Israel, Iran violate truce, leave Trump frustrated

A few days after claiming that he managed to stop a potential nuclear war in Asia, US President Donald Trump Tuesday did an India-Pakistan on Israel-Iran, abruptly announcing a ceasefire between the two. Both the countries approached him for peace simultaneously and he agreed, the self-described peacemaker wrote in his post which had everyone wondering if the 'peace' would be lasting. Hours after the announcement, Trump lashed out at Iran and Israel as the two started violating the ceasefire firing missiles at each other though they earlier had agreed to Trump's proposal. However, despite the initial violations, there was a sense of relief in the wider Middle East that a path out of war had been charted

EXPLOSIONS RING OUT IN TEHRAN
Tehran: Explosions rang out in Tehran from Israeli airstrikes on Tuesday despite U.S. President Donald Trump saying Israel had called off strikes at his command to preserve an hours-old ceasefire. Two witnesses reached by telephone in the Iranian capital said they heard two loud explosions. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office acknowledged that Israel had struck a radar site near Tehran in what it said was retaliation for Iranian missiles fired three-and-a-half hours after the ceasefire had been due to begin.

soon as we made the deal, they came out and they dropped a load of bombs, the likes of which I've never seen before, the biggest load that we've seen." Iran and Israel had been fighting "so long and so hard that they don't know what the fuck they're doing," he said before turning away from cameras and heading to his helicopter. Earlier, Israeli Defence Minister Israel Katz had said he had ordered the military to mount new strikes on targets in Tehran in response to what he said were Iranian missiles fired in a "blatant violation" of the ceasefire. Iran denied launching any missiles and said Israel's attacks had continued for an hour and a half beyond the time the ceasefire was meant to start. Despite the initial violations, in both countries, the wider Middle East and around the world there was palpable sense of relief that a path out of war had been charted, 12 days after Israel launched it with a surprise attack, and two days after Trump joined in with strikes on Iranian nuclear targets.

Train fare to be hiked from July 1

New Delhi: The Railway Ministry is considering increasing fares of non-AC class in Mail/Express trains by 1 paisa and all AC classes by 2 paise per kilometre from July 1, 2025, officials said Tuesday. "As compared to the previous fare revisions in 2020 and 2013, the current increase will be the lowest," a railway official said. "So far as suburban train and monthly season tickets are concerned, it is being decided not to increase any fare in the interest of the daily commuters," he added. The official said that ordinary second class fare will not be increased for up to 500 kms and for distances beyond that, there might be an increase in the ticket prices by half paisa per km. According to the railway officials, before this, the train fare was increased on per km basis on January 1, 2020 when second class fare for ordinary and Mail/Express trains was increased by 1 paisa and 2 paise respectively.

500% US tariff if India buys crude from Russia

New Delhi, June 24: US senator Lindsey Graham, a long-time supporter of pro-Ukraine moves, has said that his sanctions bill against Russia will act as an "economic bunker buster" against, among other countries that do business with Moscow, India. Graham was quoted as having said June 22 in a television interview that he has 84 co-sponsors for the bill, "that is an economic bunker buster against China, India, and Russia for Russia's brutal invasion of Ukraine. I think that bill's going to pass...It's time to vote on that bill." The Sanctioning Russia Act of 2025 was introduced to the US senate in April this year. Politico's report on Graham's movements with the bill notes that the South Carolina Republican's proposal is to impose 500% tariffs on any country that buys Russian energy. The bill's passage through

the US senate is complicated by US president Donald Trump's famous friendship with Russian president Vladimir Putin. Of late, however, this friendship has not been in the best for forms with Trump calling Putin "CRAZY" on social media. Graham, according to Politico, plans to exempt countries that have aided Ukraine, indicating the European Union could perhaps escape the bill's ambit. The move would naturally cut the US off key economies like India, which, along with China, buys roughly 70% of Russian energy exports. While the bill will take time to travel through US senate and congress, support for it has been described as bipartisan and widespread, in the fourth year of Russia's invasion of Ukraine. According to reports, Russia has in the last three years risen to become one of India's top three crude oil suppliers.

61% power from non-fossil sources by 2036: Singh Deo

Bhubaneswar, June 24: Asserting that Odisha has successfully transitioned from a "power-sufficient to a power-empowered" state, the government Tuesday sought the Centre's support to build itself as a model in the electricity sector as it plans to generate 61 per cent power from non-fossil sources by 2036. Deputy Chief Minister KV Singh Deo, who is also in charge of the power department, said this at a conference of the energy ministers and secretaries of the eastern region, chaired by Union Power Minister Manohar Lal, in Patna. "Odisha has successfully transitioned from a power-sufficient to a power-empowered state. The state's peak power demand of 6,242 MW has been fully met. By 2036, 61 per cent of Odisha's power portfolio is targeted to be from non-fossil sources," Singh Deo was quoted in a statement as saying. Singh Deo informed the gathering that the state plans to add a total of 11,294 MW by 2036,



including solar, wind, hydro, distributed renewable energy (DRE), and pumped storage, out of which 3,904 MW has already been contracted. He said that Odisha has achieved Grid Resilience through Islanding Schemes to ensure uninterrupted power supply during grid failures. By 2030, Odisha will have 225 substations and 20,939 ckm (Circuit kilometer) of transmission lines with a total transformation capacity of 45,369 MVA (Mega-volt-amperes), Singh Deo said. This apart, the minister said, the renewable power evacuation corridors are being developed. This included Hiraakud-Kolabira-Duburi, Indravati-Theruvalli-Gopalpur, Theruvalli-Jayanagar 400kV LILO at Jayanagar pooling

Station, Balimela to Kolab at Jayanagar Pooling Station. Three out of four DISCOMs have received A+ ratings in the 12th and 13th Annual Rankings of Power Distribution Utilities and were among the top 10 performing utilities in India, he said. The minister sought proactive support from the Central government on key initiatives like sanction of Rs 6284 crore funds under the revamped distribution sector scheme, Central financial assistance for disaster-resilient power infrastructure, allocation of 800 MW power from the NLC Talabira Phase II project to Odisha and sanction of central financial assistance under Green Energy Transmission Corridor Projects in the state. This apart, the state government also sought the Centre's support for the Viability Gap Funding (VGF) for Pumped Storage Projects (PSP) in line with Battery Energy Storage System (BESS), floating solar projects, and offshore wind projects in Odisha, along with support for a study of tidal potential on the state's coastline.

Govt to set up 9 new medical colleges: Min



Bhubaneswar, June 24: The government is going to set up nine new medical colleges in the state, informed Health and Family Welfare Minister Mukesh Mahaling said Tuesday. Of the nine, four will be dental medical colleges and one Ayurvedic institute. "We have decided to set up four MBBS colleges at Jagatsinghpur, Bhadrak, Dhenkanal and Nabarangpur districts, four dental colleges at Burla, Berhampur, Bolangir and Keonjhar, besides an Ayurvedic college in Mayurbhanj district," Mahaling told media persons. Besides, the new medical colleges with 100 MBBS seats each at Phulbani in Kandhamal district and Talcher in Angul districts will start functioning from the current academic year, he said. Mahaling was speaking to reporters on the sidelines of the maiden Healthcare Summit 2025 organised by the Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) here. P3

Shukla's Axiom-4 eyes June 25 launch

New Delhi: Indian astronaut Shubhanshu Shukla's Axiom-4 mission to the International Space Station is now eyeing a launch June 25, NASA announced Tuesday. The Axiom-4 mission, which marks the return to space for India, Hungary, and Poland, was earlier scheduled for lift-off from NASA's Kennedy Space Centre in Florida June 25 onboard SpaceX's Falcon 9 rocket at 12:01 pm IST Wednesday. "NASA, Axiom Space, and SpaceX are targeting 2:31 a.m., Wednesday, June 25, for launch of the fourth private astronaut mission to the International Space Station, Axiom Mission 4," a NASA statement said.

An era when dark skin was highly esteemed in India

Bangalore, June 24: Not many know that there was a time when people in an Indian region preferred darker skin. In fact, they applied something to make their skin darker. This is one of the things researchers learnt while making a documentary titled The India They Saw, revealed Alfonso Tagliaferri, Consul General of Italy in Bangalore. The 30-minute film, which narrates the travels of two great Venetian explorers - Marco Polo and Niccolo de Conti during the 13th and 14th centuries - is a joint venture between India and Italy, he said. Apart from the Italian Consulate, the film is supported by Karnataka's Ministry of Tourism, Archaeological Survey of India, and Baldota Group. Among the things that the film highlight are a few surpris-



ing facts including that people in those days applied some oil - some believe it is sesame - to make their skin look darker, said the director of the film, Ganesh Shankar Raj. "In fact, we think the European-looking figure in one of the wall engravings in the Brihadeeswara Temple in Thanjavur (in Tamil Nadu) is Marco Polo," added Raj. Raj said they zeroed in on Niccolo de Conti initially, as he had travelled through Hampi in the 1430s, and his detailed accounts of his travel, published as manuscripts, had a great influence on European understanding of India. "But de Conti was not a popular figure. So, we decided to include the journeys of Marco Polo as well, a more well-known Venetian, whose accounts of India could have possibly inspired de Conti to undertake his journey," said Raj. "This documentary stands at the confluence of history, diplomacy, and imagination. At a time when cross-cultural understanding is more vital than

ever, the film hopes to foster goodwill between our nations and inspire a deeper appreciation of our shared legacies," shared Raj. For Tagliaferri, the religious tolerance and the beauty standards of those days, which are so different from modern India, are a revelation that he was happy to have come across, just as he was completing his journey as Consul General here. "But what hasn't changed is the sense of awe that one feels when one encounters India. Polo and de Conti were left in awe when they journeyed through India centuries ago. The same sense of marvel still fills the eyes of visitors today, as it did mine when I arrived three years ago," added Tagliaferri. The film was released officially on June 23 at the Bangalore International Centre in Domlur.

French tourist raped in Udaipur

Jaipur, June 24: A man allegedly raped a French tourist in Udaipur after luring her from a party to his apartment, the police said Tuesday. The accused is currently absconding, and efforts are underway to trace him, the police added. The incident occurred Monday in the Badgaon Police Station area. According to the police, the woman, who arrived in Udaipur from Delhi on June 22, was staying at a hotel in the Ambamata area. The woman allegedly attended a party at Tiger Hill, where she met the accused Siddharth, SHO PS Rajpurohit said. "The accused invited the woman to step outside on the pretext of showing her the nearby sights and later took her to his rented apartment in Sukher, where he raped her," he stated. She further alleged that once at the apartment, Siddharth attempted to initiate physical contact. When she resisted, he allegedly assaulted her sexually.

At the time, Sridevi was Bollywood's reigning superstar, delivering back-to-back hits and enjoying unmatched stardom. However, she reportedly turned down the film—possibly due to scheduling conflicts or because the role didn't align with her career goals.

After Sridevi's exit, the part went to Madhuri, a relatively new

face in the industry still struggling to find her big break. *Tezaab* proved to be that opportunity. 



9 new medical colleges in state soon: Mahaling

Bhubaneswar, June 24: The Odisha government is going to set up nine new medical colleges in the state, Health and Family Welfare (H&FW) Minister Mukesh Mahaling said Tuesday.

Speaking to reporters on the sidelines of 'Healthcare Summit 2025', organised by the Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) here, Mahaling said, "We have decided to set up MBBS colleges in Jagatsinghpur, Bhadrak, Dhenkanal and Nabarangpur districts, dental colleges at Burla, Berhampur, Bolangir and Keonjhar and an Ayurvedic college in Mayurbhanj district."

