tapse, Senior VP (Research), Mehta Equities Ltd, said.

This week will be pivotal, marked by several key domes-

tic triggers. Geopolitical developments, particularly the ongoing tensions with Pakistan, will continue to remain in focus. On the macroeconomic front, investors will closely monitor the release of key data points including the Consumer Price Index (CPI), Wholesale Price Index (WPI), and trade figures for exports and imports.

Additionally, the corporate earnings season will gather pace, with several major companies such as Tata Steel, Bharti Airtel, Gail, Hero MotoCorp, Tata Motors, Lupin and BHEIL scheduled to announce their quarterly results, Ajit Mishra - SVP, Research, Religare Broking Ltd, said.

Foreign investors continue to show confidence in the country's equity market, infusing ₹14,167 crore so far this month, largely driven by favourable global cues and robust domestic fundamentals.

Alongside geopolitical concerns, the ongoing Q4 corporate earnings season will continue to drive stock-specific action, Puneet Singhania, Director at Master Trust Group, said.

SEBI to probe F&O individual's trade to protect investor's interest

Mumbai, May 11: SEBI has observed that individuals' activity on index options in the derivatives segment has not declined as much as expected, and it will re-examine this activity and take further actions to protect investor's interest.

The capital market regulator examined activity in index options between December 2024 and March 2025 and found that there has been some drop on yearly basis; the activity is much higher than two years ago.

It can be noted that from November 2024, SEBI introduced certain restrictions on the futures and options segment

to limit individual activity, as data pointed to over 90 per cent of the trades by individual investors ending up in losses.

An analysis of the data for the four months suggests that the number of individuals trading in equity derivatives is down 12 per cent yearly, but up 77 per cent when compared to before two years time, or between December 2022 and March 2023.

A high trade in index options found out despite its complications. While comparing the index options two years ago, the authority found out index options volume of individuals is down 5 per cent on premium terms and 16 per cent on notional terms,



but up 34 per cent and 99 per cent on premium and notional terms, respectively.

Hence, SEBI will re-examine the trading activity of individuals in index options from an investor protection and systemic stability perspective, a

source said.

It has been noticed that despite the measures taken last year to contain speculative overtrading in index options, particularly on expiry day, the activity is high. The authority is going to continue monitoring

the activity in index options, and would be examining the feasibility of any further actions, if required.

It can be noted that when it first took action on the F&O segment, the driving point was the high number of trades in which investors were losing money, and the moves involved months of analysis, sharing of draft proposals and receiving public responses before any changes were implemented.

SEBI aims to refine how it assesses exposure, mitigate manipulation risks and reduce the unintended disruptions, the source said.

The consultation paper on enhancing trading convenience

and strengthening risk monitoring in equity derivatives, released in February this year, seeks to ensure that blunt regulations should not serve as a substitute for surveillance and enforcement by regulators. It proposes moves to exercise sharper control over possible concentration and manipulation risk by enhanced surveillance and enforcement rather than setting regulatory limits.

Position limits for index options have been relaxed to ₹1,500 crore on a net basis and ₹10,000 crore on a gross basis with no intraday limit to enable market participants to carry out their activities smoothly, the sources said.

IPL RESTART LOOMS

New Delhi, May 11: Suspend due to the India-Pakistan military conflict, the Indian Premier League (IPL) is set to resume either May 16 or 17 with the possibility of the final being moved out of Kolkata.

The announcement of ceasefire Saturday paved the way for resumption of the league that was suspended May 9 for one week.

The IPL Governing Council members and the BCCI officials discussed the resumption plan Sunday.

BCCI vice-president Rajeev Shukla said the board is still working on creating a suitable schedule.

"As of now there is no decision on IPL. BCCI officials are working out on the solutions. BCCI secretary, IPL Chairman are in talks with franchises and everyone, so very soon we will know about the decision, efforts are being made to resume the tournament early," said Shukla.

An IPL source said the league will resume with the match between Lucknow Super Giants and Royal Challengers Bengaluru in Lucknow -- the game which was supposed to be played on May 9.

"All the teams have been asked to call back their players, the tournament will resume either on May 16 or 17 in Lucknow. The final schedule will be shared tomorrow (Monday)," a source told PTI.

"Most likely the matches will be held at four venues and Delhi and Dharamsala won't get to host more matches. All the equipment has already been removed from these venues," added the source.