THE NEW 100-SEAT MEDICAL COLLEGES AT PHULBANI IN KANDHAMAL DISTRICT AND TALCHER IN ANGUL DISTRICT WILL START FUNCTIONING FROM THE CURRENT ACADEMIC YEAR

These apart, the new 100-seat medical colleges at Phulbani in Kandhamal district and Talcher in Angul district will start functioning from the current academic year, the H&FW Minister said.

Mahaling thanked Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi for approving the new medical colleges for Odisha as it will help meet the required number of doctors in the state.

In his address at 'Healthcare Summit 2025', the

H&FW Minister emphasised Odisha's commitment to enhancing healthcare infrastructure and medical education.

He informed the gathering about the recruitment of over 4,000 doctors and paramedical staff last year and plans to recruit more than 5,000 medical personnel this year.

Efforts will be made to fill up 1.5 lakh vacant government posts within five years, Mahaling said.

Sunil Gupta, chairman of CII Odisha State Council, underscored Odisha's growing role in the national healthcare landscape and the importance of public-private partnerships in driving future growth.

CB nabs 3 over ₹7-crore online fraud

BHUBANESWAR: The Crime Branch (CB) of Odisha Police has arrested three persons on charges of duping investors of over ₹7 crore in two separate cases of online fraud. In the first case, a complaint was lodged by a person alleging that he was defrauded by cyber fraudsters on pretext of higher returns on online trading. They persuaded him to trade in IPO and OTC, leading him to transfer ₹1,03,50,000. However, he later realised it was a scam and lodged an FIR. The CB arrested Ganesh K Setty from Chandra Layout in Bangalore in connection with the fraud. They persuaded him to trade in IPO and OTC, leading him to transfer ₹6,04,53,000. He realised it was a scam and lodged an FIR. The CB arrested Swapnil Goraksha Dhokale from Pune and Azaz Shafiq Shaikh from Mumbai in connection with the fraud.

Women not safe in Odisha: Cong panel

Bhubaneswar, June 24: A fact-finding team of All India Congress Committee (AICC) Tuesday alleged that women are not safe in Odisha, including in CM Mohan Charan Majhi's home district Keonjhar.

The five-member all-women team of the AICC, led by general secretary Deepa Dasmunsi, visited four districts where rape, gangrape and murder of women were reported recently.

The team visited Kandhamal, Ganjam, Keonjhar and Mayurbhanj districts in the past four days. After holding discussions with stakeholders, including families of the victims, villagers and local police, the team members Tuesday expressed shock over the rising crime against women in the state.

Briefing media here, MP Praniti Shinde, who is one of the members of the team, said, "After meeting the families of each victim, I can only say that women are not safe in the culturally-rich state of Odisha. A girl belonging to a poor family was killed when the state was celebrating a women's festival." "Only three words came to my mind to describe Odisha. Those are lawlessness, corruption and rape. Except for these

three things, nothing more is happening in Odisha," she alleged. There is an absolute collapse of the administrative system and society because there is no fear for the law in Odisha, Shinde said.

The Congress MP said that the CM has not given time to the committee for a formal discussion.

Shinde said, "We got some shocking facts during the visit which we will inform our leadership. We wanted to share those facts with the CM, but he doesn't have time for the women."

Dasmunsi alleged that atrocities against women have increased in Odisha during the past year after the BJP formed government in the state.

The Congress party would take up the issue with the President of India and Parliament, said Shobha Oza, another member of the panel.

Responding to allegations, BJP state vice-president Biranchi Narayan Tripathy claimed the Congress held the press conference to stay in the news.

Terming the Gopalpur gangrape incident very sad, Tripathy said the government took the case seriously and handed it over to the Crime Branch for proper investigation. All the accused were arrested within 24 hours, he added.

Min, SJTA rebuff claims of Modak theft from Srimandir

Puri, June 24: Close on the heels of a raging controversy over alleged theft of 70 sacred 'Dasamula Modaks' - herbal offerings meant for the Trinity during Anasara Ekadashi rituals - from Srimandir, the Shree Jagannath Temple Administration (SJTA) and the state Law Minister Tuesday rubbished the allegations and said that a detailed investigation is underway.

The claim of the pilferage was raised by Haladhar Das Mohapatra, the Badagrahi (ritual custodian) of Lord Balabhadra, who alleged that 70 out of 313 "Amunia Modaks" prepared by the temple's royal physicians (Rajvaidya) were found missing from the Garada Ghara, a secure chamber where the offerings were stored. He further asserted that the sanctity of the remaining Modaks had been compromised, yet they were still offered to the deities.

A complaint was submitted to SJTA Chief Administrator Arabinda Padhee, demanding an

inquiry. Padhee, however, refuted the claims of theft, stating that a preliminary probe found the allegations to be "not based on truth." He confirmed that a detailed investigation, led by senior temple officials including the Chief and Deputy Administrators, and the Temple Commander, is underway.

Similarly, state Law Minister Prithviraj Harichandan also weighed in, categorically denying the possibility of theft. "The Modaks prepared for the deities are not counted individually, so the question of theft does not arise. A few Daitapati servitors are trying to create unnecessary confusion," said the Law minister. He added that any wrongdoing found during the investigation would be dealt with strictly under the law.

According to the complaint, the 313 'Amunia Modaks'—believed to have therapeutic and spiritual significance—were prepared specially for Anasara period, when the deities are believed to recuperate in seclusion.

Govt's security boost move at tourist points faces backlash

Opposition calls move reactive and inadequate, while students hail it as a step toward safer public spaces

Bhubaneswar, June 24: In the wake of the Gopalpur incident, Deputy Chief Minister Pravatī Parida recently announced that security will be stepped up at tourist destinations and 'lovers' points' across Odisha to curb crimes against women.

The announcement drew sharp criticism from the Opposition political parties, but the move was welcomed by student groups.

BJD spokesperson Lenin Mohanty remarked, "This is no real solution to such heinous crimes. Following the US travel advisory, the Deputy CM's statement seems more like a panic response. The government must accept that the law-and-order situation is slipping out of control."

Mohanty further said, "Crimes against women have risen by eight per cent, which is significant. Simply boosting security at 'lovers' points



won't help. The government must ensure safety across the entire state to truly strengthen the tourism sector."

Congress state spokesperson Prashant Satpathy said, "The Deputy CM must first clarify whose security she plans to enhance and where. If the government is now thinking of securing 'lovers' points' and tourist spots, what was it doing for the past year?"

He added, "This government has no vision for women's safety. It reacts only after crimes occur, instead of preventing them. Recent incidents clearly show its crime control mechanism has completely failed."

Similarly, AAP state president Nishikanta Mohapatra said, "The Deputy CM's move to enhance security at 'lovers' points' reflects the grim state of law and order. Innocent people are falling victim to crimes

every day. Instead of focusing narrowly, the government must assess the overall situation and strengthen security statewide. Swift action against culprits is essential to improve the state's condition."

However, students have welcomed the move. "Couples often feel unsafe at public places. Police presence at 'lovers' points' can offer security, but it must be handled sensitively, as it can also create fear," said Dharitri Das, a master's student at Rama Devi Women's University.

Lapita Jena, a journalism student from Ravenshaw University, said, "It's a welcome step. Students often seek privacy in isolated areas and end up vulnerable to miscreants. This move will help young couples feel safer and reduce instances of eve-teasing and moral policing."

Two-day training on energy conservation





9 held for torture of two Dalit men

She later attended Christian prayer meetings in nearby Nilok village and, according to her, both she and her husband recovered from illness after praying there. However, she clarified that although she has faith in Jesus, the family has not formally converted to Christianity.

Armed robbers strike OGB Mayurbhanj branch, loot ₹7L

Baripada, June 24: A gang of armed robbers allegedly looted over Rs 7 lakh from an Odisha Gramya Bank (OGB) branch in Mayurbhanj district by locking up staff and customers before fleeing the scene, Tuesday.

The daring robbery took place at the Kuche branch of the bank, under the jurisdiction of Kuliana police station. According to reports, the six miscreants arrived at the bank—operating out of a rented building adjacent to National Highway 18—around 2:30pm.

While five of them entered the bank, located on the first floor of a building, one stood guard outside. Wielding firearms, the intruders threatened four employees and an equal number of customers who were present inside, took away their mobile phones, and forced the cashier to hand over cash totalling Rs 7 lakh.

The robbers then destroyed CCTV cameras and removed the hard disk. They locked the bank door from outside before making good their escape. While fleeing, they dumped the seized mobile phones under a nearby teak tree. The gang reportedly escaped via the Jharpokharia route on two Pulsar bikes and a Honda car. Their movements were partially captured on a CCTV camera installed at a cement shop located on the ground floor of the building. Police arrived at the scene shortly after the robbery, rescued those locked inside, and have launched an investigation.

Fake doctor held for raping minor

Berhampur, June 24: The police Tuesday arrested a 51-year-old fake homeopathic doctor in connection with the alleged rape of a 17-year-old girl in Courtpetta area of the City Monday.

Police said Bhabani Shankar Das who had perpetrated the crime in a Courtpetta area of the City Monday. Two women, identified as Priyanaka Sahu, 21, of VIP Colony and an Anganwadi worker were also arrested for assisting in the crime, a police officer said. Police said the accused is a native of Pudemari under Patapur police limits.

The incident occurred when Bhabani called the minor to the apartment Monday evening. There Priyanka gave her something to drink and later Bhabani raped her, the officer added.

Farmer fights off croc

Kendrapara: A 60-year-old farmer survived a crocodile attack after a 10-minute struggle in Kendrapara district's Mahakalapada block Tuesday. Prabhat Mandal of Arun Nagar village was near the Ramchandi Galia River when the crocodile attacked as he went to relieve himself. In a desperate effort to save his life, he jabbed his thumbs into the reptile's eyes, forcing it to retreat. Mandal suffered deep injuries to his hand and thigh, and received multiple stitches. Locals rescued him and took him to a nearby health center. Villagers have demanded government aid, which officials said will follow after proper procedure.

Man killed in group clash

Baripada: A man was killed and four others, including his mother, sustained critical injuries during a group clash over goat theft at Kalikapur under Town police limits here in Mayurbhanj district Tuesday. The deceased, identified as Raju Ghadei, 35, was assaulted with swords before being shot dead. Critically injured Akash Mukhi, Kundan Mukhi and the deceased mother Sabitri Ghadei were shifted to Cuttack after primary treatment. Another woman, Shilpa Mukhi, has been admitted to PRM Medical College and Hospital. DIG Satyajit Nayak, SP Varun Guntupalli reached the hospital and took stock of the situation. The incident sparked tension in the area as police forces were deployed at the hospital. The incident occurred after the family members of Raju, Akash and Kundan had a heated exchange of words over a goat theft. Both sides attacked each other with swords and sharp-edged weapons which resulted in critical injuries to four persons. Raju was attacked with swords and later, Akash fired a bullet at him from a gun, police said.

SHAREHOLDER CAPITALISM



A growing body of research shows that failure to account for social and environmental imperatives poses clear, material risks to firm operations and performance – not at some point in the distant future, but now

greater exposure to extreme weather events, and higher capital costs. In other words, the Business Roundtable's opposition to environmentally-focused policies and proposals is not just hypocritical; from their own short-sighted shareholder-capitalist perspective, it is economically irrational.

But there is no reason to expect the Business Roundtable's CEOs – or corporations more broadly – to change voluntarily. On the contrary, their April statement lays bare the transactional, opportunistic, and utterly dishonest nature of their moral posturing, which in reality, serves just one purpose: to get consumers and regulators off their backs. This should serve as a wake-up call to Democratic lawmakers, who have long coozied up to billionaires and large corporations, placing their hopes, against all evidence, in self-regulation.

Americans are fed up with the status quo. In one 2024 survey, only 34% of respondents agreed that capitalism is working for the average American. Moreover, majorities of respondents agreed that CEOs of large companies have a role to play in addressing issues like income inequality (78%), climate change (67%), and protecting voting rights (56%). With US Republicans doing everything in their power to bolster corporations, at the expense of ordinary Americans, it is up to Democrats to act.

The only way to rein in corporate power is to confront it head-on. That means mandating corporate commitments to structural change, imposing tougher punishments for corporate abuses, cracking down on dark money, strengthening antitrust enforcement, and expanding regulatory oversight, including of corporate influence over climate, labor, and economic policy. Anything less will sustain the corporate capture of America's political and economic system. The Democrats must decide whether they will be complicit in the inequality and authoritarianism they claim to oppose.

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In 2019, the Business Roundtable, an association of the United States' most powerful CEOs, won widespread praise by announcing its commitment to "stakeholder capitalism," which delivers value not only to shareholders, but also to other affected actors, such as employees and communities. Now, however, the Business Roundtable has changed its tune: its April report, "The Need for Bold Proxy Process Reforms," reads almost like a manifesto against stakeholder capitalism.

The reason for this volte-face is obvious. The Roundtable's 2019 "commitment" was a clear attempt to get on the right side of popular sentiment: engagement with social and environmental issues was up, and so were demands that powerful institutions get on board. But the political mood has changed. At a time when Americans are preoccupied with intensifying pressures on their own pocketbooks, US President Donald Trump's second administration is actively rejecting environmental and social issues. For many CEOs, this looks like a golden opportunity.

So, the Business Roundtable is calling on the US Congress to "enact legislation precluding the inclusion of shareholder proposals relating to environmental, social and political issues in a company's proxy statement." With this, CEOs want to scrap one of the few formal mechanisms through which a diverse range of stakeholders – including workers, pension funds, faith-based organizations, civil-rights groups, and long-term investors – can influence corporate behavior on issues like climate risk, inequality, worker safety, and political transparency.

There is plenty of precedent for this. While the Business Roundtable's CEOs like to pay lip service to voluntary corporate-responsibility initiatives, they have strenuously objected to public policies that would require them to follow through. For example, they opposed former President Joe Biden's Inflation Reduction Act, which directs significant funds to clean energy and emissions reduc-

tion, and channeled millions of dollars toward derailing the Biden administration's broader environmental agenda. They also resisted a proposal by the US Securities and Exchange Commission requiring companies to disclose greenhouse-gas emissions in their supply chains, arguing that such measures were excessively burdensome.

Not surprisingly, in 2021, Harvard researchers found that the "commitment" to stakeholders that had been made two years earlier had not been followed by meaningful action, and thus had been "mostly for show." Similar conclusions were drawn by researchers at Yale and Columbia, and in an analysis by The Guardian.

The fact is that delivering real value to workers and the environment would cost money, which would reduce shareholder dividends and executive pay – the real priorities of the Business Roundtable's members. In fact, the compensation of CEOs who signed the stakeholder-capitalism "commitment" has continued to reflect their success in delivering shareholder value. When the COVID-19 pandemic emerged in 2020, Marriott International almost immediately began furloughing most of its US workers – while paying out more than \$160 million in quarterly dividends and seeking a raise for its CEO, a signatory of the 2019 statement.

The same logic has driven the Business Roundtable's ad-

vocacy of tax reductions. In 2017, the group threw its support behind the first Trump administration's \$1.5 trillion tax-cut legislation, which overwhelmingly benefited corporations and the wealthy. Last year, it announced that it would spend "eight figures" lobbying to protect and extend the legislation's business-friendly tax breaks. As for Biden's 2022 Build Back Better initiative – which proposed modest tax increases on high earners to fund public services like education, health care, and infrastructure – the Business Roundtable voiced clear opposition.


So, as many critics warned from the start, the Business Roundtable never meant what it said in 2019. Whatever its claims about environmental or social responsibility, it has always been motivated by three interconnected objectives: avoiding accountability, maximizing short-term profits, and enriching executives.

To be sure, even from a commercial perspective, this approach is fundamentally flawed. A growing body of research shows that failure to account for social and environmental imperatives poses clear, material risks to firm operations and performance – not at some point in the distant future, but now. For example, companies with poor climate-risk management routinely face supply-chain instability,

Let Them Be

A 17-year-old girl was beaten to death by her father for not getting good score in a mock test for the pre-medical National Eligibility cum Entrance Test (NEET) in Sangli, Maharashtra, recently. The bright girl who had scored 95 per cent in Plus II lost her life at the altar of parental and societal expectation. These kinds of incidents have become all too common in India where becoming a doctor or an engineer is perceived as one of life's biggest achievement. This societal mentality that takes the form of unrealistic parental expectations has cut many young lives short. Kota in Rajasthan which is known for its NEET coaching centres has acquired the dark title of the suicide capital for NEET students. The pressure to qualify NEET is so high that most students struggle with mental health issues and many give up on life altogether. Media spotlight on Kota and the pressures students face has hardly helped change anything. Once a student cracks the examination, the family gloats and preens and the student is thrown into another long period of medical studies under intense pressure. It is no wonder many students are forced to tolerate ragging, bullying, even torture and opt to end their lives but never think of quitting medicine after getting through a good medical college. Their path, dictated by parents and society is carved in stone and they are helpless in deciding their own career of choice and future life path. Such is the case with countless students in India whose parents are obsessed with making them a doctor or an engineer.

The endless cycle of pressure doesn't stop even when medical students graduate. In many government hospitals, they often find themselves at the receiving end of mob fury. And in corporate hospitals, they are asked to chase targets in the form of patient admissions, tests and other forms of treatment. The principle of service, which is supposed to be at the core of the medical profession, dies a slow death in this phase. Doctors become sales agents with the primary objective of profit maximisation. Treatment of patients becomes secondary in a country where an average Indian family is just one disease away from bankruptcy. A commercialised healthcare sector attracts more students into the profession. This is evident in the ever-growing demand for medical colleges in the country even with the opening up of various sectors and professions in the post digital era.

The obsession of Indians with medical and engineering comes from a lack of entrepreneurial spirit where starting your own business initiative is frowned upon. From a young age, children are groomed to study hard and aspire to become a doctor, engineer or an IAS officer. Rest of the professions, however fulfilling or financially rewarding, are considered second best while entrepreneurship is considered the last option. That is also why while we rue the lack of successful medal winning sportspersons, artists who can wow at the global stage and business leaders to look up to, we would not allow our children to walk a different path at the time when it truly matters, when we have to choose between prioritising studies or passion. The age of internet and social media has opened up vast avenues for youngsters to prove their worth and make money. But schools are still stuck in a rut. In the Indian schooling system, only the students performing well in academics are appreciated and other creative abilities and passions are categorised as 'Extra' Curricular, be it sports, quizzing, music, art or anything else. This dangerous obsession with academics and especially with the medical profession is literally snuffing out young lives and ruining careers of many bright students who could have otherwise shone in careers of their own choosing. It is time for society and family to loosen the death grip and let young people find joy in whatever profession they choose to follow and shine in it.

Driving wisdom from my decades of experience

THERE ARE TOO MANY IDIOTS ON THE ROAD, WHETHER YOU'RE DRIVING IN NEW YORK CITY, MUMBAI OR BUENOS AIRES

I've been a driver for more than 40 years, so I consider myself somewhat of an expert on driving. I've learned many important lessons while driving, so I'd like to share some of my driving wisdom by answering a few frequently asked questions (FAQs).

1. What do you need to begin driving?

The most important thing you need to begin driving is a vehicle. In general, you cannot drive without a vehicle. There are some exceptions, of course, such as driving a ball with a golf club, driving a nail into a plank, and driving your parents up the wall.

2. What about a license? Don't you need one to drive a vehicle?

You do not need one, unless it's important for you to stay out of jail. I highly recommend getting a license, as required by law, but I have to admit that I started driving without

3. What is the best way to learn to drive?

Enroll in a driving school or ask a family member to teach you. Do not ask a friend, unless the friend possesses the patience and demeanor of the Dalai Lama. It is important to learn to drive from someone who doesn't easily scream or use bad language.

4. What is the hardest part about driving?

The hardest part about driving is getting a license. You have to pass a driving test, proving to a driving examiner that you are a competent driver. This isn't easy, especially since you may have to drive around with the examiner for 20 minutes or more, during which time you may have to do the following: (1) show proficiency in parallel parking; (2) drive under the speed limit but not under the influence of anything; and (3) refrain from looking at your phone, even if your mother keeps texting you, asking if you passed.

5. If you have to prove that you are a competent driver to get a license, why are there so many incompetent drivers on the road?

This is a good question. I would not use the word "incompetent" to describe these drivers. I would use another

'T' word: idiots. There are too many idiots on the road, whether you're driving in New York City, Mumbai or Buenos Aires. Almost all these idiots passed the driving exam, but subsequently decided that some of the rules do not apply to them. Normal drivers break rules occasionally, but idiots break them compulsively.

6. What is the best way to avoid accidents?

The best way to avoid accidents is to do more walking. Walkers rarely crash into each other. Another option is to leave your car parked and take the bus or train. But if you insist on driving, the best thing you can do is drive defensively. This means that if you come across an idiot on the road, do not try to out-idiot the idiot. If he wants to overtake you, let him overtake you. Just remember: an overtaker is more likely to end up with an undertaker.

New Delhi, June 24: The Delhi High Court has outlined the need for a sewer line across the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) premises to prevent waterlogging in the Green Park Extension and surrounding areas.

A bench of Justices Prathibha M Singh and Manmeet Pritam Singh Arora was hearing a petition on the issue of waterlogging in the area.

In an order dated June 18, the court noted the submissions of the Delhi Jal Board (DJB), which said the proposed sewer line would not be more than 200-metre long and only require about 130 metre of land within the AIIMS premises.

"Court does not doubt the necessity of laying a sewer line across the AIIMS premises to prevent waterlogging in the areas concerned. Further considering the required extent of land and the overarching public interest involved, the court is clear that the new sewer line is required to be laid across the AIIMS residential complex."

The bench issued other directions, including to the DJB and

Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD) to ensure regular de-silting and cleaning of the existing sewer line and the stormwater drain.

Further, the DJB's chief engineer was ordered to conduct a meeting with the authorities of AIIMS, MCD, public works department (PWD), New Delhi Municipal Corporation (NDMC) and forest department July 8.

"The chief engineer, DJB and commissioner, MCD, shall then put up a report on the plan for laying of the sewer line and storm water drain, in consultation with the above authorities and specifically to the satisfaction of AIIMS (nodal officer)," the court said.

The report would include the proposal for the design of the sewer line and how it would be connected from Green Park Extension to the Aurobindo Marg along the AIIMS premises, it added.