The source also said that there won't be any change in the venue for Qualifier 1 and

"As of now there is no change in venues for the play-off stage but it seems rain can affect the final in Kolkata. In that case the final could be played in Ahmedabad," said the source.

Speaking to PTI, BCCI secretary Devajit Saikia added: "In the next few days, we will begin consultations with the franchises, broadcasters, sponsors and the state associations slated to host the remaining matches before crystallizing to a decision on the league's resumption."

"Given that the importance of IPL at this juncture, it will also be prudent and necessary to take the nod of the Govern-

ment of India before finalising the time for its restart."

ARCHERY WORLD CUP STAGE 2

India finish with 7 medals

Shanghai, May 11: India's most decorated archer, Deepika Kumari, salvaged her pride with a hard-earned bronze medal after a semifinal heartbreak, while Parth Salunkhe also finished on the podium for the first time as India wrapped up their campaign at the Archery World Cup Stage 2 with seven medals, here Sunday.

A day after compound archers put up a dominating show with five medals, Deepika and Salunkhe added two more from the recurve section to end India's campaign on a high.

Exactly a year after the 21-year-old reigning Olympic champion Lim Sihyeon had knocked Deepika out at the same stage of the Yecheon World Cup, the Indian was undone again by the Korean in the semifinal, losing 1-7 in a largely one-sided women's recurve individual contest.

The 30-year-old four-time Olympian, though, bounced back strongly to defeat another Korean, Kang Chae Young, 7-3 in the bronze medal playoff and return with a consolation podium finish.

Deepika's win took India's overall medal tally to six at the event, with five coming from the compound section Saturday that included a remarkable triple-medal haul by comeback archer Madhura Dhamangankar.

In the bronze medal playoff, Deepika showed greater composure and tactical clarity than her defeat to Lim in the semis.

The opening set ended in a 27-all tie, but Deepika edged ahead with a solid 28 in the second to take a 3-1 lead.

Kang, a former world champion who had beaten Deepika in the Berlin World Cup quarter-finals back in 2017, fought back in the third, scoring a flawless 30 to Deepika's 27 to make it

three-all.

The Indian responded with her best shooting under pressure, firing three perfect arrows for 30 in the fourth set to again take a 5-3 lead.

Needing just a draw in the final set to secure victory, Deepika delivered once more, shooting 29 to Kang's 28, to bag the bronze.

Earlier, Deepika began nervously in the semifinal, losing the first set 26-27 despite hitting two 9s.

The second set saw both archers shoot 28, but Lim held steady to force a split and deny Deepika any rhythm.

The world No 1 then shifted into top gear, drilling in a perfect 30 in the third set while Deepika managed 28. With momentum fully on her side, Lim wrapped up the match in the fourth with a 29, as Deepika managed a 28.

It was a repeat of their 2023 clash, though Deepika had managed to take two set points back then.

In the men's section, 21-year-old Salunkhe, who qualified lowly at 60th place, impressed with his resilience after a 1-7 loss to top seed and Korean legend Kim Woojin in the semifinals.

After taking just one point off multiple Olympic medallist and reigning champion Woojin in his semifinal loss, Salunkhe bounced back impressively to beat higher-seeded French archer Baptiste Addis 6-4 in a tense five-setter to earn his maiden World Cup medal.

Salunkhe began in style with a flawless 30, including an X, to take the opening set. He slipped in the second, hitting an 8 that led to a 28-all tie. The third set was a scrappy affair, both archers managing just 25.

Addis then raised his level with a perfect 30 to level the match 4-4. But the young Indian held his nerves in the decider, shooting two 10s, one of them an X, and a 9 to edge out Addis by a point.

Sinner triumphs

Rome: After a wait of more than 100 days, Jannik Sinner still knows how to win a tennis match. The top-ranked player made a solid return from his three-month doping ban by beating 99th-ranked Mariano Navone 6-3, 6-4 before an adoring home crowd at the Italian Open. It was Sinner's first match since he won his third Grand Slam title at the Australian Open in January. He said it took him all of three games to get his competitive focus back. "Amazing feeling. I have waited quite long for this moment," Sinner said. "I am very happy to be back. There weren't too many signs of rust and it didn't take long for Sinner to start crushing his groundstrokes on or near the lines. When the Italian broke for 3-1 in the first set, the crowd inside Campo Centrale sang "Ole, ole, ole, Sin-ner, Sin-ner."