The report, the bench said, would also include the aspects

PWD to install new stormwater management system

The PWD is planning to install a new stormwater management system featuring real-time monitoring and a facility to issue immediate alerts in a bid to address the perpetual issue of waterlogging at the Minto Bridge underpass, officials said. This underpass in the central Delhi area connects Connaught Place to Deen Dyal Upadhyaya Marg and is infamous for heavy flooding almost every monsoon season. Despite several efforts in the past, waterlogging remains a major concern at this location. According to an official, the department is planning a technical intervention that will feature a facility for issuing an immediate alert to officials in case of any fault or breakdown at the pump house, among other aspects. "We plan to install the SCADA software for online monitoring of the pump house at the site so that real-time information about activities inside the pump house can be sent to the control room and even recorded. Every year Public Works Department (PWD) sets up a special flood control room at the headquarters from where the situation is monitored by officials," said a senior PWD official.

of the sewerline's timeline, budget and maintenance.

"The court emphasises upon the fact that the above report shall be prepared in close coordination with the AIIMS so that the least disturbance is caused to the residents within the AIIMS residential campus during the laying of the sewer line," the order said.

The DJB was asked to further inform the bench on the issue of waterlogging in the areas

concerned during the current monsoon season.

The matter would be heard July 28.

AIIMS had opposed the proposal of laying a sewer line across its premises to control the problem May 29, saying waterlogging in the area was primarily due to the ineffective functioning of the rainwater drainage system and not owing to inadequacies in the existing sewer infrastructure.

U'khand HC stays panchayat polls over flawed quota formula

Nainital, June 24: In a setback to the Uttarakhand government, the Nainital High Court Monday stayed the two-phase gram panchayats elections next month, directing implementation of a new reservation rotation formula.

Voting for the three-tier rural bodies was scheduled to be held July 10 and July 15, and counting of votes was scheduled for July 19.

A division bench comprising Chief Justice G. Narendar and Justice Alok Mehra put the brakes on the elections at a time when the process had reached an advanced stage. The elections were to be notified on Monday, ahead of the filing of nominations between June 25 and 28 for the first phase.

The High Court bench was hearing a petition filed by Bageshwar resident Ganesh Dutt Kandpal and others who

alleged that reserved seats had remained the same over the past three tenures and the government had followed the same formula for the current elections as well. One of the petitioners claimed that since the same reservation formula had been adopted by the State Election Commission, he was denied an opportunity to contest from a seat of his choice.

Following the High Court's intervention Monday, the schedule for the elections to pick 74,499 Gram Pradhans, 55,600 Gram Panchayat members, 2,974 Kshetra Panchayat members and 358 Zila Panchayat members will have to be reworked now.

As per the now-stayed plans of the State Election Commission, District Election Officers were supposed to issue a detailed notification Monday, paving the way for the filing of nomination papers from June 25 to June 28.

The candidates were supposed to be allotted election symbols July 3 for balloting July 10.

The petitioner's advocate claimed that he had also challenged in court the reservation rules issued June 9.

UTTARAKHAND LANDSLIDE

Search for victims continues

Uttarkashi, June 24: The search for two missing landslide victims on the Yamunotri trek route continued Tuesday as the daylong operation yielded no results.

The landslide occurred Monday afternoon at a point known as 9, Kainchi Bhairav Mandir, hitting a group of five pilgrims returning from Yamunotri. Two of them died on the spot.

The yatra to the Bahirav temple through the trek route remained suspended during the day with the road and railing near the Himalayan temple, the spot of the landslide, damaged by debris.

"We have kept the yatra on

hold during the day as you can see the spot is sensitive. Once the rubble is cleared, we hope to open the yatra Wednesday. Search by the SDRF (State Disaster Response Force), NDRF (National Disaster Response Force) and the police personnel for the two missing pilgrims continues," Uttarkashi District Magistrate (DM) Prashant Arya said.

The pilgrims fell into a gorge after being hit by boulders tumbling from the hillside.

The two pilgrims still missing are Bhavika Sharma (11) from Delhi and Kamlesh Jethwa (35) from Mumbai.

A pilgrim from Mumbai was rescued in an injured condition and two mutilated bodies were

recovered from the rubble of the landslide Monday night.

The injured pilgrim, identified as Rasik, is undergoing treatment at a public health centre in Jankichatti and his condition is stated to be stable. The two mutilated bodies were identified as Harishankar (47) from Jaunpur in Uttar Pradesh and his daughter Khyati (8), the officials added.

The DM has directed officials to provide all possible assistance to the families of those killed and injured. With the yatra through the trek route kept on hold temporarily due to rescue work and road repairs, the administration has stopped the pilgrims going to the Yamunotri Dham at various places from Damta to Jankichatti, including Naugaon, Barkot, Dobata, Gangani, Kharadi, Paligad, Syalna and Rana Chatti, for their safety.

Apart from this, the work of cleaning and arranging an alternative route to the temple is also in progress which is likely to be completed by Tuesday night.

The Yamunotri pedestrian route will be made operational on Wednesday for safe travel and the pilgrims will be sent from Janki Chatti to Shri Yamunotri Dham, the DM said.


Dehradun, June 24: A Noida-based environment activist Monday demanded a complete ban on the sale and use of cigarettes, gutkha and other tobacco products at the Kedarnath temple and the yatra route from Sonprayag to the shrine.

In a letter to the Uttarakhand chief secretary, activist Amit Gupta said that despite various rules in place, only 24 people have been fined of ₹2,200 for the tobacco-related offences till June 15 this year.

He stressed on the need for a strict ban on the sale and consumption of tobacco products near the temple, claiming that such items are being sold openly along the route.

"As a concerned citizen and nature volunteer I bring to your kind attention the urgent need for a strict ban on the sale, consumption, and littering of cigarettes, gutkha, and other tobacco products in and around Kedarnath Dham, including the entire yatra route from Sonprayag to the shrine," Gupta said in the letter. "Kedarnath ji is not only one of the most revered Jyotirlingas of Lord Shiva, but also situated in an ecologically sensitive Himalayan zone that demands the highest levels of cleanliness and spiritual sanctity," he said.

He said despite various rules in place, his latest RTI query has revealed that cigarettes, gutkha and other tobacco products are openly being sold



at key points along the route to Kedarnath.

"Plastic pouches and cigarette butts are being littered, damaging the fragile environment and polluting the sacred surroundings," he said, adding such substances violate the devotional atmosphere and often lead to health and fire safety risks in high-altitude conditions.

"I respectfully urge the Uttarakhand government to impose a total ban on the sale, possession, and use of gutkha, cigarettes, and tobacco products in the Kedarnath region (Sonprayag, Gaurikund, Kedarnath base, and yatra route)," he wrote in the letter. Gupta also demanded deployment of strict enforcement teams on the route and introduction of heavy penalties or fines for defaulters.

An awareness campaign should also be launched for pilgrims and local stakeholders regarding tobacco hazards and environmental responsibility, the activist said.

"A sacred place like Kedarnath Dham should be preserved with the highest degree of reverence, ensuring it remains a smoke-free and gutkha-free pilgrimage zone for current and future generations," he said.

Citing information provided by Kotwali Sonprayag in response to an RTI query filed by him, Gupta said 174 people were fined a total of ₹19,850 under the COTPA Act, or the Cigarettes and Other Tobacco Products (Prohibition of Advertisement and Regulation of Trade and Commerce, Production, Supply and Distribution) Act, in Kedarnath in 2024.

How JNU students outsmarted Emergency raids

New Delhi, June 24: In an extraordinary act of resistance during the Emergency, students at the Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU) devised a plan to escape arrest by secretly locking themselves inside hostel rooms.

The move proved vital during a massive police crackdown that saw paramilitary forces rounding up the entire campus.

Historian Sohail Hashmi, who was then secretary of the Students' Federation of India (SFI) at the JNU, in an interview with PTI recalled the dramatic night of July 8, 1975.

"We knew the raid was coming. Some students, who were actually intelligence agents, had tipped us off. It could happen any time between July 6 and 8," he said.

Ahead of the raid, student leaders developed an internal network.

"We kept rotating rooms. Those likely to be arrested were locked. The person who locked them would go to another room



and be locked in too. The keys were passed quietly among a few of us," Hashmi explained.

"Only the person doing the locking knew where anyone actually was," he said.

When the raid began just after midnight, the JNU turned into a garrison.

"There were about 30 to 40



trucks of police and paramilitary forces. Some say 500 of officers, others say up to 1,500. Each of the three hostels was surrounded by gun-toting forces. On top of that, a second ring sealed off the entire campus."

Hashmi said the elaborate locking plan saved many.

"They couldn't find most of

people they had come to arrest," he said. But he was among the few detained. "The friend who was supposed to lock me in couldn't reach the campus that night. I had to sleep in an unlocked room. When they knocked, I had no option but to open the door."

Hashmi, along with about a

dozen others, was arrested under the Defence of India Rules (DIR), 1969, which allowed preventive detention without trial. "They took us to Tihar Jail. A few days later, we were produced in the court," he said.

The detainees were granted bail after the university's faculty came forward to testify. "My research guide, Prof Munish Raza, and registrar NVK Murthy stood by us. They told the magistrate that there had been no conspiracy or public meeting," Hashmi said.

The Emergency declared June 25, 1975 by then Prime Minister Indira Gandhi lasted until March 21, 1977. It was marked by widespread press censorship, arrests without trial and the stifling of dissent in academia, politics and civil society.

"JNU was the first institution in the country to face this level of crackdown," Hashmi said. "We were students, but they treated us like insurgents."

DGCA audit finds flight safety lapses

New Delhi, June 24: Aviation watchdog DGCA has detected multiple violations related to airlines, airports, aircraft maintenance works, and repeated defects in multiple cases during its surveillance at major airports, an exercise carried out in less than two weeks after the Air India plane crash.

Without disclosing names of the airlines, airports and other entities in relation to the defects, the regulator Tuesday said surveillance covered multiple critical areas such as flight operations, airworthiness, ramp safety, Air Traffic Control (ATC), Communication, Navigation and Surveillance (CNS) systems, and pre-flight medical evaluations.

From a faded centre line marking of a runway at an airport to non-updation of obstruction limitation data for three years to a scheduled carrier's domestic flight being held up due to worn tyres, the watchdog came across multiple defects in the aviation ecosystem.

Noting that the comprehensive surveillance will continue in future to detect hazards in the aviation ecosystem, the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) said the findings have been communicated to the entities concerned for taking corrective actions within seven days. Two teams led by the Joint Director General



carried out the surveillance during night and early morning hours at major airports, including Delhi and Mumbai airports.

In a detailed statement about the surveillance findings, DGCA listed multiple cases wherein the reported defects reappeared many times on the aircraft indicating ineffective monitoring and inadequate rectification.

During maintenance of aircraft, the work order was not followed, DGCA said and added that the unserviceable thrust reverser system and flap slat lever were not locked.

"During maintenance, safety precautions found not (to have been) taken by AME (Aircraft Maintenance Engineer) as per AMM (Aircraft Maintenance Manual); at places, AME was

not attending to the snag rectification; defect reports generated by the aircraft system, were not found recorded in the technical logbook," the statement said.

Also, DGCA found that several life vests were not properly secured beneath their designated seats in aircraft and the corrosion-resistant tape on the right-hand side winglet's lower blade was found to be damaged.

At an airport, centre line marking of a runway was observed faded and the rapid exit taxiway, green centre light were not unidirectional. The obstruction limitation data was found to have not been updated for last three years and no survey has been performed despite many new con-

struction around the vicinity of aerodrome, DGCA said.

However, names of the airports were not disclosed. "A number of vehicles in the ramp area were found without speed governors. These vehicles were withdrawn by cancelling there AVP and drivers ADP were suspended," the statement said.

Further, the regulator said a simulator was found not matching with the aircraft configuration and that the software was not updated to the current version.

Besides, a domestic flight of a scheduled carrier was held up due to worn tyres and it was released only after the required rectification was done, it added.

DGCA emphasised that it has initiated a focused assessment of the aviation ecosystem to strengthen safety measures across the sector.

"Throughout the surveillance, ground activities and aircraft movements were closely monitored to check the compliance of regulatory requirements and to identify weak areas for improvement," the statement said.

In the wake of the crash of the London-bound Air India Boeing 787-8 plane soon after take off from Ahmedabad June 12, DGCA has also put in place a special audit framework for a "360-degree" evaluation of the country's aviation ecosystem and transcend the current practice of siloed assessment.

IAF to get at least 6 Tejas jets by March: HAL chief

New Delhi, June 24: The Indian Air Force will get at least half-a-dozen Tejas Light Combat Aircraft by March 2026, Hindustan Aeronautics Ltd CMD D K Sunil has said, weeks after the IAF chief flagged serious concerns over delays in the delivery of the jets.

Sunil, chairperson and managing director of the aviation behemoth, attributed the delivery delays to US defence major GE Aerospace missing the deadline for supply of its engines to power the fighter jets. The slippage in the delivery schedule for the LCA Mk-1A variant of the jet had become a major issue with Chief of Air Staff Air Chief Marshal A P Singh raising the matter publicly.

Sunil said the delay was caused only due to the US firm's inability to supply the F404 engines on time. In an exclusive interview with PTI Videos, the HAL chief said GE Aerospace is expected to supply 12 engines in the current fiscal. This will facilitate delivery of the jets to the IAF. "Every company goes through its fair share of criticisms. It does happen. Unfortunately, in the case of LCA Mark 1A, we have built the aircraft. As of today, we have six aircraft lined up," he said.

The delay from GE side was initially due to production timelines falling behind during the Covid pandemic, and the subsequent departure of many senior engineers from the company, causing cascading supply chain bottlenecks.

CDS get powers to give joint orders for armed forces

NEW DELHI: Defence Minister Rajnath Singh has authorised Chief of Defence Staff Gen Anil Chauhan to issue orders to the three services to ensure greater synergy. This marks a shift from the earlier system under which instructions and orders pertaining to two or more services were issued by each service separately. The move comes amid the government's efforts to roll out the theatisation model for greater synergy and jointness among the Army, Navy and the Air Force. In a statement, the defence ministry said the first joint order on "approval, promulgation and numbering" of joint instructions and joint orders "was released Tuesday.

According to Sunil, the technical issues with GE Aerospace have been sorted out and HAL is set to receive 12 jet engines by March 2026. "I can assure you that as of today, six aircraft are ready. There is no let up from our side. We are building those aircraft and getting them ready and we will be in a position to deliver (by this fiscal)," he said.

In February 2021, the defence ministry sealed a Rs 48,000 crore deal with HAL for the procurement of 83 Tejas Mk-1A jets for the IAF. The ministry is also in the process of procuring 97 more LCA Mk-1As at a cost around Rs 67,000 crore.

Actor Srikanth sent to judicial custody

Chennai: Popular actor Srikanth, who was interrogated by the police for nearly eight hours in connection with a drug case, has been remanded to judicial custody till July 7, police said Tuesday. The actor was questioned at the Nungambakkam police station here Monday following the detention of former AIADMK functionary T Prasad, whom the police suspect has supplied cocaine to Srikanth, 46, and another actor. Srikanth's blood samples were collected for medical examination at the Kilpauk Medical College Hospital here, and the tests confirmed the presence of a narcotic substance in his body, police said.

CM Siddaramaiah meets Sitharaman

New Delhi: Karnataka Chief Minister Siddaramaiah Tuesday met Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman to seek the Centre's support for a pro-growth approach in tax devolution among states by the 16th Finance Commission. During the meeting, Siddaramaiah briefed Sitharaman on Karnataka's significant losses under the 15th Finance Commission award, an official statement said.

Ex CM Shibu Soren admitted to hospital

New Delhi: Former Jharkhand Chief Minister Shibu Soren has been hospitalised in a private hospital in the national capital for the past three days, sources said Tuesday. Soren, 81, is receiving treatment at the Ganga Ram Hospital, a source told PTI, adding that it is not just a routine check-up, as he has been admitted for the past three days. He is currently stable, the source added. Speaking about his father's health condition, Jharkhand Chief Minister Hemant Soren said, "He has been receiving regular treatment at this hospital for a long time. He was admitted here recently, so we came to see him."

Man dies in building fire

Kolkata: A man died in a fire that broke out on the ground floor of a residential building in Kestopur area on the eastern fringes of Kolkata Tuesday, police said. Locals said the fire was first spotted around 3:30 am when the blaze engulfed the ground floor of the house in the area under the Baguihati Police Station limits, a senior officer said.

K'taka CM seeks Prez's nod for seven key Bills

"Seven bills have not yet been approved. I requested the President to clear them at the earliest," Siddaramaiah told reporters after the meeting.


Among the prominent bills presented to the President is The Right of Children to Free

and Compulsory Education (Karnataka Amendment) Bill 2025, which seeks to modify the existing RTE framework in the state.

The Karnataka (Mineral Rights and Mineral Bearing Land) Tax Bill 2024 aims to enhance the state's revenue from its mineral resources, while the Karnataka Transparency in Public Procurement (Amendment) Act 2025 is designed to bring greater accountability in government purchases.

The legislative package also includes The Registration (Karnataka Amendment) Bill 2024 and its 2025 counterpart, along with The Notaries (Karnataka Amendment) Bill 2025, which focus on streamlining administrative processes.

The Karnataka Hindi Religious Institutions and Charitable Endowment (Amendment) 2024 are the list of Bills seeking presidential approval. These Bills require the President's assent as they fall under provisions that mandate central government approval before implementation in the state.

India enters top 100 in global SDG rankings for first time

According to the UN Sustainable Development Solutions Network's 10th and latest Sustainable Development Report (SDR), India ranks 99th on the 2025 SDG Index with a score of 67, while China ranks 49th with 74.4 and the US 44th with 75.2 points

New Delhi, June 24: India has for the first time secured a place among the top 100 out of 167 countries ranked for their progress in achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), according to a report published Tuesday.

According to the UN Sustainable Development Solutions Network's 10th and latest Sustainable Development Report (SDR), India ranks 99th on the 2025 SDG Index with a score of 67, while China ranks 49th with 74.4 and the US 44th with 75.2 points.

India ranked 109th in 2024, 112th in 2023, 121st in 2022, 120th in 2021, 117th in 2020, 115th in 2019, 112th in 2018 and 116th in 2017. Among India's neighbours, Bhutan takes 74th place with 70.5 points, Nepal ranks 85th with 68.6, Bangla-



desh 114th with 63.9 and Pakistan 140th with 57 points.

India's maritime neighbours, Maldives and Sri Lanka, stood at 53rd and 93rd places, respectively.

The SDGs were adopted in 2015 with the idea that to save the planet, no one should be left behind in the overall development matrix by 2030.

The score measures progress on a scale of 0 to 100 where 100 indicates a country has achieved all 17 goals and 0 means no progress has been made. The report's authors flagged that SDG progress has stalled at the global level, with only 17 per cent of the 17 targets projected to be achieved by 2030.

"Conflicts, structural vulnerabilities and limited fiscal space impede SDG progress in many parts of the world," said the report, with world-renowned economist Jeffrey Sachs as its lead author.

European countries, especially the Nordic nations, continue to top the SDG Index, with Finland ranking first, Sweden second and Denmark third. A total of 19 out of the top 20 countries are in Europe.

Yet even these countries face significant challenges in achieving at least two goals, including those related to climate and biodiversity, largely due to unsustainable consumption, the authors said.

East and South Asia have outperformed all other global regions in terms of SDG progress since 2015 largely due to rapid socioeconomic

development. The countries in East and South Asia that have demonstrated the fastest progress since 2015 (in points) include Nepal (+11.1), Cambodia (+10), the Philippines (+8.6), Bangladesh (+8.3) and Mongolia (+7.7).

The other countries showing rapid progress among their peers include Benin (+14.5), Peru (+8.7), the United Arab Emirates (+9.9), Uzbekistan (+12.1), Costa Rica (+7) and Saudi Arabia (+8.1).

Though only 17 per cent of the targets are on track to be achieved worldwide, most UN member states have made strong progress on targets related to access to basic services and infrastructure, including mobile broadband use (SDG 9), access to electricity (SDG 7), internet use (SDG 9), under-five mortality rate (SDG 3) and neonatal mortality (SDG 3).

Suspend operation of AI Boeing fleet pending safety audit: Plea in SC

New Delhi, June 24: A plea in the Supreme Court has sought suspending Air India Boeing aircraft operations pending a safety audit within two weeks in wake of the recent Ahmedabad air tragedy that claimed lives of 241 passengers and crew on board.

The London-bound Air India flight, Boeing Dreamliner 787-8, with 242 passengers and crew on board, crashed moments after taking off from the Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel International Airport in Ahmedabad on the afternoon of June 12. The plea sought directions to the authorities, particularly the DGCA, to conduct unannounced audits of entire fleet of Air India and other air carriers operating in India, with public disclosure of findings and imposition of immediate corrective measures or penalties for non-compliance.

The plea filed by petitioner and advocate Ajay Bansal has made the Centre, Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA), Air India Limited and Bureau of Civil Aviation Security (BCAS) as parties. In the interim, the plea sought to "suspend operation of Boeing aircraft of Air India, pending a safety audit within two weeks, in view of the recent crash and reported maintenance backlogs".

5 die from suspected poisonous gas in well

GUNA (MP): Five persons died due to suspected inhalation of poisonous gas after they descended into a well to rescue a calf in Guna district of Madhya Pradesh Tuesday, officials said. District Collector Kishore Kanyal said the incident occurred around 11 am. "As per the preliminary information, six people descended into the well to rescue a calf. Of them, three died (on the spot) while two others were rescued in critical condition and shifted to the Guna district hospital, where they succumbed," the collector said. Only one of the six men managed to come out safely, he said. Prima facie, all of them died of suspected inhalation of carbon monoxide gas, the collector said, adding that the investigation is underway. He said the well has around 12 feet of water which hindered the rescue operation by the CISF unit of GAIL, SDRF, and teams of various agencies.

place. Some MPs also asked why no motion to remove Justice Varma has been moved so far. They also pointed out the Veeraswami versus Union of India judgement of 1991. Sources said some demanded that justice should be equitable since a government employee may lose his/her job over a small corruption issue but no action has been initiated against a senior member of the judiciary even after the recovery of unaccounted cash.

MPs of several parties also demanded that the government should have brought a motion by now to remove the judge concerned, especially after a Supreme Court-appointed committee of judges found the recovery of cash to be true. After the cash recovery, Justice Varma was repatriated to his parent court -- the Allahabad High Court. He has denied the charges against him.

Law Ministry officials later pointed out that a Supreme Court judgment had ruled that prior sanction would be required to prosecute top court and high court judges.

The K Veeraswami vs Union of India case of 1991 is a landmark judgment by the Supreme Court that addresses the applicability of anti-corruption laws to judges of the higher judiciary and underscores the importance of judicial independence.

The top court had underlined that judges were indeed "public servants" under the Prevention of Corruption Act but noted that prior sanction would be required to prosecute a judge.

They said the secretary in the Department of Justice, who made a presentation on 'Judicial processes and their reform' concerning issues of Code of Conduct for the judges of higher judiciary and taking up post-retirement assignments by judges, was asked to prepare a comprehensive report on the issues raised and told to present it at the next panel meeting.