Man City stumble

London: The long-awaited return of Erling Haaland couldn't stop Manchester City from tumbling to another poor result in a season to forget for the deposed Premier League champion. Indeed, after a dire 0-0 draw at already-relegated Southampton, even qualification for the lucrative Champions League — something taken for granted by City for so many seasons — is still far from certain with two games left. Failing to beat the Premier League's last-placed team, and one of the worst to ever play in England's top flight, threw City's ambitions of a top-five finish back into doubt. Even more so with Aston Villa, one of a raft of clubs battling with City to get into the Champions League, beating Bournemouth 1-0 thanks to Ollie Watkins' first-half goal.

Bhatia slips to tied-16th

Flourtown: Akshay Bhatia slipped from top-five to tied 16th after the third and penultimate round of the Trust Championship here. In blustery conditions, Bhatia shot 71 after the first two rounds of 63-70 for a total card of 6-under. Clinical India crush Sri Lanka by 97 runs

Colombo, May 11: India displayed absolute dominance to crush Sri Lanka by 97 runs and earn a well-deserved title triumph in the Women's Tri-Nation ODI series after vice-captain Smriti Mandhana's sublime century and the bowlers' collective effort in the title clash here Sunday.

After Mandhana rose to the occasion to power India to a commanding 342 for seven, the bowlers completed the task by bundling out Sri Lanka for 245, with Sneha Rana (4/38) and Amanjot Kaur (3/54) doing the bulk of the damage.

Skipper Chamari Athapaththu (51 off 66 balls) and Nilakshika Silva (48 off 58) were the chief contributors for the hosts.

Earlier, battling cramps in humid conditions, elegant left-hander Mandhana, who had returned to form with a fifty in India's last match against South Africa, struck a majestic 116 off 101 balls to lay the foundation for India's imposing total after skipper Harmanpreet Kaur opted to bat.

Her knock was laced with 15



fours and two sixes, including four successive boundaries off Athapaththu to bring up her 11th ODI hundred in style.

After the early dismissal of Pratika Rawal for 30, Mandhana shifted gears smoothly.

The stylish Mandhana made Sri Lanka pay for dropping her on 21 as she was involved in two big partnerships - 70 for the first wicket with Pratika and 120 for the second with Harleen Deol.

She brought up her 32nd ODI fifty with a stylish sweep

behind square.

The left-hander added 120 runs in 106 balls with Harleen (47 off 56; 4x4) for the second wicket to steady the innings before falling while attempting a lofted cover drive.

But her dismissal set the stage for a strong finish as Jemimah Rodrigues, coming off a career-best 123 against South Africa, smashed a quick-fire 44 off 29 balls (4x4), while Harmanpreet contributed a brisk 41 off 30 (4x4, 1x6) as India piled on 90 runs in the last 10 overs.

There was a brief phase where India looked to have lost steam in the final overs, but cameos from Deepti Sharma (20 not out off 14) and Amanjot Kaur (18 off 12) helped them surge past 340.

Kane opened the scoring 31 minutes in, heading in a curl-

ing Michael Olise shot for his 25th goal of the league campaign.

Madrid, May 11: Barcelona took a huge step Sunday to securing the Spanish league title with a 4-3 win over Real Madrid — despite Kylian Mbappé's hat trick in a mesmerising "clásico" — and opened a seven-point lead over its second-placed rival with three matches remaining.

Raphinha scored twice, and Lamine Yamal and Eric García added a goal each for Barcelona, which trailed 2-0 after Mbappé scored in the fifth and 14th minutes at Montjuic stadium. The hosts evened the match just over the half-hour mark, and went on to lead 4-2 at halftime in a sensational recovery.

Mbappé completed his hat trick in the 70th but Madrid wasn't able to come back in a likely fatal blow to its hopes of successfully defending its title. Mbappé became the league's leading scorer with 27 goals, two more than Barcelona's Robert Lewandowski, who did not start Sunday.

It was another thrilling match involving Barcelona, which Tuesday was eliminated by Inter Milan in extra time in the semifinals of the Champions League. Barcelona lost to the Italians 7-6 on aggregate.

The Catalan club has won every match against Madrid this season. It had already won 4-0 at the Santiago Bernabeu Stadium in the first league match in October, 5-2 in the Spanish Super Cup final in January, and 3-2 in the Copa del Rey final last month.

Champions League once in eight seasons since their debut promotion in 2017 but struggled against a Bremen side pushing for a return to Europe after a 15-year absence.