The sources add that at the request of some members, the Department of Justice was told to prepare a comprehensive bill addressing various issues and concerns on ethics and code of conduct of judges raised by them during the meeting.

The MPs sought to know why no action had been taken on the matter concerning the recovery of unaccounted cash from the residence of Justice Yashwant Varma and demanded that a code of conduct should be in

Sapkal accuses Fadnavis of electoral fraud

Mumbai, June 24: Maharashtra Congress president Harshwardhan Sapkal Tuesday demanded the resignation of Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis, alleging that eight per cent rise in voters in five months in his Nagpur South West constituency amounted to "electoral fraud".

Congress' Prafulla Gudadhe Patil, who unsuccessfully contested last year's assembly elections against Fadnavis from the Nagpur South West assem-

than 25 constituencies in Maharashtra saw more than eight per cent increase in voter numbers between the Lok Sabha and assembly elections.

Gandhi shared a media report that claimed that between the 2024 Lok Sabha elections and the Maharashtra assembly polls, Fadnavis's constituency, Nagpur South West, added 29,219 new voters.

Sapkal said, "Rahul Gandhi has consistently raised the issue of electoral fraud. After the irregularities in BJP state president Chandrashekar Bawankule's Kamthi constituency were exposed, it has now come to light that in CM Fadnavis' Nagpur South West constituency, the voter count has increased by 8 per cent in just five months."

Man paraded with garland of shoes

Shah chairs Central Zonal Council meet

The aim of the meeting, held at Hotel Taj, was to strengthen inter-state coordination and cooperative federalism, as per a statement.

Punjab cabinet expansion soon

Chandigarh: Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann Tuesday said a cabinet expansion would take place in two to four days and Ludhiana West assembly bypoll winner Sanjeev Arora would be inducted as a minister. The Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) retained the Ludhiana West seat in the recent bypoll, with Arora registering a victory against his nearest rival and Congress candidate Bharat Bhushan Ashu by a margin of 10,637 votes.

Signature row hits bid to oust HC judge

New Delhi, June 24: The Rajya Sabha secretariat has verified the signatures of 45 of the 55 MPs who had signed a notice to bring a motion for the removal of Allahabad High Court Judge Shekhar Yadav over his "hate speech" even as Kapil Sibal and eight others were yet to verify their signatures.

Sibal, who has been vocal for early action on the notice, has claimed that he has not received any email from the Rajya Sabha secretariat, which confirmed having sent the

same to his official email thrice during the past six months.

He has questioned the need for the verification of signatures and the delay in initiating the process in March when the notice was submitted December 13, 2024. While 55 MPs have signed the notice for the removal of Justice Yadav, the signature of one of the MPs, Sarfaraz Ahmed, appears twice on the notice. The Rajya Sabha Secretariat is verifying how his signature appeared twice on the notice and whether they are forged. Ahmed, a JMM MP from Jharkhand, has already met Rajya Sabha Chairman Jagdeep

Dhankhar on the issue and confirmed having signed only once and not twice, sources said.

Rajya Sabha sources said the possibility of a criminal investigation by the Ethics Committee and the Privileges Committee into the notice seeking the removal of Justice Shekhar Yadav in the House cannot be ruled out as the document bears "forged" signatures of an MP.

They also said the notice for removal of Justice Yadav, which was submitted by 55 opposition MPs, is undated and not addressed to anyone.

Mamata alleges 300 migrants held in Rajasthan

Kolkata, June 24: Claiming that Bengali-speaking people from the state were being branded as Bangladeshis in some BJP-ruled states, West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee Tuesday said this cannot be allowed.

Banerjee told reporters in her Assembly chamber that she has information that 300-400 Bengali-speaking migrant labourers were confined in a building in Rajasthan during the day despite showing valid documents. "Is it a crime to speak in Bangla, the language of Rabindranath Tagore and

Swami Vivekananda, among other luminaries? I think Prime Minister Narendra Modi is not aware of this development. I will draw his attention," she said.

She claimed that apart from Rajasthan, such incidents also took place in BJP-ruled Delhi and Madhya Pradesh in the past. To a question, Banerjee said the chief secretary is taking up the latest such issue with his counterpart in Rajasthan. According to Nabanna sources, the incident allegedly took place at Bhiwadi, a planned city in Rajasthan's Khairthal-Tijara district and a part of the National Capital Region of Delhi.

Chaos at Doha, Dubai airports

Dubai/Doha, June 24: Operations at two of the world's busiest airports in Doha and Dubai slowed to a crawl on Tuesday as thousands of travellers queued for hours, facing long delays and flight cancellations after the temporary closure of airspace a day earlier.



Qatar, Bahrain, and Kuwait shut their airspace late on Monday after Iran's strike on a U.S. military base in Qatar's capital Doha, forcing airlines to cancel or reroute hundreds of flights and creating a backlog of stranded passengers.

Airports across Dubai in the United Arab Emirates briefly halted operations. U.S. President Donald Trump said a ceasefire between Israel and Iran was in place and asked both sides not to violate it, raising hopes of an end to the 12-day war, but hostilities continued, with deadly attacks reported in both countries.

"I haven't slept for 19 hours. And I've been in this line over nine hours," said Lily Rogers, 21, who was in an around 200 metres (656 feet) queue in Doha's Hamad International airport. The psychology student, en route to an holiday in Southeast Asia, said those in line were only given water during the wait. Virgin Australia estimated that over 25,000 passengers

were stranded at Doha airport. Lines were so long that arguments broke out as some passengers jumped queues, according to a Reuters witness. Around 250 flights were cancelled at Hamad airport, while another 238 were delayed, according to flight tracking website FlightRadar24.

Long queues formed also at Dubai International, the busiest airport in the world, where about 145 flights were cancelled and over 450 delayed, FlightRadar24 data showed. Qatar Airways said it was "making progress in restoring its schedule" with possible disruptions until June 26.

Dubai Airports and the Dubai government media office were not immediately available for comment. **BUSY HUB** Airports in the Middle East are some of the busiest in the world, covering an area stretching from Iran and Iraq to the Mediterranean and serving as a connecting hub for flights between Europe and Asia.

The region has also taken on a more important role since the start of the war between Russia and Ukraine, which has forced airlines to avoid airspace over both countries. Dubai transported 92.3 million passengers last year, with a daily average of over 250,000. Israel's strikes against Iran on June 13 already prompted airlines from British Airways to Lufthansa to halt flights to some Middle East destinations

due to air space closures and safety concerns. Following the U.S. attacks on Iran on Sunday, many have also cut flights to typically resilient hubs such as Dubai.

The restrictions and closures have created ripple effects beyond the region, as most passenger traffic transits through Hamad airport to other destinations, said Asia-based independent aviation analyst Brendan Sobie. Only 22% of passengers travelling through the airport had Qatar as their final destination in 2024, airport data shows.

On Monday, Air India suspended flights to and from the U.S. East Coast, Canada and Europe, which involve a tight corridor between those destinations and the Indian subcontinent. That poses a challenge for Indian carriers because they do not have access to Pakistani airspace, analysts say. The two neighbours blocked access to each other's airspace in April after a brief military conflict.

Air India said on Tuesday it would resume those flights as soon as airspaces reopen, while other carriers such as flydubai warned that delays would persist due to airspace congestion. "It's very frustrating," said Julien Moutte, a Paris-bound passenger who had been stuck at Doha's airport for around 15 hours.

Israel kills 40 in Gaza after truce with Iran

Cairo, June 24: Israeli forces killed at least 40 Palestinians in Gaza and ordered new evacuations Tuesday, local medics and residents said, in further bloodshed shortly after Israel and Iran agreed to a ceasefire in their air war.

The Israel-Iran deal announced by U.S. President Donald Trump raised hopes among Palestinians of an end to over 20 months of war in Gaza that has widely demolished the territory and displaced most residents, with malnutrition widespread. "Enough! The whole universe has let us down. (Iran-backed Lebanese group) Hezbollah reached a deal without Gaza, and now Iran has done the same," said Adel Farouk, 62, from Gaza City.

We hope Gaza is next, he told Reuters via a chat app, speaking before two explosions rang out in Tehran, with Trump accusing both sides of violating the deal, though voicing particular unhappiness with Israel, rebuking it with an obscenity in an extraordinary outburst of frustration.

In Gaza, deadly violence continued with little respite. Marwan Abu Naser, of the Al-Awda Hospital in Nuseirat in central Gaza, said it had received 19 dead and 146 injured from crowds who tried to reach a nearby aid distribution centre of the U.S.-backed Gaza Humanitarian Foundation. Abu Naser told Reuters the casualties resulted from gunfire.

Israel's military said a gathering overnight was identified adjacent to forces operating in Gaza's central Netzarim Corridor, and it was reviewing reports of casualties. Responding to a Reuters request for comment, the GHF said in an e-mail that there has been no incident near their aid site, which it added was located several kilometres south of the Netzarim Corridor.

U.N. aid trucks entering Gaza also use area roads and Palestinians have in the past few days reported killings of people by Israeli fire as they waited at roadsides to grab bags of flour from the trucks. Israel has been channelling much of the aid it lets into Gaza through the GHF, which operates a handful of distribution sites in areas guarded by Israeli forces.

The United Nations rejects the GHF delivery system as inadequate, dangerous, and a violation of humanitarian impartiality rules. Israel says it is needed to prevent the Hamas militants it is fighting from diverting aid deliveries. The Palestinian Islamist group denies doing so.

Philippe Lazzarini, head of the United Nations' Palestinian aid agency UNRWA, told reporters in Berlin on Tuesday that the new mechanism was an abomination and a death trap. Separately, 10 other people were killed by an Israeli airstrike on a house in the Sabra neighbourhood of Gaza City, while 11 were killed by Israeli gunfire in the southern city of Khan Younis, medics said, raising the day's toll to at least 40.

Israel says militants use built-up residential areas for operating cover. Hamas denies this. **GAZA TRUCE NEXT** Palestinians said they wished the Israel-Iran ceasefire announced by Trump had applied to Gaza.

Adding to their frustration, the Israeli military dropped leaflets over several areas in north Gaza ordering residents to leave their homes and head towards the south, in what appeared to herald renewed Israeli military strikes against Hamas. Coming back to combat areas represents a risk to your lives, the army statement said.

Sources close to Hamas told Reuters there had been some new efforts to resume ceasefire talks with Israel. They said Hamas was open to discussing any offers that would end the war and secure Israel's withdrawal from Gaza. But these echoed longstanding Hamas conditions that Israel has always rejected.

NATO leaders gather for historic summit

The Hague, June 24: NATO leaders were gathering in the Netherlands Tuesday for the start of a historic two-day summit that could unite the world's biggest security organisation around a new defence spending pledge or widen divisions among the 32 allies.

The allies are likely to endorse a goal of spending 5 per cent of their gross domestic product on their security, to be able to fulfil the alliance's plans for defending against outside attack. Still, Spain has said it cannot, and that the target is "unreasonable." President Donald Trump has said the US should not have to.

Slovakia said that it reserves the right to decide how to reach the target by NATO's new 2035 deadline. "We are not living in happy land after the Berlin Wall came down. We are living in much more dangerous times and there are enemies, adversaries who might want to attack us," NATO Secretary-General Mark Rutte said ahead of the summit in The Hague. "We have to make sure that we defend our beautiful way of life and systems and our values," he said.

Japan conducts first missile test

The test-firing of the Type 88 surface-to-ship short-range missile was conducted Tuesday at the Shizunai Anti-Air Firing Range on Japan's northernmost main island of Hokkaido

Tokyo, June 24: Japan's army announced Tuesday that it conducted a missile test for the first time on Japanese territory, as the country accelerates its military buildup to deter increasingly assertive China.

The test-firing of the Type 88 surface-to-ship, short-range missile was conducted Tuesday at the Shizunai Anti-Air Firing Range on Japan's northernmost main island of Hokkaido. About 300 soldiers participated in Tuesday's exercise by the Ground Self-Defence Force's 1st Artillery Brigade, using a training missile targeting an unmanned boat about 40 kilo-



metres off the southern coast of Hokkaido, officials said. Officials were still examining the results of the test, the GSDF said. Due to space limitations and safety concerns, Japan has previously conducted missile tests in the territories of the United States, a treaty ally, and Australia, a top Japanese defence partner where vast training grounds are available.

Tuesday's first domestic missile test underscores Japan's push toward a more self-sufficient military and its acquisition of strike-back capabilities as a deterrent to China's increasingly assertive naval activity in regional seas. Japan is also concerned about growing joint military exercises around Japanese coasts between China and Russia.

Fearing war with Russia, Finland hardens NATO's northern frontier


Lappeenranta, Finland, June 24: At a shooting range 10 miles from the Russian border, Finnish army reservist Janne Latto opened the trunk of his car and unpacked a small surveillance drone and controller, equipment he sees as vital for any future conflict with Finland's neighbour.

Since the invasion of Ukraine prompted Helsinki to join NATO two years ago, tensions reminiscent of the Cold War have resurfaced along the forested 1,340-km (833 mile) frontier, Europe's longest with Russia. The Nordic nation is beefing up an already-sizeable reservist force and will host a new command for NATO, whose members meet in the Hague on June 24 for an annual summit.

Still under construction, an imposing barbed-wire-topped fence now dominates a once-bustling section of the border, closed by Finland after it accused Russia of weaponising migration. Shopping malls and restaurants that buzzed with Russian visitors have fallen quiet. For this story, Reuters spoke

to a dozen people in Finland's border region, where the emerging divisions have left some unable to visit relatives and caused economic losses. Others supported the measures, citing a need to prepare for and deter future conflict. At the shooting range, near the lakeside town of Lappeenranta, some 100 miles from Russia's second city, St Petersburg, Latto, 47, said the Lauritsala Reservists were training with three drones including the Parrot Anafi surveillance vehicle, used by the professional armies of several NATO members, including Finland.

A grant from Finland's association of reservist groups meant ten more were on order, he said. The 2022 assault on Ukraine hardened 47-year-old Latto's perception of Russia. "What if they decide to come and change the border, just like they went to Ukraine," said Latto, who runs a small business assembling neon signs and billboards. He recalled Soviet attempts to invade during World War Two, and how Finland was forced to cede approximately 10% percent of its territory to



Russia, including Ayrappa, a nearby municipality that his grandfather died defending in 1944. The countries each insist they pose no threat to the other. Finnish President Alexander Stubb has said some level

of Russian buildup is a normal response to Helsinki's accession to NATO, which more than doubled the length of Russia's border with the alliance. However, a Finnish government defence report late last year described "a heightened

risk of an armed conflict," citing the development of Russia's military capabilities since the start for the war in Ukraine, and saying Moscow had ambitions to create a "buffer zone" from the Arctic to southern Europe. Finland has since announced plans to stockpile landmines. It banned Finnish-Russian dual nationals from flying drones and Russians from buying property, and this week warned that mobile signals were disrupted in regions near Russia.

"Finland is responsible for over half of the entire land border between NATO countries and Russia," Foreign Minister Elina Valtonen posted on X on Thursday, saying the country's defence posture was to ensure the border "remains inviolable."

Finland's presidency declined to comment for this story. Russia's foreign ministry did not respond to a comment request. President Vladimir Putin on Wednesday denied any plans to attack NATO. He said he did not see NATO rearmament as a threat. After Finland joined the alliance, Moscow announced plans to strengthen

military capacity in Russia's west and northwest.

The activities of the Finnish reservists, who also use firearms in target practice, are voluntary, although most have completed Finland's long-standing mandatory male conscription.

More than 50,000 Finns take part in such clubs, up by about a third since before the Ukraine war, according to the Finnish Reservists' Association, with a similar increase in the number of reservists called up by the military for refresher training.

Even older members of Latto's band of volunteers could see service in a crisis, as Finland raises the reserve's upper age limit to 65 to add 125,000 troops to a wartime army, and to take the number of reservists to one million by 2031.

He welcomed the extended military service, saying older reservists could be drone or radar operators.

"You don't have to run with the infantry to be a part of the modern battlefield," said Latto, a skilled hobbyist who has made his own first-person-view goggles to control a homemade drone.

EPFO likely to allow instant withdrawal

New Delhi: Retirement fund body EPFO subscribers may soon be able to withdraw their employees' provident fund (EPF) directly from their accounts through ATMs or other modes like UPI after linking their bank accounts with EPF. A highly placed source said the labour ministry is working on a project where a certain proportion of the EPF will be frozen and a large chunk will be available for withdrawal through their bank account using various modes like UPI or ATM debit cards. Under the auto-settlement mode, the withdrawal claims are settled electronically without manual intervention within three days of filing the application form. The limit of this auto-settlement mode has been raised to Rs 5 lakh Tuesday from existing Rs 1 lakh.

DRI seizes foreign origin cigarettes

New Delhi: Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI) officials have seized 92.1 lakh sticks of foreign-origin cigarettes valued at about Rs 18.2 crore, the finance ministry said Tuesday. Acting on a specific intelligence that cigarettes of foreign origin are being smuggled into India from Dubai under the guise of "bathroom and sanitary fittings", the officers of DRI, Chennai Zonal Unit, held a container bound to J-Matadee FTWZ (Foreign Trade Warehouse Zone).

New Delhi, June 24: India has for the first time secured a place among the top 100 out of 193 countries ranked for their progress in achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), according to a report published Tuesday.

According to the United Nations (UN) Sustainable Development Solutions Network's 10th and latest Sustainable Development Report (SDR), India ranks 99th on the 2025 Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Index with a score of 67, while China ranks 49th with 74.4 and the US 44th with 75.2 points.

Among India's neighbours, Bhutan takes 74th place with 70.5 points, Nepal ranks 85th with 68.6, Bangladesh 114th with 63.9 and Pakistan 140th with 57 points.

India's maritime neighbours, Maldives and Sri Lanka, stood at 53rd and 93rd places, respectively.

The report's authors said that SDG progress has stalled at the global level, with only 17 per cent of the 17 targets adopted by the UN member countries in 2015 projected to be achieved by 2030.

"Conflicts, structural vulnerabilities and limited fiscal space impede SDG progress in many parts of the world," the report, with world-renowned economist Jeffrey Sachs as its lead author, said.

European countries, especial-



ly the Nordic nations, continue to top the SDG Index, with Finland ranking first, Sweden second and Denmark third.

A total of 19 out of the top 20 countries are in Europe. Yet even these countries face significant challenges in achieving at least two goals, including those related to climate and biodiversity, largely due to unsustainable consumption, the authors said.

East and South Asia have outperformed all other global regions in terms of SDG progress since 2015 largely due to rapid socioeconomic development.

The countries in East and South Asia that have demonstrated the fastest progress

since 2015 (in points) include Nepal (+11.1), Cambodia (+10), the Philippines (+8.6), Bangladesh (+8.3) and Mongolia (+7.7).

The other countries showing rapid progress among their peers include Benin (+14.5), Peru (+8.7), the United Arab Emirates (+9.9), Uzbekistan (+12.1), Costa Rica (+7) and Saudi Arabia (+8.1).

Though only 17 per cent of the targets are on track to be achieved worldwide, most UN member states have made strong progress on targets related to access to basic services and infrastructure, including mobile broadband use (SDG 9), access to electricity (SDG 7), internet use (SDG 9), under-five mortality rate (SDG 3) and neo-

natal mortality (SDG 3). Five targets show significant reversals in progress since 2015. These are obesity rate (SDG 2), press freedom (SDG 16), sustainable nitrogen management (SDG 2), the Red List Index (SDG 15) and the Corruption Perceptions Index (SDG 16).

The report said the top three countries most committed to the UN multilateralism are Barbados, Jamaica, and Trinidad and Tobago. Among G20 nations, Brazil (25) ranks highest, while Chile (7) leads among OECD countries.

The United States, which recently withdrew from the Paris Climate Agreement and the World Health Organization (WHO) and formally declared its opposition to the SDGs and the 2030 Agenda, ranks last (193rd) for the second year in a row.

The report, which comes ahead of the 4th International Conference on Financing for Development (FD4) in Seville, Spain, (June 30-July 3) noted the global financial architecture (GFA) is broken.

"Money flows readily to rich countries and not to the emerging and developing economies (EMDEs) that offer higher growth potential and rates of return. At the top of the agenda at the Fourth International Conference for Financing Development (FD4) is the need to reform the GFA so that capital flows in far larger sums to the EMDEs," it said.

India not tariff king says FM Sitharaman

New Delhi, Jun 24: Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman Tuesday rejected the allegation that India is a "tariff king" saying that her latest Budget brought down the number of tariff rates to eight and the effective rate is "far lower".

"For those who still believe in the commentary which was made in the US that India may be the tariff king...I want two things to be remembered. Given our system of things, we seek parliamentary approval for deciding on the tariff rate...the permission to go up to a certain level but effectively you are at a far lower level," she said.

US President Donald Trump has repeatedly accused India of being a very high tariff nation. Trump had called India a "tariff king" and a "big abuser".

She said that the number of tariff rates was brought down to eight in the 2025-26 Budget with a view to boosting domestic manufacturing and promoting exports.

She further said, "Our procedures have given us the not-so-desirable picture of being very very restrictive and regressive about tariff. Many of them are already far lower than the rate at which the gazette notification came after the approval of Parliament."

Govt opens application portal for global EV makers

New Delhi, June 24: Global electric vehicle (EV) giants can now apply for the scheme to promote manufacturing of electric passenger cars in India, which offers significantly lower import tax for automakers that pledge to invest in domestic electric vehicle production.

Union Heavy Industries Minister HD Kumaraswamy inaugurated the portal for accepting applications under the scheme, which will remain open till October 21. He reiterated that EV giant Tesla is only interested in opening showrooms in India to sell its cars, and not inclined towards setting up manufacturing facilities in the country.

Officials explained that under the scheme, eligible investment must be capitalised in the books of account of the applicant "after the date of approval", therefore, equipment and machinery "must be put to use after becoming an approved applicant".

The minister shared that four to five auto firms have shown preliminary interest in the scheme, however, it remains to be seen how many companies actually apply for it, as the portal has been opened from Tuesday.

Further, the Ministry of Heavy Industries shall have the right to open the application



window, as and when required till March 15, 2026.

Secretary in the Heavy Industries Ministry Kamran Rizvi said original equipment manufacturers (OEMs) applying under the scheme and availing lower import tax will have to roll out a car with at least 25

S&P raises India's FY26 GDP growth to 6.5%

New Delhi, June 24: S&P Global Ratings Tuesday upped India's GDP growth forecast for the current fiscal to 6.5 per cent, citing lower crude prices, monetary easing and normal monsoon, and said the ongoing geopolitical tensions are unlikely to put a "significant pressure" on the rupee or inflation.

In its Asia Pacific Economic Outlook, S&P flagged rising risks to the global economy due to the turbulence in the Middle East, saying long-lasting major increase in oil prices could have significant economic impact in Asia-Pacific, notably via slower global growth and pressure on the current accounts of net energy importers, prices and costs.

S&P Global Ratings Economist Vishrut Rana told a key mitigating factor of India is that energy prices are still lower than last year. Brent crude oil traded at roughly \$85/barrel a year ago and current prices are still lower.

"This will help contain both current account outflows and domestic energy price pressures - while energy prices may rise moderately, the path of food prices will have a higher impact on inflation. Overall, we do not expect significant pressure on the Indian rupee or inflation," Rana said.

India imports more than 85 per cent of its crude oil and roughly half of its natural gas requirement. More than 40 per cent of the oil imports and half of gas imports come from the Middle East.

Rates of the benchmark Brent crude futures fell to around \$69 a barrel Tuesday morning after US President Donald Trump announced that

Israel and Iran have agreed to a "complete and total ceasefire".

Israel and Iran have been at war over the past 12 days with Israeli military strikes, followed by counterstrikes by Iran. US, too, joined the war with military strikes on Iran's three most critical nuclear facilities.

S&P in its quarterly report on Asia Pacific economies said current conditions on global energy markets - which are well-supplied make long-term impact on oil prices leading to price rise unlikely.

US-based rating agency said domestic demand resilience would limit the economic slowdown in economies, like India, which are less exposed to goods exports. In May, it had cut India's FY26 growth estimates by 20 basis points to 6.3 per cent citing global uncertainties and US tariff shocks.

"We see India's GDP growth holding up at 6.5 per cent in fiscal 2026 (year ending March 31, 2026). That forecast assumes a normal monsoon, lower crude oil prices, income-tax concessions and monetary easing," S&P said. For fiscal 2027, GDP growth is projected at 6.7 per cent.

In the FY25 fiscal, Indian economy grew 6.5 per cent S&P's FY26 growth estimates for India is in line with the projections made by central bank RBI earlier this month at 6.5 per cent.

S&P estimates inflation in India to average 4 per cent in 2025, down from 4.6 per cent in 2024.

It forecasts rupee to weaken to 87.5 a dollar by the end of 2025, from 86.6 at 2024-end. The Indian rupee opened at Rs 86.13 against US dollar in morning trade Tuesday, up 65 paise over its previous close.

Markets end higher

Mumbai, June 24: Equity benchmarks Sensex and Nifty Tuesday gave up most of their sharp intra-day gains as investors turned cautious.

30-share Sensex trimmed most of its gains as reports surfaced of the ceasefire plan faltering. But, the benchmark still managed to settle in the green, climbing 158.32 points or 0.19 per cent to 82,055.11. On the contrary, 50-share Nifty rose 72.45 points or 0.29 per cent to end at 25,044.35. The index fell from an intra-day high of 25,317.70.

From the Sensex constituents, Adani Ports, Tata Steel, Kotak Mahindra Bank, UltraTech Cement, Bajaj Finserv and Titan were among the biggest gainers. In contrast, Power Grid, Trent, NTPC, Maruti, HCL Tech and Bharat Electronics were among the laggards.

Rupee recovers from record low

MUMBAI: The rupee recovered from record low level and closed with a steep gain of 75 paise at 86.03 (provisional) against US dollar as global crude oil prices went down following hopes of deescalation in Middle East tensions. A weak greenback and positive sentiments in the domestic equity markets further boosted the local unit, according to forex traders. Brent crude, the global oil benchmark, plummeted 3.19 per cent to \$69.20 per barrel in futures trade as US President Donald Trump announced that Iran and Israel agreed to a ceasefire. At the interbank foreign exchange, the local unit opened at 86.07 against the US dollar and traded in the range of 85.91-86.27 before closing at 86.03 (provisional), up 75 paise from its previous close. The rupee had plunged 23 paise to close at a five-month low of 86.78 against the US dollar Monday. Meanwhile, the dollar index, which gauges the greenback's strength against a basket of six currencies, was trading 0.48 per cent lower at 97.94.

Bhubaneswar, June 24: Building a dream home can be a dream for life as the real estate prices are skyrocketing. A report issued by money control and Lisas Foras house purchase affordability index shows that Bhubaneswar is the second most expensive Tier- 2 cities. The city has rental yield is less than 2.5 per cent and the lowest

rental yield is 1.7 per cent. National Housing Bank (NHB) data shows that even top five per cent of urban families buying a home in Bhubaneswar would take more than 50 years. Real estate has taken a jump for quite some time. Middle class families are struggling to get good space in city.

Ishan Kanungo, resident stated, "I am a working professional. It's been more than 5 years that I am planning to buy a property in Bhubaneswar, but somehow I am not convinced with the investment and output."

It is challenging to buy a decent space in the city, he added. Another resident, Ankita Das said, "I had been thinking of getting a 3BHK in city, but the rates are extremely high. My all savings and salary seems short. I am curious to know the rea-



son of price hike in real estate, since there is no massive development happening in city."

Despite high incomes, urban families are struggling to fetch a land for themselves. A standard 1,184 sq ft house in Bhubaneswar, considered the median size by NHB, remains out of reach even for the affluent, replicating trends observed in other high-cost urban centers like Mumbai and Gurugram. Cities like Raipur; Kolkata

on the contrary, shows a prominent future of building homes. As per the data, the time a family can build a home in other cities than Bhubaneswar is relatively low.

Duckett powers win for England

Leeds, June 24: Opener Ben Duckett hit the most defining century of his career, exposing an out-of-depth Indian attack as England comfortably chased down a tricky target of 371 to win the opening Test by five wickets after an intriguing five days of play here Tuesday.

Duckett's 149 off 170 balls with 21 fours and an audacious reverse-swept six off Ravindra Jadeja, along with Zak Crawley's 65 in an opening stand of 188, followed by Joe Root's composed 53 and Jamie Smith's cheeky 44 made the chase look much easier than it actually was.

Having chased down 378 at Birmingham courtesy Jonny Bairstow in 2022, England once again did the same with elan on Tuesday, leaving India head coach Gautam Gambhir with an even bigger frown on his face. England lead the five-match series 1-0.

It will be difficult to recall when was the last time that India had five centuries in a single Test and yet lost a game so comprehensively.

Shoddy fielding effort and no support for the peerless Jasprit Bumrah made matters worse for India. Indian bowlers in second innings alone conceded 44 boundaries and three sixes. Add to that the 54 boundaries and five sixes in the first innings. There will certainly be bowling changes in the next Test but whether that will result in 20 wickets is a million dollar question.

In the final session, Ravindra Jadeja, who enjoys a favourable match-up against Ben Stokes, got the important breakthrough with the England skipper trying to reverse-sweep from the rough and his opposite number Shubman Gill taking an



easy catch. While this was one of India's worst fielding efforts with Yashasvi Jaiswal alone dropping four catches, skipper Gill's relative inexperience in strategizing and taking on-your-feet decisions also became visitor's undoing.

At one point, it seemed the team's most experienced batter KL Rahul was captaining the side, and Gambhir's record as a coach in traditional format got a tad worse.

Shardul Thakur got a couple of wickets with two rank bad balls and with only 16 overs to show in an entire match, the Mumbai man's Test career could feature an indefinite break. But then Nitish Kumar Reddy as a bowler is even worse. The manner in which Jadeja's deliveries gripped and turned, Indian think-tank must be ruing about missing Kuldeep Yadav, who would have been far more effective than a medi-

ocre Thakur.

Prasidh Krishna took five wickets in the match but the amount of boundary balls that he bowled because of his natural back-of-length stuff, he can't be considered a reliable option.

More than the tour of Australia, Mohammed Shami and Ishant Sharma, two outstanding practitioners of swing and seam bowling, were finally missed.

Left-handed Duckett did survive a quality morning spell from Bumrah but stuck to his strengths with amazing conviction, laying the foundation for victory with a dogged Crawley.

The rain break in the post-lunch session did help India as Prasidh Krishna got a couple of wickets, but despite the twin blows, Duckett continued his offensive batting style to keep India at bay.

For India, Bumrah bowled a probing first spell but there was no support from the other end. Siraj and Shardul bowled enough boundary balls to let England off the hook.

Duckett's game is based on simple hand-eye coordination as there was hardly any footwork. The 30-year-old mostly remained rooted to his crease and tried playing forward or square of the wicket depending upon the length. He played late and that gave him time to punish Bumrah as well during the subsequent spells.

Duckett was dropped by Jaiswal off Siraj on 97, much to the frustration of the bowler.

When Jadeja bowled, Duckett would reverse-sweep him for good measure as there was not much help off the surface.

Not playing a spinner of Kuldeep Yadav's calibre came back to haunt India and they would certainly make corrective measures in Birmingham Test that starts July 2.

Feisty competitor who deserved more respect

It was in the late 1960s, Dilip Doshi used to be a terror for batters in the Indian university circuit when his Calcutta University and later Bengal Ranji teammate late Gopal Bose had asked him, "It's fine you get university batters out but can you get Garry Sobers out?"

Doshi apparently was nonchalant as ever and said matter-of-factly, "Yeah, I can."

In fact, he did dismiss Sobers in a World XI match few years later but more importantly played alongside the West Indian legend in English County in Nottinghamshire for a number of seasons.

And in 1991 when Doshi's autobiography 'Spin Punch' was published, it was Sir Gary Sobers who wrote the foreword: "Dilip Doshi has an immeasurable knowledge to pass on to those who want to follow his path into professional cricket. He has played at all levels over the world and there can be no one more qualified to talk about the art of spin bowling."

It was quite a heartwarming tribute from the greatest of them all but like many mysteries in Indian cricket, one can never really decode why Doshi's expertise was never sought by the BCCI.

Impossible wasn't a word in Doshi's dictionary or else in those days of late 70s, he couldn't have eclipsed Padmakar Shivalkar and Rajinder Goel to make his Test debut at 32 and still get more than 100 Test wickets, playing mostly on flat and dead tracks.

Doshi had great success on Indian tracks but it was the tour of Australia in 1980-81 where he picked up 11 wickets (6 in Adelaide and 5 in Melbourne) in more than 150-plus overs on non-responsive pitches. His scalps included Greg Chappell, Doug Walters, Rod Marsh, Kim Hughes, among others.

His bowling was not a poetry in motion like the great Bishan Singh Bedi, neither was it dart like accuracy that was Padmakar Shivalkar's forte. Doshi was somewhere in between the two.

He could flight the ball, had a lovely loop and even when he wasn't turning the ball square, he could pitch it on same length ball after ball, creating doubts in batter's mind about how much it would turn or straighten or go in with the angle.

'Dilip Da', as he was known in Bengal cricket circles, believed in continuity -- whether pitching countless deliveries on

same length or listening to Rolling Stones for 50 years and being one of Mick Jagger's closest buddies for nearly five decades. What became his impediment was batting, as he could easily have been No 11 in a squad of 'No. 11 batters'. And, his fielding was an apology.

Hence, when there's a slight dip in form, the cricket establishment at that time knew whom to get rid of.

It was the 1982-83 tour of Pakistan where Javed Miandad really took his mickey. Sunil Gavaskar often recollected how Miandad, in his slurry Hindi-Urdu, would sledge Doshi.

Indian cricket fraternity mourns

A "heartbroken" Indian cricket fraternity came together in grief and reverence to pay tribute to former left-arm spinner Dilip Doshi, who died following a cardiac arrest in London. He died at the age of 77 Monday.
